# Fashion Forward

Creativity, Chaos of New York Event Awe Local Clothing Store Owner

Marie Price spent 30 years in various positions within the insurance industry.

So it felt surreal last month to be present during Mercedes-Benz Fashion Week in New York, the personal guest of Wes Gordon, a Chicago native and family friend who at 27 has made a name for himself with de-

signs worn by the likes of Michelle Obama, Katy Perry, Ashley Greene and Gwyneth Paltrow.

"I felt like I'd hit the big time," said Price, a Long Beach resident and the owner of Posh, an upscale consignment store in New Buffalo, Mich. "Never in my wildest dreams did I think that I would be part of Fashion Week. Watching the runway, I saw fashion at its finest. The energy, well, it was just extraordinary."


It was a first for Price, an education of sorts to the thrills, inspiration and chaos of the fashion industry at its zenith.

She and her husband, Jim, moved from Chicago to Long Beach three years ago. She'd always had a love of arts and culture. Before the move to Indiana, for instance, she'd been actively involved with Elmhurst (Ill.) Symphony Orchestra, serving as a senior board member, vice president, president-elect and concert master of ceremonies. She moved to Long Beach before she could serve as the symphony's president.

Jim, she said, encouraged her to branch out into something she loved, so she found part-time work at Posh. What she discovered is that fashion tapped into her desire to be creative.

"I love being around fabrics and colors and styles of all types and qualities," she said. "There is so much diversity in this field. Pairing a lowerpriced item with a higher-priced one can result in something fantastic."

Consignment stores, specifically being able to buy quality clothing at reasonable prices, have appealed to her as well. She officially took over as Posh's owner in August 2013 and is overseeing its move to 109 N. Barton St., the opening set for April 1.

Fashion Week, for the unfamiliar, gives designers and brands the chance to unveil new collections celebrating the latest trends. The most revered fashion weeks are held in London, Milan, New York and Paris. The clear focus, Price said, is not small consignment shops like hers, but major buyers and investors. Attendance is by special invitation.

Enter Wes Gordon.

The Chicago native was raised in Atlanta and interned with designers Oscar de la Renta and Tom Ford. He graduated from Central St. Martins in London in 2009, launching his own line in fall 2010. His works were picked up by department stores such as Harrods and Bergder and Could be at the Could be such as Harrods and Bergder and and Bergde

dorf Goodman. In 2012, he received Fashion Group International's Rising Star Award and was named a finalist in the CFDA/Vogue Fashion Fund. In January, he was included in Forbes' "30 under 30" — one of 30 people younger than 30 — to watch in Art and Design. (De la Renta, by the way, attended Gordon's first runway show.)

After learning that Price now owned her own shop, he invited her and Jim to view his 2014 Ready to Wear collection, which would be unveiled Feb. 11 as part of New York's Fashion Week.

"He knew at a young age he would design women's clothing," Price said of Gordon. "His parents

are tall and beautiful. I feel they were his inspiration.

"His fabrics are very fluid and feminine and highlight the female body."

Marie and Jim Price left for New York on Monday, Feb. 10. Her impressions of the Big Apple?

"It is so expensive," she said. "We spent more on cabs than dining. It was very cold, with snow threatening us as well.

"But having visited several times before, it is always

impressive and stimulating."

Gordon's show was held the next day. The frantic moments leading up to the models taking to the runway might have resembled a typical episode of "Project Runway." Fabrics arrived at the last minute. Gordon, who'd barely slept for three days, was consumed with last-minute fittings and adjustments. A few shoes didn't fit the models.

Finally, the show began. Attendees dressed in everything from blue jeans to

suits to gowns. For Price, everything zipped by. The

show was over within eight to 12 minutes. The models moved so quickly, she was unable to snap decent photos for herself. Nonetheless, it proved an invaluable learning experience.

"It's all about the clothes," she said. "The models wear no makeup. There were no special hairstyles, no expressions on their faces. Again, it's all about the clothing and their movement about the body."

What were her impressions of Gordon's fall collection?

"The fabrics were exquisite," she said. "They fit loosely on the models. There were all lengths. Long heavy knit sweaters are a big look. It definitely was a big city look."

When the runway show came to a close, everyone stood and clapped.

Anyone who has seen the 1995 documentary "Unzipped," which followed Isaac Mizrahi's quest to unveil a new collection — one he hoped would be revered by the media — may recall how the designer had to wait until the day after his show to catch the reviews. With today's emphasis on blogs and social media, the glowing critical response to Gordon's designs were posted within the hour.

A cocktail party was planned after the show for Gordon. Before arriving there, Jim and Marie stopped by a shop where a reality show was taping, and at least one celebrity was present.

Paris Hilton.

With tongue firmly planted in cheek, Marie chuckles, then lowers her head as if embarrassed to admit this. She then said reuniting with Gordon later that day was exhilarating.

"He was on a real high," she said. "He was so relieved it was done. He thought he'd go home and crash, but he was at the party. The reviews were out. They were all very positive."

The next day, Marie visited Gordon's studio. What impressed her most was observing how the creative process unfolds. Sometimes, inspiration hits him and he sketches his vision on an envelope. Then, he shows it to his staff, who start putting patterns

together. The end result in his studio is what she described as "rows and rows of gorgeous clothing." She even bought one of his designs.

For her, witnessing firsthand Gordon's success was inspiring.

"It's been such a pleasure seeing his growth," she said. "He is such an intelligent and inventive individual, and he just went for it at such a young age. And to see it unfold at Fashion Week. I loved the creativity of it, the energy, the fast pace and the immediacy. We left New York exhilarated."

