



Shirley Heinze Land Trust, now located in Valparaiso, has been protecting natural lands and habitats in the southern part of the Lake Michigan Watershed since 1981, when it was founded by Mr. and Mrs. Robert L. Seidner and named in honor of Dr. Shirley Heinze of Ogden Dunes, whose efforts to help the Seidner's children and preserve the Indiana Dunes were greatly admired and appreciated.

The initial board of trustees, which consisted of three people, met for the first time in 1982 and soon began acquiring dune lots in the Miller Beach neighborhood of Gary and wetland lots in the Great Marsh in Beverly Shores. A few years later, in 1986, the board expanded, which brought on Barbara Plimpton, who spent 18 years on the board. With a botanical background, she headed the hike program and offered public lectures, promoting scientific investigation. Two years later, Newgent joined the board, becoming a life member.

"I really didn't know what I was doing, but we made it through," Newgent said with a laugh. "I couldn't have done any of it without the team here. There is just a tremendous group of people that work and volunteer here, and none of this would be possible without all of their help."

During this time, the board continued to focus on acquiring wetlands in the Great Marsh, dunes in Miller and dune and swale in Gary, resulting in the first transfer of land to Indiana Dunes National Lakeshore in 1993. In the ensuing six years, the Trust acquired Cressmoor Prairie, which became the first Shirley Heinze property to be dedicated as a state nature preserve, resulting in its number of land holdings nearly doubling after acquiring more than 300 acres.

Today, the Trust manages more than 1,400 acres of protected land in various counties near Lake Michigan, including a wide range of high dune, tallgrass prairie, oak savanna, boreal flatwoods, duneand-swale, woodlands, marshes, swamps, ponds and riparian habitats. This count includes nearly 1,200 acres the Trust owns outright, 100 acres held as conservation easements and nearly 30 acres that have been transferred to the National Park Service and Indiana Department of Natural Resources. Currently, five Trust-owned properties — Cressmoor Prairie, Seidner Dune & Swale, John Merle Coulter Preserve, Barker Woods and Ambler Flatwoods (the last two are in Michigan City) — are dedicated to the public as state nature preserves. Several of the Trust's preserves feature trail systems that guide and educate visitors while they hike. The Trust also has made contributions to natural areas owned by other groups, including the Indiana DNR, The Nature Conservancy, La Porte County Parks, Lake County Parks and Portage Parks Department.

The overall mission is two-fold:

- 1) Protect habitats and ecosystems of Northwest Indiana by purchasing, restoring and protecting environmentally significant properties for future generations
- 2) Inspire and educate all ages about land conservation and how important it is to protect the natural world.

"Simply put, the Trust aims to preserve, restore and educate," Newgent said. "We want to be able to have the chance to preserve and, in many cases, restore these properties to their original state so that they are here for future generations to enjoy and learn from. There are so many things that nature has to offer, so many things for us to still learn. We are still finding new species of plants, learning new things about the plants we thought we knew everything about... There is always more to learn."

After the Trust has acquired a remnant natural area, it begins the long process of returning it to its original, healthy state. Each piece of property under restoration has a management plan specifically tailored to fit the condition the land is in, and return it to their ideal conditions.

The team at the Trust aims to sustain numerous biological resources, as well as to neutralize the aspects of modern landscapes that may compromise the health of natural habitats. Through restoration efforts, they also tackle issues such as habitat fragmentation (habitat loss chipping away at larger, continuous habitats), fire suppression and invasive species.

However, restoration is an ongoing process, slowly transitioning into simple maintenance. This can happen at dif-

ferent rates depending on the constraints at each individual site. The Trust works to improve the overall function and sustainability of each natural area, making it less dependent on human intervention.

In recent Shirley years, Heinze Land Trust has renewed an emphasis on stewardship as its land holdings continue to increase, resulting in the hiring of the first full-time stewardship manager and major restoration work at its Ivanhoe South property in Gary. New funding resources and partnerships yielded a large savanna restoration project at Bur Oak Woods in Hobart, expanding volunteer programs and initiating The Mighty Acorns Environmental Education Program. Started in 2009,

it is the result of a partnership between the Trust, The Field Museum and Dunes Learning Center. It is designed to allow students to have numerous opportunities to engage and learn from local natural environments and be a part of their restoration.

