On Eagle's Wings Two Long Beach Scouts Achieve Rarely Awarded Rank

Within the Boy Scouts of America, Eagle is the highest rank one can achieve. The Scout must fulfill requirements in three areas: leadership, service and outdoor skills, and all before his 18th birthday.

About 2 percent of those who enter Scouting earn the Eagle rank, the average age being 17.

Considering the dedication and work that go into achieving this rarely-awarded rank, it's all the more impressive that Troop 802 in Long Beach recently named not one, but two of its own. Ryan Bausback and Austin Pitchford, as Eagle Scouts. At 15 and 16, respectively, they achieved the status sooner than most other Scouts do. A ceremony was held at New Buffalo (Mich.) Town Hall.

"The overall completion rate for Scouts to reach Eagle is very low," said Rick Thalmann, Troop 802's Scoutmaster of eight years, "so it's great to see these boys complete this journey."

Troop 802 does have a completion rate higher than the national average, which Ryan's father, Henry, a Michigan City optometrist, attributes to the troop's small size, good Scoutmaster and high parental involvement.

Ryan Bausback, a Michigan City High School sophomore, has been involved with Scouting since first grade as a Tiger Cub Scout.

"My Dad was a Scout when he was younger, and he got me into Scouting. I had a lot of friends in it, too, so I stayed with it," Ryan said. "The idea of reaching Eagle kept me going. I thought, 'If I can make Eagle, I'll have completed this journey.'

"Of course, it's also just fun to be involved doing stuff outdoors and spending time with the troop. Camping is a huge part of it that I really enjoy."

Last year, Ryan journeyed to Philmont Scout Ranch, a 137,500-acre region of rugged wilderness in northern New Mexico and the mecca of Boy Scout camping. He spent two weeks hiking and camping in various types of terrain.

"You carry all your food and equipment on your back the whole way," he said.

The group covered approximately 75 miles though the back country.

To become an Eagle, boys must earn 21 merit badges — some required, some elective — hold a leadership position within the troop for six months and complete a service project they design, plan and execute themselves.

Along the road to Eagle, Ryan earned 42 badges. "My favorite was scuba diving. I did it during the summer in Elkhart. I got certified as a junior diver," he said.

"I also liked wilderness survival. For that one, you go into the woods with pretty much nothing and have to build a shelter and cook a meal to get you through the night."

Ryan served as the troop's quartermaster, ensuring the equipment and supply trailer were maintained and ready for the next adventure. For his service project, he constructed an outdoor shelter outside of Sand Castle Shelter for Homeless Families.

"I thought it would be a good idea so people staying there would have a nice place to spend time outdoors," Ryan said.

Austin Pitchford, a sophomore at La Lumiere, says his father also was the reason for him joining the Scouts at an early age.

"It was slow at the start, but once I got into Boy Scouts, I was able to do more camping and it was really fun," he said. "I knew then that I wanted to reach Eagle. For me, it was a personal achievement. I knew that I wanted to earn it, and that if I worked hard, I could."

Austin earned 51 badges on his way to Eagle.

"I love the water. My family goes diving every year, so scuba diving was one of my favorites to get. I also really liked getting 'lifesaving,' and gaining the skills to be a rescue swimmer."

Within the troop, Austin served as senior patrol leader. His responsibilities included setting up the campouts, organizing with the quartermaster, maintaining order among the Scouts and acting as liaison between the Scouts and Scoutmaster to make activities the troop was interested in become reality.

"It's time to pass the torch so the other Scouts can hold those leadership positions on their own journeys to Eagle," Ryan said.

At the ceremony, Scouts present "Mentor" awards to recognize those who, along with their parents — who receive their own recognition — significantly influenced them.

Ryan presented his to Scoutmaster Thalmann, in part because "he always stressed service." Austin honored his uncle, Tim.

"My service project was to rebuild an old beach lookout in New Buffalo that had been totally covered by about 2 feet of sand," he said. "After we cleared all the sand, we replaced the old boards, spindles and railings. We also built a bench in the lookout, and added a wheelchair ramp. The new lookout has more seating and picnic tables than it did before. I have to thank New Buffalo for funding the project, and City Manager (William) Geisler for all his personal help with the carpentry."

