"Gem" Attraction Ita Porte County Historical Society Museum Exists as Living Biography

The La Porte County Historical Society Museum is a history time capsule. Within its protective walls are housed the treasures of our county's past: artifacts, documents, memorabilia and ephemera that relate the stories of those who have lived for so many generations on Lake Michigan's southern shores.

The museum holds the story of those who first came to this land and claimed it as their own, and those who have lived and worked here for so many years. It is a repository where we, who are living and working now, can relate our stories, preserve them and pass them down to future generations.

By the foresight of the La Porte County His-

torical Society, these memories have been collected over the last 108 years so ensuing generations learn stories of success and failure, the highest achievements of our citizens, as well as the low points of our collective family's story.

The museum is, in effect, a living biography of La Porte County. Its collection and telling of stories is an ongoing process, and the preservation of these treasures is the Historical Society's goal.

That mission is one that has not gone unnoticed.

There are more than 500 museums in Indiana, but among them, the La Porte County Historical Society Museum was listed as a "Gem" attraction in the 2011 AAA Tour Book.

The museum's origins date back to 1906. "A Twentieth Century History and Biographical Record of La Porte County Indiana" (1904), a monumental work by a prominent La Porte resident, the Rev. E.D. Daniels (1846-1921), sparked public interest in Continued on Page 2

the preservation of local history. In response, a La Porte County Historical Society was proposed and an organizational meeting held Jan. 30, 1906.

In February of that year, the organization was established and began holding meetings in La Porte's first library building. The stated intent was *"literary and scientific with the express purpose of the finding a location for the preservation of county relics."* to add to their personal collection.

Upon Jones' passing, his will went into probate in La Porte Circuit Court. In it, a bequest was made to the city of La Porte that it receive his considerable and famous collection of antiques and firearms. The one stipulation was that the city would prepare a suitable place to house the collection, and make provisions to ensure it would be properly cared for or curated. If this was not possible, the collection would go to Chicago's Field Museum. Fortunately,

A fortuitous event, in the history of the Historical Society, occurred in 1921 with the acquisition of the William A. Jones collection. Jones owned a successful iron foundry in Chicago and a fine home in La Porte, the present location of Arbor Hill Inn, a bed and breakfast. Jones and his wife spent many years traveling in Europe and the Americas seeking items the Historic Society found a home for the collection in the old La Porte library building.

The Society's collections have been housed in various locations over the years as interest in the project grew and the number of objects in the collection increased. It moved to the county courthouse basement to the La Porte County security complex and finally in 2006 to a permanent home in the beautiful, spacious, colonial-style building that once housed the Kesling automobile collection, 2405 Indiana Ave. A well-kept lawn and commodious parking lot welcome visitors to a building decorated with features rescued from historic local buildings, including doors from the Fildes Mansion and iron gates from the Fox Woolen Mills.

Within its walls are housed more than 80,000 artifacts of natural history and heirlooms of La Porte County residents. These heirlooms include furniture, household items and tools brought to the area by original pioneers. Products manufactured in La Porte County over the years are on display, as well as a large collection of antique toys and rare dolls. Of particular interest to girls of all ages are the furnished doll houses.

Much of the extensive collection is showcased in period rooms: a highlight of any visit to the museum. Visitors can enjoy a stroll through the past as they peruse the interior of a pioneer log cabin, imagine relaxing in a Victorian parlor or having a morning cup of coffee in a 1920s kitchen. Also on display are a business office and doctor's office, as well as a turn-of-the-century dentist office, including early examples of the dentist's trade. Each of these interesting displays is accompanied by a directory itemizing and describing every item on view.

A popular exhibit getting an upgrade tells the Belle Gunness story, documenting a gruesome chapter in La Porte history. Here, one can read about a local woman who lured unsuspecting men to her farm, only to steal their money and dispatch them brutally, then bury them on her property. The visitor can view artifacts from the farm, including a cart used to haul bodies from the house to grave sites, and the skull of an unknown victim: a permanent guest at the museum.

In the museum's lower level is the W.A. Jones collection of antique firearms and weapons, considered, by some, to be one of the finest in the world. Here, the visitor can inspect weapons from every age collected from all over the world. Included in the collection are many artifacts commemorating the various military engagements in which the United States has been involved. The Jones collection is augmented by the Historical Society's extensive collection, making this display truly worth the time to study.

Take a walk up the museum's central staircase, passing beneath a life-sized replica of Octave Chanute flying across the ceiling with the aid of his flying contraption, and you enter another world of wonder: Dr. Peter Kesling's collection of vintage automobiles. This amazing assembly of ancient horseless carriages consists of more than 30 vintage automobiles collected and restored by Kesling and his wife, Charlene.

