## Sister Act Chicago Playuright's Religious Comedies Resonate With All Audiences

Vicki Quade grew up in Chicago's southwest suburbs, in what she describes as a "very Catholic household" and a community populated mostly by Catholics and Lutherans.

People of other faiths rarely crossed her path. She was well into her teens when she met someone who wasn't Catholic or Lutheran. She attended Catholic school and came to know the nuns well. The nuns, in fact, frequently borrowed one of her family's cars. They'd walk over to her house and tap on a window to signal their arrival, never standing on the porch or coming inside.

"We would hear, tap tap tap, on the dining room window and my mom would say, 'Oh, the nuns are



here. Go give them the keys'."

Quade followed her mother's instructions, yet wondered why the parish priest, who was good friends with her family, often came over for dinner and conversation, yet the nuns did not.

That sparked a curiosity in Quade who, as an adult, has created a cottage industry of religious comedies, the most popular being "Late Nite Catechism" (1993), which she co-wrote with Maripat Donovan and is Chicago's longest-running religious comedy.

Her hit comedy "Put the Nuns in Charge!," which celebrates its 10th anniversary in 2015, arrives in

Get to know Quade, and it's clear there is no ill will in her mission as playwright. She has great

affection for her faith, and her humor is gentle and good-natured. Take, for example, her childhood observations of Catholics and Lutherans. "Lutherans," she says, "were very much into Jell-O molds after Mass. Catholics loved pancake breakfasts."

Quade's career began not in theater, but in journalism, writing for daily newspapers, national magazines and many Chicago publications. She also was a Newsweek correspondent for 10 years. She was a contributor to the Chicago Sun-Times millennium book, "20th Century Chicago: 100 Years, 100 Voices" and wrote the biography "I Remember Bob Collins," the WGN-Radio personality killed in a February 2000 plane crash.

Her career also alternated between producing acting and playwriting.

She's produced her own shows, along with men-

talist Christopher Carter (2002-2005), "Forever Plaid" (2003), the improv comedy "Cast on a Hot Tin Roof" (2004) and the political work "Verbatim Verboten" (2004 and 2009), which opened off-off-Broadway in 2009 and is still at WorkShop Theater Co. In 2005, she produced the U.S. debut of Australian playwright Stephen House's "Drapes" at Chicago's Victory Gardens Theatre.

In radio, she's had a strong creative relationship with radio host Jerry Agar, creating with him the talk radio parody "You're On the Air." She's written movie reviews and can be seen on YouTube as a movie-reviewing nun called Sister Cinematica.

As a performer, she's done everything from "Portraits: Stories of Hope and Survival" as part of the Chicago Foundation for Women's 2007 anti-violence campaign "What Will It Take?" to appearing in the "All the Women You Want" comedy festival at Los Manos Gallery.

Her original works include "Room for Advancement" (1994), "Mr. Nanny" (1997) and "Here Come the Famous Brothers" (2001).

It is her religious comedies, though, that have solidified her presence within the Chicago theater community and beyond. In addition to "Late Nite Catechism" and "Put the Nuns in Charge!," she has "Sunday created School Cinema," focus the being


movies and religions, "Saints & Sinners," about church fundraising schemes, and the holiday show "Mother Superior's Ho-Ho-Holy Night." Her Bingo comedies include "Bible Bingo," "Christmas Bingo," "Movie Bingo," "Convent Bingo" and "Saints & Sin-



ners Bingo." Her monologue show is called "C h a n g i n g Habits: The Nun Monologues."

Quade says "Late Nite Catechism," which debuted in May 1993 at Chicago's Live Bait Theater, was an homage to the nuns she knew as a child. The one-woman show involved an actress playing Sister, with the audience serving as her classroom. Its original run was set for 12 performances over a six-week period at Live Bait.



"I wasn't even sure we could fill 12 performances," Quade said. By Vicki Quade & Maripat Donovan "I thought, 'Who will

come see this show?' It was funny to me. It was funny to all of us working on the show, but who would have thought it would be the big hit that it was."

Just how popular has "Late Nite Catechism" become? Well, one of its goals is to donate proceeds to support retired nuns in need. It was reported in December 2012 that the franchise has generated more than \$2 million to its cause.

Quade invited nuns, priests, monks and deacons to see the play to make sure, she said, that it had "the religious part down pat." Her mother and her bridge club even attended the show...and loved it.

The reason why "Late Nite Catechism," "Put the Nuns in Charge!" and her other works connect with audiences, Quade said, is simple.

"They are smart. They are funny. They are not at all offensive, or mocking the Church in any way," she said. "They really are memory plays that put you back in the third grade.