Even though they've earned Scouting's highest rank, both boys plan on staying in Scouting for the fun and adventure. School, however, will move up on the priority list as they consider life after high school. "My Uncle Tim spent more than 20 years in the Marines, and he's shaped my perspective on life. It sounds a little cliché, but I learned from him the value of not taking life for granted, and living it to the fullest."

Though both are still in high school, Ryan has an interest in film and will attend a week-long camp at the University of Chicago this summer to pursue that interest. Austin is set on joining the Marines.

"Scouting is really about teaching leadership," Ryan explained. "You learn the wilderness skills, but it's also about service and finding the time to get involved, not just now, but every day."

Eagle **R**ank

The following requirements are listed on the Boy Scouts of America website to achieve Eagle status:

1. Be active in your troop, team, crew or ship for at least six months after achieving Life Scout.

2. Demonstrate you live by the principles of the Scout Oath and Scout Law in your daily life.

3. Earn a total of 21 merit badges (10 more than you already have), including: First Aid;

Citizenship in the Community; Citizenship in the Nation; Citizenship in the World; Communication; Cooking; Personal Fitness; Emergency Preparedness or Lifesaving; Environmental Science or Sustainability; Personal Management; Swimming or Hiking or Cycling; Camping; Family Life.

4. While a Life Scout, serve actively in your unit six months in one or more of the following positions of responsibility.

 Boy Scout troop. Patrol leader, assistant senior patrol leader, senior patrol leader, Venture patrol leader, troop guide, Order of the Arrow troop representative, den chief, scribe, librarian, historian, quartermaster, junior assistant Scoutmaster, chaplain aide, instructor, webmaster or Leave No Trace trainer.

Varsity Scout team. Captain, co-captain, program manager, squad leader, team secretary, Order of the Arrow team representative, librarian, historian, quartermaster, chaplain aide, instructor, den chief, webmaster or Leave No Trace trainer.

• Venturing crew/ship. President, vice president, secretary, treasurer, quartermaster, historian, den chief, guide, boatswain, boatswain's mate, yeoman, purser, storekeeper, webmaster or Leave No Trace trainer.

5. While a Life Scout, plan, develop and give leadership to others in a service project helpful to any religious institution, school or community. (The project must benefit an organization other than Boy Scouting.)

6. Take part in a unit leader conference.

7. Successfully complete an Eagle Scout board of review.

"I Hate Hamlet

Whether you love Shakespeare or wonder why others do, Footlight Players' latest comedy, Paul Rudnick's "I Hate Hamlet," promises to please with comedy and action.

The play runs June 6-8 and 12-15 at Footlight Theatre, 1705 Franklin St.

The story revolves around successful TV actor Andrew Rally (Patrick Watterson), who has a rich, beautiful girlfriend, a glamorous, devoted agent, the perfect New York apartment and the chance to play Hamlet in Central Park.

All is not well in paradise, however. Andrew's series has been canceled. His girlfriend, Dierdre (Calla Holmes-Robbins), is clinging to her virginity with unyielding conviction. Worse, he has no desire to play Hamlet.

His last Footlight role was as musical director for "You're a Good Man, Charlie Brown!" Holmes-Robbins has appeared in several Footlight productions.

West is a 1999 Michigan City High School gradu-

ate who honed his musical-theater skills at school and at Dunes Summer Theater before a two-year stint with the Serious Play! Theater Ensemble in Northampton, Mass.





Median sale price is down significantly (\$254,000 2014 versus \$290,000 2013). Total \$Volume is up a bit (46.3 million in 2014 versus \$44.4 million for 2013). The fat part of the bell curve is marginally better (\$160,000 to \$599,000 for 2014 versus \$120,000 to \$449,000 for 2013).

The expireds (did not sell during listing period) continue to perplex me. Every year in the past five the expireds outnumbered the solds by a pretty significant margin. Some brokers tell me that agents purposefully allow the listings to expire and then put them back on the market 30 days later as a "fresh" listing. Very weird in a marketplace that keeps track of the property sales history. Why not just price the property to sell the first time out?

