Their owners, people who might call themselves "motorheads," are part of an informal gathering of automobile enthusiasts who meet every Tuesday night in the Al's Supermarket parking lot at 3535 Franklin St. in Michigan City.

These mechanical wonders must be seen, and heard, to be believed. Their owners love sharing them with the public and relating stories about their histories to anyone who drops by on a summer evening.

This particular group has been meeting for many years. They've gathered in several locations around town, with 2013 marking the first year at Al's. When the former meeting place no longer was available, group member Dennis Schultz approached Al's store manager Gary Rusboldt and sold him on the idea of letting the group meet weekly in the parking

lot during the summer.

Rusboldt speaks glowingly about his decision to let the group meet at his store. Each week, his parking lot takes on a "festival atmosphere." Large crowds are drawn by the eclectic collection of vintage steel. Many truly are works of art on wheels.

To enhance the festival atmosphere, Rusboldt and the crew at Al's Deli put together special meal packages for anyone who would like to snack as they stroll through the colorful aisles of classic vehicles. He says some people even call ahead to see what will be on the menu for the night. Folks from the deli set up a grill in the parking lot and sell hot dogs, chips and drinks to add to the festive atmosphere.

Curiously, this gathering of car owners and those who appreciate finely crafted road machines has no official name, and there is no one person in charge. They just like to gather weekly with others who enjoy the hobby and catch up on car repair and customizing techniques, or just chat about life in general. From April to October, when the weather is dry, the cars begin arriving as early as 3 p.m., Rusboldt said. The early birds claim prime spots under the trees and in the grassy areas that border Franklin Street, setting up folding chairs and popping the tops on cold drinks as they sit back, relax and enjoy each other's company, as well as the young and old alike who stroll through the lanes of parked cars admiring their amazing machines.

cars were sold this way during World War II and were painted in such a way to avoid being spotted from the air by enemy aircraft.

Jaskiewicz calls the evenings "quiet gatherings," and that can be the case until one of the car owners is cajoled by spectators into starting his engine and revving it up. Of course, this delights all of the men and boys in the crowd. There is nothing that gets the blood stirring like the rumble and roar of a powerful, finely tuned internal combustion engine and the occasional squeal of tires on pavement.

A walk through the gathering can

bring back memories of years gone by. There are fins and hood ornaments, running boards and grills that are unique to eras when it seemed Americans lived with more style than we have now. Think Zoot suits, spats, pocket watches and cuff links.

As you look here and there, you might recognize a car that reminds you of the Chevy you purchased with money from your first job, or you might spot your grandfather's old Ford or be reminded of the Dodge your family took on that well-remembered

vacation back in 1959. One is struck by how large a role the automobile has played in our lives over the years. When we were teens, they represented freedom, then a means to get to work and vacation, then later in life, perhaps they became a symbol of

status

Looking around the crowded lot on a Tuesday evening, you could see cars from the 1920s to the present, some in various stages of restoration and some lovingly complete and restored to their original condition. Some owners have painstakingly researched original paint colors. Others have added bright colored hues and flames to decorate the chariot of their dreams.

Many of the vehicles were restored to their original condi-

tion with new parts made from original blueprints, but some can be called nothing but just plain "hot," like the 1927 Ford Roadster owned by Lee Parrett. His machine was new from the ground up. It has the body of a 1927 Ford, but that is where the similarities end. A 307 Chevy engine powers the machine, and it has long, low sleek lines. He enjoys sharing the ride with his grandson and driving as fast as the law allow down local roadways.

The June 17 gathering featured bullet-shaped Ford Thunderbirds, curvy Chryslers, even a canary yellow Corvair that, it might be remembered, was proclaimed to be a vehicle "unsafe at any speed" by Ralph Nader back in 1965. Tuesday night, however, it looked sleek, clean and ready to roll.

Some of the vehicles have restored interiors with leather seats, like Ralph Richardson's 1949 maroon Plymouth. Richardson points out the hood ornament shaped like a ship running before a storm and the many instances of the ship motif used in decorating the original car.