"The Mighty Acorns Program is a really special program," Newgent said. "We actually had to hire an educational coordinator to be in charge of the program because it's doing so well. It's so nice to see these schoolchildren get so excited about learning and ex-

perimenting in these different habitats. These children are the future of the Trust, and it's so wonderful to see how many of them are so interested in preserving the natural habitats in their communities."

"It just exploded," Newgent continued. "You get your foot in the door with one community, and another community hears about it and wants to get in on it. We have been very fortunate to have such helpful teachers in each district that make sure everything is being done so that the students reach their full potential in the program."

Currently, Mighty Acorns has reached 139 classrooms, serving more than 3,700 students in Michigan City Area Schools, the School City of Hobart, Portage Township Schools, School City of Hammond, Gary Community School, School City of East Chicago, Charter School of the Dunes and the Discovery Charter School.

The Trust has published four books of environmental interest and continues to conduct various educational hikes, workshops, lectures and other public presentations. All of this is made possible by not just the Trust's staff, but the many volunteers.

"We're always looking for more help, because the work is never done," Newgent said with a laugh. "There are still so many lands that need to be restored, and so many plants and wildlife that still need to be catalogued. Having our volunteers is a blessing."

Jazz Masters 101 Reunion to Close Sinai Forum Season

Since Milton and Sylvia Bankoff founded Sinai Forum in 1953, its mission has been to provide exceptional, affordable programming on important issues for Michigan City residents.

Over the years, the series has featured everyone from Nobel Prize recipients and Pulitzer Prize winners to famous actors and performing artists.

Now, that vision begun by the Bankoffs has come full circle with their son, Peter, who will help bring the 61st Forum season to a close with "Jazz Masters 101 Reunion" on Sunday, Dec. 14, at the Blue Chip Casino Stardust Event Center in Michigan City.

Bankoff will be joined by jazz musicians John Clayton and Jeff Hamilton.

"I had contacted Jeff and John about possibly performing in the Forum as a favor to my sister, Barb, who is on the Foadvisorv board," Peter Bankoff said. "They agreed right off the bat, but with one, solitary condition - that I perform with them. I couldn't say no to them. Even though haven't performed in years, and am nowhere

near their musical caliber, in the end, they are some of my best friends and I couldn't say no."

In 1986, Clayton and Hamilton joined forces, accompanied by Jeff Clayton on the saxophone, and formed the Clayton-Hamilton Jazz Orchestra. Together, they have recorded six CDs, including their Grammy nominated "Groove Shop." Before then, Hamilton and Clayton were students at Indiana University, where they met and became close friends with Bankoff, who was working on a degree in jazz studies from the IU School of Music. Bankoff grew up studying piano and viola, performed with the Michigan City Symphony, arranged and directed compositions for the Miss Indiana Pageant, even played piano for beloved composer/ conductor Henry Mancini.

Finding inspiration from his father, Peter Bankoff chose to follow another passion of his after graduating from IU - medicine. Walking in the steps of his father and other physicians in the family, Bankoff became an anesthesiologist. Today, he is the medical director of Bilt-

more SurgiCenter in downtown Phoenix.

Now, some 40 years after the trio parted ways to pursue their various dreams, they will unite again to perform in Michigan City on Dec. 14.

"It's just so exciting to have a chance to reunite with Jeff and John, who are still some of my best friends in the world - even after all this time," Bankoff said. "It's such an honor to be a part of a group that is just as celebrated as past guests have been."






















Springfield Receives \$1,000 Grant

The Fitness Rebellion

Editor's Note — "The Fitness Rebellion," written by staff at Michigan City's Anytime Fitness, appears every other week in The Beacher. This column was written by Trainer Shannon Rockstad.

I am going to ask a question that may not have occurred to many, but should be taken seriously.

For the last few generations, we have had leaps

and bounds in technology that helped us uncover much of the mystery of the human body. One huge part in that development largely has centered around measuring the body. This can be done by pounds, mass taken up in space, body fat percent, muscle pounds versus fat

pounds, waist measurement and more. The ultimate goal is to measure and then come back a week or month later to see those numbers going up or down.