My favorite part of this report is that I believe that we passed the worst of the market downturn. Between 2010 and 2012, the number of sales ranged between 75 and 90. The past two years have been significantly higher. We had 117 sales in 2013 and 133 sales in 2014. The total \$Volume dipped to \$27.1 million in 2010-2011. 2012-2013 had \$44.4 million \$Volume and 2013-2014 had \$46.3 million \$Volume.








Safe Water Boating Tips

Indiana conservation officers are offering tips for a safe summer on the water.

Officers, who will patrol Indiana waterways this summer, encourage boaters to become familiar with state boating laws and follow certain safety tips:

- Always wear a life jacket.
- Never sit on the gunwale (sides) of a motorboat while in motion.
- Do not ride on the bow decking of a motorboat while in motion.
- Never tow a skier or tuber without an observer.
- Pay attention to marker buoys and idle zone restricted areas.
- If older than 21, consume alcoholic beverages in moderation (0.08 is the legal limit).
- Use navigational lights and anchor lights between sunset and sunrise.
- Obey the night speed limit of 10 mph on all inland lakes.

Indiana had 58 open-water drownings in 2013, according to the most recent available statistic. Many drownings are preventable by wearing a life jacket.



<u>Vintage</u> by Susan Gloss (hardcover, \$25.99 in bookstores and online)

Ladies, I owe you a big apology!

I have been so hung up with mysteries and historical reads, I have not reviewed a good woman's fiction read in some time.

(I really don't like the term "chick lit." It sounds derogatory.)

Well, that's about to change as I introduce you to this charming story — only 308 pages, small by today's standards — about a dream come true that soon turns into a quagmire of legal nightmares and

a visit from a past Violet Turner thought she left behind.

We're in Madison, Wis., for this story, home of the University of Wisconsin, where Violet has rented a storefront in a good location with good foot traffic and not far from the university. She has come from northern Wisconsin to start over after a marriage gone sour. The man she thought she knew through high school decided his life was at the bottom of a whiskey bottle, and Violet, now 38, makes the break from him and decides to follow her own dreams of owning a vintage clothing shop.

They say clothes make the man, (although today, I suppose) it would be more politically correct to say "person" — but my point is that clothes also make a story. To prove that point, author Susan Gloss starts off each chapter with an item for sale in her shop. Consider this:

"INVENTORY ITEM: wedding gown

"APPROXIMATE DATE: 1952

"ITEM DESCRIPTION: Ivory, tea-length gown with scooped neckline and cap sleeves. Silk taffeta with crinoline understructure.

"SOURCE: Dress acquired from the couple's daughter"

And so, a young girl named April enters Violet's life. She purchased the dress from Hourglass Vintage recently and now wants to return it. The wedding apparently is off.

Although Violet doesn't do refunds, there is something about April that touches her, getting the 18-year-old to tell of her pregnancy and broken engagement. When April tells of her college studies and math skills, well, she just might be what the

Next to enter Violet's life is Amithi Singh, the Indian-born lady bringing in a beautiful silk sari she wanted to sell. There will be more, she tells Violet. Af-

ter decades of housekeeping and child rearing, she found her husband was cheating on her. Time to cast off the old and build a new life for herself. Her sewing skills just might be that outlet.

Each chapter brings a new item for the store and an interesting, sometimes sad, sometimes happy remembrance of where it came from and how it affected the life of the owner. The three women find friendship, hope and a renewal of faith, that maybe when one door closes, another really does open. And sometimes legal issues and an ex-drunken husband shatter that thought to hell.

The need to raise a lot of money sees Violet make the radical decision to hold a vintage fashion show, using the clothing from her store and all shapes and sizes of women for models, including some drag queens from a local club. That certainly makes for an interesting night!

This is an endearing story, maybe nothing new in subject matter, except for the writing style of Gloss, who puts the characters right next to you in an intimate setting that makes you care for them and want them to succeed.

Need some "me time," ladies? Grab this book, a tall iced tea and head for the sun!