Hood ornaments, all but nonexistent today's generic-looking, bland, boxy vehicles, were a statement back in the day. And

a study could be made of the many unique designs that adorned the vehicles at the gathering: all shiny, polished and reflecting the rays of the sun. Some performed a function such as indicating radiator water level, but others were made just for fun and depict flying planes, birds, rockets and ships at sea.

So for an evening of fun, come out to Al's parking lot on a Tuesday evening this summer. Things really kick into high gear by around 5 p.m. The "rides" here take you back to your youth, maybe even inspire you to share with grandchildren stories of the old rattletrap Ford that was your grandfather's first vehicle.

It's all here.

#### HotHouse Events at Lakeside Inn

The non-profit arts group HotHouse will present two cultural programs this weekend in Lakeside Inn's ballroom and studios, including the latest in the Jazz on a Summer's Day series.

The first, at 7 p.m. EDT Saturday, June 28, is a program exploring the history and future plans for House of David in Benton Harbor, Mich. RJ Taylor will speak and give a slide presentation. He has been a member of the religious community since 1974, and is an artist and caretaker there.

By 1906, The House of David colony soon had several hundred members and owned about 1,000 acres in Benton Harbor. It harvested fruit from a dozen orchards and cultivated grain. The commune had its own cannery, carpenter shop, coach factory, tailor shop and steam laundry. It also owned and operated an electricity plant, providing lighting to the community. It had three brass bands, two orchestras and a zoological garden. The baseball team toured nationally and was legendary in its own right. The amusement park drew thousands of visitors and is being reintroduced this year as a new attraction to the area.



At 4 p.m. EDT Sunday, June 29, The Saalik Ziyad Connective will perform as part of Jazz on a Summer's Day.

The group will focus on original compositions written by Ziyad featuring music influenced by his global travels. Featured in the instrumentation are the oud and the sitar. Ziyad, whose style and voice range from jazz to classical, will appear with:

- Alex Wing a guitarist, bassist, oud player and creative musician living and working in Chicago.
- Taalib-Din Ziyad a bass baritone vocalist, flutist, composer and poet.
- Shantah Nurullah a storyteller and musician who plays bass, sitar and percussion.
- Dushun Mosley percussionist and band leader.
- Edward Wilkerson Jr. an American jazz composer, arranger, musician and educator based in Chicago.

#### **ARTigras Shifts Focus to Emphasize Local Artists**

For the past two years, ARTigras has showcased all kinds of art from more than 100 artists from across the country.

This year, however, the festival has taken a different approach.

"We felt really passionately about making this festival about the artists in New Buffalo and the surrounding areas," said Cathi Rogers, New Buffalo Business Association execu-

tive director. "So, instead of focusing on quantity, we decided to focus on quality, on making sure that we were showcasing what our region has to offer instead of trying to fill spots."

The annual event is from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. EDT Saturday and Sunday, June 28-29, on Merchant and Thompson streets in downtown New Buffalo, with artists' booths lining the streets.

Starting in March and April, the NBBA puts out a call to artists through various outlets: newspapers, emails, websites and word of mouth. After submitting an application, a committee reviews the applications for the artists' qualities and bodies of work, and to make sure the festival has an equal distribution of mediums. The artists' booths this year will

feature a wide variety of talents, including handmade jewelry, wood carving, sculptures, paintings and pottery.

"We are so pleased that all of the artists participating this year are within a 30-mile radius," Rogers said. "And when we were able to increase the numbers from 40 to 60 artists, we couldn't have been more thrilled. It's the best way to showcase the artists that we have in our community. There are a lot of really nice quality galleries in the area, and so we are doing what we can to promote those galleries this year."

Aside from the 60 artist booths, the NBBA plans to spearhead a new attraction: artist demonstrations. Visitors can watch the artists while in their creative zones. Local bands and singers will provide live entertainment for guests on both days, while restaurants also are part of the event.

For years, folks in Michigan City have been clamoring for a revitalization of the city's once bustling downtown. The Franklin Square area, at one time full of shoppers and diners, has found itself suffering what so many other small American downtowns have suffered during the past few decades: the suburban shopping mall.

