

Whatever the case, when my parents suggested we head down to Springfield, Ill., to experience the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Museum, it was a no-brainer.

What I did not anticipate was that the museum, itself, is a knockout. Yes, there are the typical museum mainstays of mannequins and informational signs, but this is a feast for the mind and imagination: creative, witty and moving.

A little about the museum itself.

Plans to create not just the Abraham Lincoln Presiden-Museum, but also the library next to it, kicked off in 1990 with a feasibility study and comprehenplanning. sive More than \$30 million in state, federal and municipal dollars were in place by December 1998 when two architectural firms were hired. The idea was not to

lump everything into one building, but two sites: the library, where historical items could be studied and safely stored, and the museum, to tell their stories. Top Lincoln educators and historians gave input on the exhibits to ensure accuracy.

Workers broke ground for the library in 2001, then the museum in 2002. Also part of the project was restoring the 100-year-old former passenger-train station west of the museum.

The museum's dedication arrived in April 2005. President George W. Bush and First Lady Laura Bush, then-U.S. Sen. Barack Obama and about 25,000 guests from around the world attended.

Museum attendance over the years rapidly increased. It hit 1 million visitors in January 2007, then two million by July 2009. In August 2012, that figure leapt to three million.

Our group to the museum included my parents, Steve and Judi, my wife, Alice, and, of course, Will. We arrived mid-afternoon Saturday, July 5, a date intentionally chosen as a way to celebrate Independence Day weekend.

I expected mobs of people. Strangely enough, Springfield appeared deserted. Like, "I Am Leg-

end" deserted. Few signs life, with only a vehicle or two shattering the unnatural stillness. Granted, the Illinois legislature was not in session, but Springfield exhibited signs of a small Midwestern town whose inhabitants long abandoned A young couple we met later in the day told us locals typically head elsewhere for food and entertainment on a Saturday

night. Whether that explanation holds water remains to be seen, but it must suffice for now.

Inside the museum, thankfully, was another story. People from all over the country were bustling about, ready to explore. We encountered a woman at a table next to a sign that read, "Be a History Detective." It advised visitors to search for clues to answer case questions and potentially win a prize. Will signed up, grabbed his papers and joined us in the museum's center plaza...where his head practically exploded.

There it was. A replica of the White House, complete with mannequins astonishing in their detail of

Lincoln, his wife, Mary, and three of their children: Robert, Edward and Tad. We snapped Will's photo with the Lincoln family before he sprinted off, unable to contain his excitement. He strolled back and forth, taking it all in.


"This feels like I could *really* be in the White House," he said with hushed reverence.


My father, being the history professor of the group, told Will it would be best to experience the museum in the proper order, starting from the beginning. So, we switched gears and headed to the first exhibit: "Journey One: The Pre-Presidential Years." It actually is nine exhibits chronicling Lincoln's early days, from Kentucky to Washington, D.C.

No subject was left untouched, from Lincoln teaching himself to read, to plying flatboats, to working as a store clerk in New Salem to life in Springfield, first as a lawyer, then as his political career heated up.

Will responded to the immediacy of it, of seeing images he'd experienced only through books recreated in superb detail. For us as adults, it was the small touches that added poignancy to the displays. In one scene, we view Lincoln in his law office, his boys creating mischief around him. From a speaker we hear the playful sounds of laughter, of young boys giggling. Your heart breaks, knowing how much tragedy befell the Lincolns, their eldest son, Robert, being the only one to live a full life.

Far more devastating is the display "The Slave Auction," which features a family torn apart. The image is like a swift kick to the gut: a young boy lunges for his mother's dress as she is pulled in one direction and his father in another. Appearing above the image is a sign with one of Lincoln's most famous quotes: "As I would not be a slave, so I would not be a master. This expresses my idea of democracy."

All of "Journey One," however, is not as heavygoing. The wittiest segment is an imagining of Lincoln's 1860 campaign as if covered by modern-day journalists, complete with video monitors unveiling different aspects of the four-way race, all of it moderated by the late Tim Russert, who appeared for 16 years on "Meet the Press." Russert and crew never dumb down or satirize their subject. They treat it as if they're actually in 1860 covering the race. It's fascinating, and Will was riveted. The Internet may have sculpted how we get our news today, but television remains a key presence in the lives of children. What we experienced in that mock studio was instantly relatable.

Also part of "Journey One" are nice touches like the "Looking for Lincoln" signs, which indicate where in Illinois, Indiana or Kentucky each display is recreating.

The next stage of the tour, "Journey Two: The White House Years," is more emotional.

Upon entering the White House facade, we encountered Mary Lincoln being fitted for a ball gown, and surrounded by dresses her social rivals wore, complete with signs indicating the terrible things they said about her.

Other displays recreate Lincoln's cabinet reacting to the Emancipation Proclamation to his assassination at the Ford Theatre. There is a painting of the 54th Massachusetts Volunteer Infantry — the

"Glory" regiment depicted in the 1989 film — and its attack on Fort Wagner. A series of photo portraits reveals Lincoln each year he served as president. People talk about how gray President Obama has become over the course of two terms. It's nothing compared to the toll Lincoln's presidency took on him. With each passing picture, the lines deepen across his face, carving into him to where, by the time of his death, he was but 53, yet looked 15 to 20 years older.

Of local interest, a series of maps and photos chart the voyage of the Lincoln funeral train, including one stop in Michigan City.

Again, though, it is the multi-media presentations that vividly bring the period to life.