I include the data from 2005-2006 because that was the year when, in most places, we had the most number of sales and the highest \$Volume. By the way, in Michigan the over \$700,000 sales were actually higher in 2013-14 than any other year—even greater than 2005-06. In Indiana, 2005-06 still remains the best for total number of sales. But \$Volume was the highest ever in 2013-14 in Indiana.

What fascinates me is that the percentage of unit sales over \$700,000 has remained pretty much a constant percentage of the total unit sales. **On March 11, 2002,** two columns of light soared skyward from Ground Zero in New York as a temporary memorial to the victims of the Sept. 11 attacks.







#### **JROTC Takes Awards at Military Drill**

The Michigan City High School Marine Corps Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps drill team earned awards at the Pike High School military drill meet Feb. 22 in Indianapolis.

MCHS cadets earned first place in the personnel inspection category and fourth place in armed platoon out of 16 schools. Michigan City was the only Marine school besides Portage to compete. Most of the schools were Navy JROTC programs because the meet is used by the Navy JROTC to prepare them for the Navy National Drill Competition in Daytona Beach, Fla.

"Due to a variety of circumstances, we were missing some of our experienced cadets in key positions," Senior Marine Instructor Maj. Tom McGrath said

in a press release. "I am proud of the way some of our younger cadets stepped up and took their place."

Marine Instructor Master Sgt. Jeff Benak said earning first place in the personnel inspection event was gratifying.

"To have taken first place ahead of many good Navy schools, being inspected by active Navy petty officers, is something for our cadets to be a great source of pride," Benak added.

Cadet Capt. Paul Tobalt, the cadet commanding officer, led both award-winning units.

"Despite us losing some of our 'starters," he said, "our cadets, to include the younger ones, really came through. This shows how the JROTC can mold leaders by the older cadets helping develop the younger cadets."

Tobalt has been accepted to Purdue University, where he hopes to attend through an ROTC scholarship worth \$150,000 over four years. He should receive the result of his application in April.

The final drill meet for MCHS is March 22 at Romeoville, Ill. The cadets also will march in the Michigan City St. Patrick's Day Parade on March 8, stand their annual inspection March 12 and provide support for the Indiana High School Athletic Association Boys Basketball Regional Tournament held at the MCHS Gym on March 15.

#### Off the Book Shelf

Cold Storage Alaska by John Straley (hardcover, \$26.95 retail in bookstores and online)

This week, I will emphasize the "happy" in my "happy reading."

"Like the Coen brothers on literary speed." That's how award-winning author Ken Bruen describes "Cold Storage Alaska, and he is oh so right! This is my first read of the year that is pure relaxing entertainment that had me smiling (a lot), laughing out loud, even getting a little misty-eyed at times. There is comedy coupled with greed, love and loss, dreams and nightmares... and a cast of characters you won't soon forget, including King Salmon and grizzly bears.


Let me explain.

The scene is a small town on the southeast coast of Alaska called Cold Storage that is home to fewer than 200 people, most of them descendants of the Norwegians who settled there in 1935 and prospered during the frozen fish boom. Now, Cold Storage is just a sad little town whose natural beauty, the fishing and hunting, and not much else, make it ripe for everyone to be in everyone else's business.

Lester, the only Native American living in the town, is an artist and writing his first novel about white people, of course. When asked about the residents, he says, "...actually most of the people in this town are drunks or depressives, but we have our funny moments."

And do they ever! Central casting in Hollywood couldn't have come up with a more interesting crew that likes taking bets on the day and month that someone will sleep with someone else, or boldly stand in line at the diner window and listen to a lover's quarrel out in the street, betting on who wins the argument. (They do a lot of betting in this town.)

Enter the McMahon brothers and their mother, longtime residents. Miles, the elder, served in the Army, became a medic and is now the closest thing to a doctor for hundreds of miles. He operates a clinic in the town. As the story opens, his brother Clive is being released from a seven-year stint in



the pen for dealing coke. Miles is holding his breath on whether Clive will show up in Cold Storage or not. Of course he does, but not before he visits his old boss, Jake, in Seattle and, well, let's just say the meeting didn't go well and Jake is now chasing Clive, while an irate state trooper is on Clive's trail and, well, it's going to get real interesting real soon...and Cold Storage is due for a shakeup the likes of which they have never seen.

Against all his feelings — or lack thereof — for his brother, Miles is surprised when Clive buys the local bar, which has been empty and fallen into ruin for some time. In typical small-

town fashion, the residents pitch in to help restore the building, setting up a barbecue for the workers and installing a sound system.

Then, there is Billy, who kayaked down to Seattle to meet the Dali Lama while he was in town and instead returns with a band called the Blind Donkeys. Billy wasn't really in the right mind to be a monk. The band lines up a gig in the new bar, and things seem to be going smoothly for once in Cold Storage. But wait. The coming days may spell trouble for the McMahon brothers and the people of Cold Storage.

The town's residents are richly carved in details as deep and vivid as the beautiful forest and mountains surrounding the town. And the fact that Clive thinks animals are talking to him, well, that's just a side note to a comedy/drama that will stay with you long after the last page is turned.

Author Straley certainly knows Alaska well since he is a criminal investigator for the state, where he lives with his family in Sitka. His wife is a marine biologist who studies whales.

Straley was named the Writer Laureate of Alaska in 2006. His other books include <u>The Woman Who Married a Bear, The Curious Eat Themselves</u> and <u>The Big Both Ways.</u>

Pulitzer Prize-winning author Gary Snyder called <u>Cold Storage Alaska</u> "Over the top good." I like succinct. It sums up the book quite nicely.