The people who once loved to meander through the downtown shops and restaurants quickly learned it was much more convenient to head to the mall, where everything was under one huge roof.

The demise of the family owned shoe store or dress shop came swiftly and changed the footprint of the downtown.

Lately, however, there has been resurgence. The quaint, fun downtown has made a comeback because folks miss being able to stroll down the street and hear music from inside a storefront mixed with the low rumble of shoppers talking to each other.


Thanks to the advent of the Uptown Arts District, Franklin Square is bustling again and promises to resemble the downtown of old. Popular art galleries, packed little restaurants and boutique shops are on their way back, as is the popularity of Michigan City's downtown.

The Uptown Arts District has exploded onto the scene over the last year. Through the amazing efforts of local artists, businesses and Michigan City Mainstreet Association, the Uptown Arts District is an evolving collaboration of commerce, camaraderie and creativity.

Artspace Uptown Artist Lofts is a 44-unit live/work space for artists and their families that begins development in 2015. The ground floor will become commercial space for businesses and art galleries. Greater yet is that the Uptown Arts District already is seeing signs of art-driven economic renewal.

Adding to the downtown is the Michigan City Public Art Committee and Mayor Ron Meer, who recently announced the addition of six more pieces of sculpture to the Scuptfusion exhibit. The sculptures contribute to the beautification of Michigan City and highlight the vitality of the Uptown Arts District, Washington Park and other high visibility locations within the city.

The result of a master plan commissioned by the committee, Sculptfusion is a major sculpture tour featured in Michigan City. The six new sculptures were selected from nearly 25 artworks submitted by artists from across the United States. There are

now 14 sculptures in the district and will be on display for two years.

New businesses are joining existing businesses that are bringing vitality back into the historic downtown. Printers, hair salon, live theater and so many new restaurants are now here, we have lost count. Take you choice. There is fine dining, Caribbean, Mediterranean, microbrewery/restaurant, Irish and good old American cuisine. Several new restaurants are in various stages of development and soon will join the Uptown Arts District, helping make Michigan City a dining destination. We are so lucky to have many unique boutiques, bakeries, live theater and consignment shops...all nestled on the shores of Indiana's Ocean (Lake Michigan).

"Events, events, events...do we have events, yes we do," said Amy Riehle, who is a Michigan City Mainstreet Association board member. First Friday art walks have been going on for two years, and they are gaining more momentum each month. You could hardly get down the streets in June. First Friday is a family friendly event for the senses. Each

"This year, the MCMA was pleased to host two days (Aug. 1-2) of flavors from over 15 local restaurants, a local wine and brew garden...and great entertainment."

Throughout the year, MCMA and the Uptown Art District host other events as well.

Winter wonderland is an opportunity to promote the great holiday shopping and art opportunities alive in the Uptown Arts District while encouraging community and family fun. The downtown churches host the Stained Glass Tour during this event. The churches have some of the finest historic stained glass in the region. Families also can enjoy the "12 Shops of Christmas" and Halloween in the UAD.

After the holidays, MCMA hosts the Uptown Fashion Affair where you can see all the latest men and women's fashions from local retailers and styling from Uptown Arts District's salons and spas.

This summer, there's also Movies in Washington Park, with films shown at the Jaycee Stage in Washington Park starting at dusk. Film nights are July 25 and Aug. 15.

Check out as well the lovely new street furniture featuring black street signs, park benches, light poles, waste containers and bike racks in the Uptown Arts District.

His track "Vineyard Groove" was licensed by Microsoft to use as the theme song for the release of its new EBS server product. Hobby Lobby bought 30,000 copies of his Christmas CD, "We Three Strings," to sell in its stores.

Since then, she has transformed and expanded programs offered at the A.K. Smith Career Center in Michigan City and at area high schools. She has worked with Ivy Tech, Purdue University-North Central and Vincennes University to expand dual-credit opportunities in a variety of disciplines, and has established partnerships with regional business and industry.

Under her leadership, new La Porte County CTE programs have been established in Criminal Justice, Early Childhood and Advanced Manufacturing, and a Health Careers Academy was expanded. Last summer, the Automotive Technology program received national accreditation, and in October a partnership was formed with the Indiana/Kentucky/Ohio Council of Carpenters that provides direct entry into apprenticeships for students pursuing construction technology.