"The Whispering Gallery" features gossip mongers saying terrible things about the Lincolns. "The Civil War in 4 Minutes" features a huge screen that tallies the mounting casualties after each Civil War battle. It was here I noticed Will, seated and silent.

History was no longer words on a page. Lives were lost, men who were husbands and fathers. He was taking it all in.

"Journey Two" came to an end with "Holding on to Lincoln," letters and artifacts reiterating Lincoln's importance in American history. The letters, by the way, were penned by the likes of folk singer Pete Seeger and director Steven Spielberg, whose 2012 film "Lincoln" won two Oscars.

By that point, the museum was about 20 minutes from closing. It was time to select one more aspect of the museum to experience. We chose "Ghosts of the Library."

Wow.

An actor, seated in a glass-encased recreation of a library, reveals why preserving Lincoln's history through the museum and

library is important. The performance includes Holavision — holographic technology — to make it appear as if history is leaping off the pages of dusty old books. Everything is so beautifully choreographed,

it appears seamless. Real. State-of-the-art eye candy.

Our experience in Springfield did not end there. Over the course of the next 24 hours, we stopped at the Capitol Building, Lincoln's home and tomb and New Salem. Each stop could warrant its own article. It's too




Only 30 people will be chosen, and a diverse makeup is important to the program's success. The cost is \$900 and can be paid in installments. Some partial scholarships are available.

Farm to Table Tour, Dinner

Fernwood Botanical Garden and Nature Preserve, 13988 Range Line Road, Niles, Mich., again is offering a tour of local farms to learn about Community Supported Agriculture, a program in which farmers offer shares of farm-fresh products.



WEEK HISTORY



On July 24, 1866, following the Civil War, Tennessee became the first Confederate state to be readmitted to the Union.

On July 24, 1870, the first railroad car from the Pacific Coast reached New York, marking the beginning of transcontinental rail service.

On July 24, 1969, after completing the first manned landing on the Moon, the *Apollo 11* astronauts made a safe "splash-down" in the Pacific.

On July 25, 1866, Ulysses S. Grant, victorious Union general in the Civil War, was named to the five-star rank of "General of the Armies," the first officer to be so honored.

On July 25, 1885, Louis Pasteur inoculated the first human being against rabies. The patient, Joseph Meister, who was bitten by a rabid dog, later became superintendent of the Pasteur Institute.

On July 25, 1944, Bing Crosby and the Andrews Sisters recorded Cole Porter's popular "Don't Fence Me In."

On July 25, 1971, in Cape Town, South Africa, Dr. Christian Barnard successfully transplanted two lungs and a heart into a man.

On July 25, 1978, Louise Brown, the world's first "test tube baby," was born in Lancashire, England. She was conceived through in-vitro fertilization.

On July 26, 1908, U.S. Attorney General Charles Bonaparte issued an order creating an investigative agency that was a forerunner of the FBI.

On July 26, 1943, Rolling Stones lead singer Mick Jagger was born in Dartford, England.

On July 26, 1948, President Truman banned discrimination in the military and in federal employment.

On July 26, 1952, Eva Peron, wife of Argentine President Juan Peron, died, of cancer, at 33.

On July 26, 1958, England's Queen Elizabeth II proclaimed her son, Charles, to be the Prince of Wales.



"Until that phone call, it had been an ordinary day."

Ah, how quickly our lives can change.

"Your mother...she's not well...She's been imagining things — terrible, terrible things."

Daniel's dad, Chris, was crying over the phone as he relayed this message to his son in London. Daniel was a long way from his parents, who'd left London to retire to Sweden, the birthplace of his

mother, Tilde. They had been gone some months, and Daniel assumed all was well with the farm they purchased in a remote section of Sweden.

Actually, Daniel was avoiding his parents because he didn't know how they would take the news their only child is gay and living with his partner, Mark. Daniel always managed to push back repeated requests from his mother to visit them in Sweden, knowing he eventually would have to tell them what they might not want to hear.

A few emails from his mother were all he received since his parents left London: newsy ones recounting progress made on the farm and the garden she'd started. But then came the last cryptic email. Maybe.


Maybe not.

Despite the craziness of the conversation, Daniel withholds judgement and gives his mother a chance to further explain herself. After all, if she was truly insane, would the Swedish doctors have let her go? Daniel's father says he will stay in Sweden and



Daniel meets his mother at Heathrow. She is obviously paranoid, clutching a leather satchel that never leaves her side. She tells Daniel it contains all the proof she needs of what has happened in the months she has been in Sweden. Is this just paranoia or proof of something more hideous? Daniel is determined to find out the truth.

Sounding lucid for the first time, Tilde tells Daniel she must start at the beginning and work forward in time for him to understand what happened since the move to Sweden. And so begins Tilde's bizarre story. Her account is fascinating of the strange things she witnessed since the move, and all the accompanying paperwork she tucked away in her satchel.

But was it all the imagining of a sick mind? Or was she being systematically driven mad by Hakan, the strange man who lived down the road and wanted to buy Chris and Tilde's farm? He was a rich and influential man in a community with secrets of his own and a decidedly dark side.

I kept vacillating between believing Tilde and thinking her quite mad, unable to reach a conclusion until the last chapter. This is a fascinating read that will make you see that we should never be quick to judge things at face value. After all, there just might be a grain of truth in there somewhere. Maybe.

I loved this story! It's different and kept me engaged to the very end.