I have been in the fitness industry for five years, and what I've noticed is a trend that is not healthy for anyone.

Because of our accessibility to tools that judge us, we tend to live or die by them. However, here is my question: What if we did not have anything to measure you by? What if losing weight or gaining muscle was judged by those around you with compliments and reassurance that you are reaching your goals? Or even as simple as your clothes fitting better or worse?

When someone is setting out to achieve a certain physique or body type, deep down they know if they are getting there or not. This is not to say I am against measurement of any kind, but I have had clients take every kind word they've heard from colleagues and immediately forget about it the instant they see they only lost one pound for that week.

The ultimate goal is to change your body completely, not drive yourself crazy reaching a goal that may be achieved in a year or a week.

The real questions should be, "Do I like the way I am looking?" "Do I feel better?" "Do others notice a difference?" The numbers are to track progress, but when you reach the body you want, you will know it.

On December 16, 1959, The Second City improvisational comedy troupe staged its first performance in Chicago.






Off the Book Shelf

Billion Dollar Painter:
The Triumph and Tragedy of
Thomas Kinkade Painter of
Light by G. Eric Kuskey with
Bettina Gilois (hardcover \$26;
available online, in bookstores
and as an ebook)

"Be careful what you wish for, you might get it" could be the theme of this week's recommendation.



On the surface, Thomas Kinkade is a true American rags-to-riches story. He was the first artist to be publicly traded on NASDAQ. But at what price is glory? You may be shocked like I was while reading this story that in turns is sad and happy, lovely and ugly.

Thom was a young boy when his father abandoned him, his mother, sister and brother. They moved to a trailer in Placerville, Calif., and his mother worked three jobs to keep the family together. Thom started drawing at a young age, and by the time he was in high school, he was charging other students for his caricatures of teachers.

He was lucky enough to be taught painting techniques by two artists: Charles Bell, a local artist in his town, and Glenn Wessels, a friend of Ansel Adams. Wessels took on the 16-year-old as an apprentice and taught him much about painting.

College found him studying fine art for two years at Berkeley, followed by two years at the Art Center of Pasadena.

After marrying his childhood sweetheart, Nanette, he would load up his car with paintings and go to Carmel-by-the-Sea, selling his works on the street while demonstrating his painting to passersby. He was a natural talker who showed interest and respect for all he met. One of those people was Rick Barnett, a Kirby Vacuum salesman. At a wedding, he met Ken Raasch, an executive in a small finance firm. The three of them would make history...

They called their company Lightpost Publishing. By this time, Thom was calling himself the Painter of Light. He truly thought he had a calling to spread God's word through his paintings. The partners' first break came with an offer from the Bradford Exchange to put Thom's paintings on collectable plates. The success led to moving out of a garage and into an actual warehouse space. The three partners found their demographic: traditional Christian, unsophisticated people who couldn't afford to go into an art gallery, but who could afford Thom's paintings of light and hope.

Lightpost Publishing became Media Arts Group Inc. and moved into bigger quarters. Paintings be-

came limited prints in various sizes, the licensing business took off with Thom's images on everything from calendars to mugs to bookmarks, even on the cover of the Avon cosmetic catalog.

The money flowed like honey, and the three spent their earnings -- "There was always more to be had, more to take in, more to consume, more to want, and more to own."

Thom saw his vision come true--he visited presidents, popes and famous personalities. His presence at store openings brought crowds. Author Kuskey came on board with the company during the licensing period and became a friend of sorts to Kinkade. But the late night poker parties turned into a drinking contest, and it didn't take long for those in his inner circle to see how alcohol was Thom's demon.

The company's ups and downs, the lawsuits, the bankruptcy and Thom's death in 2012 are explored, as well as the breakup of his 30-year marriage that produced four daughters.

Thomas Kinkade wanted to paint. Period. His first fault was in trusting those around him completely to run his business. It's an amazing story of the downfall of a man whose company in 2001 passed the billion dollar threshold in total retail sales.