"They're respectful of the faith and what the nuns did to educate us. Once we established that, people realized these were the kinds of shows that you can bring your mother and your kids to, that you can recommended to other people."

The other surprise, Quade said, has been the way people of all faiths have enjoyed the shows.

"If you're not Catholic or you didn't have a nun in your life, you certainly know the nun character in modern society, or at the very least you had a strong female teacher or coach in your life who was responsible for helping discipline or educate you," she said.

"You know exactly who the character is."

Quade recalls a woman from Montana who attended "Bible Bingo" in Chicago with her husband, The two were looking for clean, fun entertainment. They were so impressed by the show, the woman handed her card to Quade afterward, then said she intended to recommend it to others.

Once, Quade said, a Muslim woman covered from head to toe in Islamic dress attended one of her shows, afterward thanking her and saying how much she enjoyed it.

The focus of "Put the Nun in Charge!" is the Seven Deadly Sins. Anger, for example, is equated to road rage and pride to makeup and dress.

"It's really a wonderfully funny show that takes a look at the teaching methods nuns use," Quade said.

Like "Late Nite Catechism," the audience becomes the nun's classroom. Those who don't want to get involved should not feel pressured to do so.

"If you don't want to interact, don't raise your hand," Quade said with a laugh. "We are not out to torture people. People don't have to worry too much. They won't be put on stage. However, after a while, people really do get into it."

The actress portraying the nun during the Michigan City performance is Lisa Braatz, a St. Louis University theater graduate who has performed in the Chicago area for more than 10 years, particularly in Quade's productions. "Lisa is very Catholic," Quade said, "so she understands the faith, and she understands what it means to audience members to see her up there.

"She has a good rapport with the audience and great improv skills. She's quick on her feet. I think people are going to be really happy with her performance."



## "Crimes of the Heart"

"Crimes of the Heart," Beth Henley's Pulitzer Prize-winning comedy, marks the first show of the Canterbury Summer Theatre season, running Wednesday through Saturday, June 18-21, at Mainstreet Theatre, 807 Franklin St.

This year's company hails from Texas, Louisiana, Montana, Oklahoma, Illinois, Indiana and Illinois.

Three of the four principal actresses in "Crimes of the Heart" come from Texas to join a Northwest Indiana actress for the bittersweet tale set in Hazlehurst, Miss., where the three Magrath sisters gather in the family home to await news of their grandfather's sad demise. The trio must face the difficult realities of growing up and growing older.

The eldest Magrath sister, Lenny, is played by Rachel Livingston, a theater graduate from Indiana University-Bloomington. Meg is played by Sarah Wisterman, a senior at Stephen F. Austin University in Nacogdoches, Texas. She will begin a professional apprenticeship this fall with Chicago's Porchlight Theatre. Babe is played by Rebecca Hayes, also from Texas who is now a professional actress living and working in Chicago.

The cast also includes Cousin Chick, played by Allison Day, also a Stephen F. Austin student, and two Chicago actors, Roy Brown as Doc Porter and James Mueller as Lloyd Barnett.

The show is directed and lit by David Graham of Chicago — and a Texas native — and designed by Ray Scott Crawford (Louisiana). Graham and Crawford are longtime Canterbury veterans: Crawford is the artistic director and Graham the associate artistic director. Emily Dollar (Louisiana) will stage manage. Costumes are by Samantha Rogers (Louisiana), while Matthew Lorenz (Louisiana) will design properties. Leah Mazur (Oklahoma) is the technical director.

Tickets are \$15 on Wednesday and Thursday and \$16 on Friday and Saturday. Senior, group and student discounts are available, as well as group luncheon/dinner theater packages. 





## **Curbside Recycling Changes**

Styrofoam and plastic shopping bags and films are no longer being accepted by La Porte County's curbside recycling program.

Residents, however, still have an option to at least recycle plastic bags and films by bringing them back to a store that will accept them.

During a tour last month of the Materials Recovery Facility in Homewood, Ill., where all of La Porte County's recyclables are sorted, La Porte County Solid Waste District staffers and two members of its Citizens Advisory Committee were told the facility is not accepting any plastic films or Styrofoam for recycling. Those items were included in the district's recycling program since its inception in 1993, said Alicia Ebaugh, education and public outreach coordinator, but evolving recycling markets have dictated the change.

"The MRF has a way of dealing with those items, but they are being taken to a landfill," she said.

Styrofoam products will need to be placed in the trash, but there is an alternative for recycling plastic shopping bags and films, Ebaugh said. They can be taken to public-recycling points at local Walmart, Meijer, Kroger or Lowe's stores. Menards will accept plastic bags at the customer service counter.