The collection also consists of automobiles that reach as far back in history as the 1903 Winton, which was driven by Kesling and his wife from California to New York in 2003 to commemorate the first coast-to-coast automobile journey made by Dr. Horatio Jackson way back in 1903, to a 1982 stainless-steel DeLorean immortalized in the "Back to the Future" movies.

This amazing display is highlighted by an important group of cars built by Indiana manufacturers, including: a 1929 Auburn Cabin Speedster; a 1935 Auburn Boattail Speedster; a 1930 Cord L-29; and a 1937 Model 812 Cord "Coffin-nose." Last, but not least, the group is rounded out by the most impressive 1929 Duesenberg Model J.

History — as well as movie — buffs will enjoy inspecting the 1948 Tucker "Torpedo," which is No. 12 in the 50 built by the innovative Tucker Corporation of Chicago. This particular car was featured in the 1988 movie "Tucker: The Man and His Dream" starring Jeff Bridges. Other automobiles in this fine collection include a 1910 Velie, a 1912 Baker Electric Coupe and a 1914 Mitchell.

Suspended from the ceiling are several full-sized early aircraft, while lining the

walls and every available space on the upper floor of the museum building are vintage toys and other curious collections.

A most important function of the Historical Society is preservation of the archive of county history, lovingly and faithfully curated and maintained by La Porte County Historian Fern Eddy Schultz. A recent addition to this collection is the archive containing all past issues of The News-Dispatch. Schultz catalogs and indexes all information published about activities in the county and files them with indexes so they can be preserved and accessed by future generations.

Isaac Newton is quoted as saying, "If I have seen further, it is by standing on the shoulders of giants." The museum houses the stories of our ancestors, the small and the great, the humble and the giants, of times past. By studying their lives we can take advantage of what has been learned, possibly avoid the pitfalls and propel ourselves further.

We, too, can stand on the shoulders of giants.

Chicago Playwright Discusses Latest Work Headed for New York


Joel Drake Johnson, whose latest play, "Rasheeda Speaking," premieres in January in New York, returned to his hometown of New Buffalo, Mich., as the guest speaker at the July 29 Harbor Country Book Club meeting.

A Chicago playwright and former teacher at Northwestern University and Adlai Stevenson High School, where he taught playwriting, Johnson got his start as a writer at Chicago's critically acclaimed Econo-Art Theatre, which produced five of his plays. "Four Places," "Before My Eyes," "A Guide for the Perplexed" and "The End of the Tour" were first produced at Chicago's Victory Gardens Theatre under the direction of Sandy Shinner. "Four Places" then was produced in Los Angeles by The Rogue Machine Theatre where, under the direction of Robin Larson and featuring Tony nominee Roxanne Hart, it gained more critical acclaim that included five Ovation

Award nominations, four nominations from the Los Angeles Drama Critics Circle and a Garland Award for Best New Play. It has since been produced at numerous theaters throughout the U.S. and Germany.

Johnson also has won three Illinois Arts Council grants, including one for "A Blue Moon," which was first produced at Chicago Dramatists. Other works include "As the Beaver" and "The Fall to the Earth," which have been produced in cities such as New York and Los Angeles, with Tony nominees portraying his characters.

"Rasheeda Speaking," which will be directed by Cynthia Nixon of "Sex & the City" fame and starring two-time Oscar-winner Diane Weist ("Hannah and Her Sisters"), was sparked by occurrences Johnson



"I was in a hospital one day, waiting to see my doctor, and I happened to overhear this conversation between these two white men, who were talking about the African-American receptionist in derogatory terms," Johnson said. "I was astonished that people could still be like this – holding these derogatory, racial conversations in today's society.

"We're supposed to be living in this extremely tolerant society, but here I was, listening to these two men talk down on other races. It was unbelievable, so I decided to write about it, which is how I came up with the premise for 'Rasheeda Speaking'."

The play follows the life of Jaqueline, a black receptionist at a white physician's office as she deals with racial and sexist tensions while her boss plots to oust her by enlisting his meek, white female coworker as a workplace spy. Tensions rise as relations between the two women quickly deteriorate, turning their once-cordial workplace into a battlefield of innuendo, paranoia and passive aggression.

"I wrote Jaqueline in a very specific way, because I always wanted her to be the hero of the story, whether you see her that way or not," Johnson said. "She is perfectly aware of what is happening behind her back, and she responds appropriately and passionately, and that's what I love about her character."

"Thinking Big" Theme of Chamber Music Festival

The theme is "Thinking Big," so expect the Michigan City Chamber Music Festival to explore the expansive limits of traditional ensembles when the 13th season arrives Aug. 9-17 in Michigan City.

The free event will present five formal recitals, three concerts for children, an "open rehearsal" and an outdoor concert featuring local adult amateur instrumentalists performing with festival musicians.

Chamber music traditionally is small, conductorless ensembles — usually a quartet or trio. This year, in keeping with the "Thinking Big" theme, the programs will feature larger ensembles, including Felix Mendelssohn's "Octet for Strings."