Next fall, an Energy Academy will be offered in partnership with NIPSCO, preparing students for jobs in the electronics, energy and utility industries. The academy is based on a new curriculum pathway Peterson created: the first in Indiana. Other offerings in development include Transportation/Distribution/Logistics, Fire Science and EMS and Horticulture.

La Porte County CTE programs serve students from seven area high schools, including La Crosse, La Porte, Michigan City, New Buffalo, Mich., New Prairie, South Central and Westville.



#### **Deep River Grinders**


The Deep River Grinders will face off against the Long Nines, Springfield, Ill., at 2 p.m. Sunday, June 29, at Deep River County Park.

#### Off the Book Shelf

Three Brothers by Peter Ackroyd (hardcover, 26.96 in bookstores and online)


Trolling the bookshelves at Barnes & Noble in Valparaiso is my favorite occupation. Looking at books online is OK, but I like to touch and feel the texture of the book cover and see what kind of paper and font types are used on the book itself.

Before you call me crazy, all you true bibliophiles out there know whereof I speak. That's how I picked up this week's recommendation: I was captured by the black-and-white foggy picture of three young men standing around a lamppost on a deserted brick street. The photo looked very 1960s and I was intrigued, not only by the promise

of an interesting read, but by a fantastic one from world-famous author Peter Ackroyd. He is English, a writer prolific in fiction and non-fiction, including poetry, criticism and biography. His honors and awards are too numerous to mention, so let's get right down to the story.

The three Hanway boys were born in the London borough of Camden, a council estate of small houses, what we in the states would call government housing. Harry was born in 1947, Daniel in 1948 and Sam in 1949. What was extraordinary about them was they were each born on May 8. After the birth of Sam, the newspaper made something of the boys, but the novelty soon wore off as life after the war was hard in Camden. The boys grew up as boys do. Father Philip was a night watchman in London and their mother, Sally, disappeared from their lives when the boys were 10, 9 and 8 years old, respectively. Their father never spoke of her again, and the boys grew up wondering what they did wrong for mom to leave them like that.

As the boys grew to be teenagers, Harry was the first to leave home. He always loved newspapers and found a job as a messenger boy for a local paper. Following a hunch one night, he follows a strange man into a church. He manages to stop the man as he attempts to start a fire. This leads Harry to writing a story about the incident, which impresses his boss and gets him promoted to reporter. A chance meeting with Hilda, a waitress, leads him to a story about paybacks and government corruption, a story that never gets published, but draws the attention of the newspaper's owner. Soon, Harry is on his way to becoming a top newspaper journalist with his own byline. He even marries the boss' daughter. But



is Harry happy?

Daniel, always the scholar, ends up in Cambridge studying English literature. He works hard to lose his Camden accent and fit in with all the snobs at school. He does well in his studies, eventually graduating and receiving a research fellowship. He later moves on to be a reviewer of some renown in literary circles. Too busy at his career, Daniel doesn't even recognize his own sexuality until he meets Stanley Askisson.

Sam, always the dreamer, stays with his father and becomes a handyman for the nuns at a convent. One day, by accident, Sam discovers where his mother lives: a whorehouse. He finally leaves the nuns to become a rent collector for a

slum landlord, who just happens to have a connection to the corruption story Harry wrote. Where will this lead him?

Oh my, I'm running out of space, and I haven't even gotten to the murders and suicide!

I felt like it was a gray day with clouds pressing down on me as I read this book. London became a foggy city of back alleys, literary gatherings and political machinations in this atmospheric and spell-binding story. It was almost mesmerizing, wondering where the fates would take these three men as their paths intersect so many times without them actually meeting each other.

However, all is not gloomy as I must recount one incident in the story that made me laugh out loud.

It was a book publication party with all the glittering members of the literati present. One editor says, "An interesting crowd, don't you think?" His friend says, "Well, all people are interesting if you don't really want to know them." Such humanity. Such a fascinating story.