"We also have plastic bag recycling events at Al's stores each November for America Recycles Day, where we swap your plastic bags for a reusable one," Ebaugh said.

Residents also can include these additional plastic bags and films with shopping bags (all items must be clean and dry): newspaper bags, produce bags, bread bags, case wrap for bottled water, wrap from napkin, paper towel and toilet paper packages, and wrap from diaper packages

The reason grocery stores and big box stores are accepting plastic bags and films while MRFs are not is simply a matter of cleanliness, Ebaugh said.

"Plastics collected at grocery and big box stores are relatively clean and already separated out from the waste stream," she said. "The ones that come in commingled with other recyclables at the MRF become more contaminated and are not as good of quality, so buyers of used plastic bags and films like Hilex Poly really only want to get them from the stores directly."



**Students Care for Roxana Marsh** 

Fifty students from East Chicago Lighthouse Charter School returned to Roxana Marsh to continue a project they started two years ago to learn about the marsh, restoration and stewardship.

The event was hosted by Indiana Department of Natural Resources, Illinois-Indiana Sea Grant, Indiana Department of Environmental Management, The Nature Conservancy and Michigan City's Shirley Heinze Land Trust.

Two years ago, the same students celebrated the remediation and restoration of Roxana Marsh and the West Branch of the Grand Calumet River by planting native species along the marsh. Their latest efforts involved removing invasive plants and picking up litter.

The overall project started in 2008 when Indiana natural resource co-trustees at DNR and IDEM partnered with USEPA Great Lakes National Program Office under its Great Lakes Legacy Act program to carry out remediation and restoration along the West Branch Grand Calumet River in Hammond and East Chicago, and completing the initial projects (between Hohman Avenue and Indianapolis Boulevard), including Roxana Marsh, in 2012. The DNR and TNC are working to ensure successful establishment of the restoration work started under the Legacy Act project for the next several years. 



## State Park to Restore Rare Habitat

Indiana Dunes State Park will restore 32 acres of rare oak savanna habitat as part of a larger effort involving state and federal governments and a Northwest Indiana conservation group.

An additional 1,045 acres of black oak savanna will be restored in Indiana Dunes National Lakeshore. Partners in the project are the state park, national lakeshore, the Department of Natural Resources Division of Nature Preserves and Save the Dunes.

Work will begin this summer and continue through next summer.

Black oak savanna is a disappearing ecosystem. It's estimated fewer than 0.02 percent of high quality oak savanna remains in the Midwest, a region that used to have an abundance of this ecosystem.

The oak savannas being restored are near trails 9 and 10 in the state park and in the Miller Woods and Tolleston Dunes units of the national lakeshore.

The remnant black oak savanna in the Indiana Dunes is threatened by invasive plant species that limit the growth of native wildflowers and grasses. A savanna is unique because its trees are sparsely distributed, allowing growth of native wildflowers and grasses that require abundant sunlight.

The project will benefit native wildlife and plants. In particular, it will benefit the Karner blue butterfly that relies exclusively on oak savanna plants for survival. In recent years, the Karner blue butterfly population has drastically declined. Researchers are trying to isolate the cause. Until one is found, the national lakeshore is completing the project to ensure the best possible conditions for the species, as well as other species that rely on the oak savanna.

During the restorations, visitors may notice equipment, woody debris piles and periodic noise. It may become necessary to close trails for a day or more to ensure visitor safety.



Late summer is an ideal time to visit the island because most of the mosquitoes are gone, and the weather is warm during the day and cool at night. Late summer wildflowers and berries are present, including blueberries and thimbleberries.

### **DNR: Leave Fawns Alone**

This is peak season for encountering white-tailed deer fawns. Anyone who comes across one that appears to be abandoned, leave it alone.

That's according to the Indiana Department of Natural Resources, which said a mother deer will leave a fawn during the day, both to look for food and so her scent doesn't attract predators to the animal, which is nearly scentless.

People often mistake a fawn as abandoned when, in fact, it is being properly cared for by its mother.

If encountering a fawn, give it distance. The mother will not return if humans are present, which may delay nursing for a hungry fawn. Most often, the mother will return at night or when no predators are nearby. White-tailed deer view humans as predators.

Anyone who feels compelled to intervene should call a licensed wildlife rehabilitator. Keeping a wild animal without the proper permits is illegal. Most people are not trained in animal nutrition and do not know how to raise a wild animal without it developing a dependence on humans. The result is an animal that cannot survive in the wild.

This book by a Northwest Indiana author might best be understood and appreciated by us "Golden Girls" and their mature daughters, although anyone looking for a gentle read will appreciate the modern subject matter.

Hooray to Betty and her bid for independence, and a better understanding of her daughter and their relationship.