How to take advantage of the Portals

Last month I pointed out that everyone (90%) searches for homes on the Internet; principally on Zillow, Trullia, and Realtor.com. And I said that three things sell houses on these portals. **Photos, Good text,** and **Price.** I pointed out that you must keep your property from being **eliminated** at the internet level.

So what should Sellers do?

Make sure your agent uses a professional to shoot the **photos** with large format so they reproduce well. Realtor.com claims that the more photos you have the more likely someone will look at your house. So put up at least 20 photos for a house. Make sure you have an aerial for land.

The **text** should avoid phrases like, "this house," "unusual" "unique" and all the clichés real estate agents use. The text should paint a picture and have at least a touch of humor.

But the most important issue is **price**. If your house has not sold in 90 days after listing, the price is not right. Right price is no more than 5% higher than the comparables indicate. Right price is that you have gotten at least one showing per week. Right price is when internet reports indicate scores of people are doing "listing views" of your property every week on the portals. Right price means you need to reduce the price if you have had 10 showings and no offers.

If your house is not priced right, it will be eliminated at the level of internet views. End of story. No sale.







All applications must include evidence the organization is recognized by the Internal Revenue Service as a 501(c)(3) charitable group, and that service is within the Michigan City Area Schools boundaries.

The Enrichment Corp. is a public-benefit corporation created June 10, 1997, by an agreement between Blue Chip Casino and the City of Michigan City. It is independent of city government and has nothing to do with its budget. According to the agreement, the Enrichment Corp. receives \$750,000 per year from Blue Chip Casino, of which \$100,000 is paid annually to Washington Park Zoo and at least \$100,000 for programs that benefit Michigan City community children.

Completed applications must be post-marked by Friday, Nov. 21. This will be the only grant cycle for 2014-2015. Grant money for that cycle will be distributed during spring 2015. If the Enrichment Corp. receives a grant application before Nov. 7, notification will be given if it is not complete. That's why it is advised to submit applications early. Off the Book Shelf

Invisible City by Julia Dahl (hard-

cover, \$24.99 in bookstores and online)

New author. New subject material.

Great read.

"I was in Chinatown when they called me about the body in Brooklyn."

So starts this week's recommendation set in New York City in the borough of Brooklyn, actually the part of Brooklyn called Gowanus, a shipping and industrial area where the body was found in a scrap yard.

The voice of our narrator is Rebekah Roberts, newly graduated from college and on her first job for *The New York Tribune* as a stringer, an on-thescene reporter with no job security or benefits. But, it's a place to start.

Beyond the yellow police tape, all Rebekah can see is the naked leg of a woman hanging over the bucket of a steel excavator, suspended in space.

Repeated attempts to get any information about the dead woman fall on deaf ears. The police won't talk to her because she doesn't have a press card yet from the NYPD, and the scrap yard is owned by Aron Mendelssohn, a member of the ultra-conservative Hasidic Jews, who certainly won't talk to her.

Rebekah is persistent — her job demands it and she sees two Hasidic men and a boy enter a nearby convenience store. While the two men talk to the police, she finds out the boy's name is Yakov Mendelssohn, son of the scrap yard's owner. Soon, a van with Hebrew writing comes and takes the body away. What about an autopsy by the city?

Rebekah is sent to the Mendelssohn's house in nearby Borough Park, home to a large number of Hasidic Jews. She meets Miriam, who turns out to be the sister-in-law of the dead woman, finally identified as Rivka Mendelssohn, wife of Aron.

The Hasidic community is part of the reason Rebekah is in New York. She was raised in Florida by her father, a simple man who happened to fall in love with a Jewish woman, Aviva Kagan. They never married, and Aviva left soon after Rebekah was born. Her teen-age rebellion abated and the need to reconnect with her Hasidic family was too much



Invisible COTY Julia Dahl for her. She left Florida to rejoin her family in New York City, and now, Rebekah would like to get to know her mother's people, maybe even make a connection with her. Maybe this murder investigation will be the "in" she needs to find her, and maybe write her first major story, too.

I never really looked at the life of an onscene reporter until this story. The author makes you understand the persistence and strength of character it takes to get a story worthy of a paycheck. I walked the streets of Borough Park with Rebekah, seeking

out anything about the dead woman and her family, talking to anyone who would give any information at all, and in Borough Park, that's not much.

Rebekah finds an unexpected ally in Saul, who says he is with the NYPD and assigned here because he is a Jew. But why is he helping this lowly street beat reporter? Maybe Saul has his own agenda. Rebekah doesn't realize it, but the closer she gets to the truth of Rivka's murder, the closer she gets to her own mother. Unfortunately, it also brings her closer to disaster.

This is an amazing story told by an author with a clear understanding of her subject and, in Rebekah, a character you would like to get to know better. I certainly hope there will be another Rebekah Roberts story in the future!


