PROTECTING THE PARK

PAUL LABOVITZ'S LOVE OF THE OUTDOORS THRIVES AS NEW NATIONAL LAKESHORE SUPERINTENDENT

Indiana Dunes National Lakeshore is home to a 15-mile stretch of shoreline along Lake Michigan.

It is home to attractions such as Bailly Homestead, Chelberg Farm and Mount Baldy.

It is home to worldclass plant diversity. Home to great birding and more.

It is our home, and now, it's Paul Labovitz's home to protect, even if he's about 700 miles and five Great Lakes west of the shores of the Atlantic Ocean where, with the sun on his face and sand in his hair, he spent summers surf fishing and catching sand crabs.

Having found his passion for the outdoors as a child, Labovitz never saw it diminish. Today, he is the new Indiana Dunes National Lakeshore superintendent. He officially started in May. His predecessor, Costa Dillon, retired in August 2013.

"I'm flattered and excited to be here," Labovitz said. "It was nerve-racking waiting to be selected.

"The park is a spectacular resource. The complexities of the landscape really intrigue me, and honestly, this is a very friendly part of the world."

Labovitz's enjoyment and enthusiasm for the outdoors, and the lake, is evident as he explains his vision, goals and expectations for the National Lakeshore.

He hopes people who live in the area realize there is a national park in Northwest Indiana, and it's one of the most visited in the country.

"When people from the outside come here, they are blown away every time," he said. "We can help become part of why people should be proud of this part of the world."

By educating the public, he hopes to continue enlightening people about the great resource we have here, and to understand the National Lakeshore is worth preserving and protecting.

"Not only," he explained, "because of its intrinsic value as a biodiverse place, but it is also an important part of the region's economy.

"The more folks we have who become stewards of the lakeshore,

the longer it will be here contributing to the region."

Labovitz feels the National Lakeshore almost is a well-kept secret. He intends to let that secret out a little bit.

"People tend to be more familiar with the piece of the lakeshore that's in their county," he said. "Ninety nine percent of our visitors go to the beach, but there's a lot more to this park than the beach. The beach is a great lead-in to capture people, but at some point, the deeper you look, the more you find here."

The National Park Service considers Indiana Dunes National Lakeshore a large park, one of the larger ones in the Midwest region and the seventh most biologically diverse in the entire national park system.

ccording to Labovitz, the National Park Service has learned it cannot manage parks as if they are isolated islands. They also do not have to own or regulate everything to be able to protect and manage the park. The National Lakeshore now has numerous partnerships to help do just that.

This collaboration allows the park service and its partners to share their missions, which tend to overlap.

"In a broader sense, our mission is to protect and interpret the national cultural treasures of the United States, of which the Indiana Dunes National Lakeshore is one of 401 national park sites," Labovitz said. "Our mission is to do that in perpetuity."

Labovitz also is working with partners on economic development. The park is not as much of a driving force within the overall economic engine as it could be.

"We are the No. 1 destination in the state, but once you're here, it's hard for you to make an economic impact," Labovitz said. "Wouldn't it be cool if

you could come down here and rent a kayak for a couple hours, or a bike or a kite or get a nice meal, a cup of coffee or get ice cream?"

Labovitz also would like to increase the educational experiences for school children, and to complete the bicycle trail connection across the lakeshore from Michigan City to Gary, ultimately connecting Chicago and Michigan.

He also is looking to the private and nonprofit sectors to collaborate with the National Lakeshore in respects to Chelberg Farm. In 2009, then IDNL Superintendent Dillon, in meetings with the public, explained the farm now sat quiet because it became too expensive to house and care for animals there.

"Because of shrinking government, it became an operation the park was unable to continue the way it was managed in the past," Labovitz said. "We have a request for proposals out on the street soliciting ideas from people who would potentially lease that property from us and operate it under some conditions with the National Park Service based on our preservation goals."

Another issue for Labovitz is potentially reopening Mount Baldy. In 2013, the 123-feet-tall "wandering dune" near Michigan City swallowed up a 6-year-old boy through an 11-feet deep sinkhole. In what's been dubbed the "Miracle at Mount Baldy," the boy was saved because of a united three-hour effort by rescue officials.

Indiana University has done a 3-D scan of the dune. Labovitz hopes they gain a better understand-



ing of what it looks like underneath, especially to see if there are additional dangerous voids. He hopes to reopen access to the public next season, but he gives no guarantee. When it does reopen, the public access will be quite different, he said.

"I can safely say that running up and down the back and front sides of the dune is probably not going to happen anymore," Labovitz said. "The dune is too fragile, and that kind of human traffic will never allow vegetation to come back, and the dune will just blow away."

abovitz wants the National Lakeshore to be a place people are proud of, a place for people in Northwest Indiana to enjoy outdoor recreation, and to know this is a connection to the rest of the National Park system.

"A lot of the kids in Michigan City may not think about places like Yellowstone National Park because it's far away," he said, "but they have a national park that's connected to Yellowstone right here, and they can ride their bike here. We are part of a system of these great American places and stories that are almost a hundred years old."

Indeed, the National Park Service will celebrate its centennial in 2016, while the National Lakeshore will turn 50.

"We will be eating a lot of cake in 2016," Labovitz said.

PROPOSALS SOUGHT FOR CHELLBERG FARM

The National Park Service wants to re-establish a working agricultural landscape at Chellberg Farm.

Proposals are invited from the private sector to lease the historic farm long term. The properties offered include the outbuildings and fields at the farm, 900 N. Mineral Springs Road, Porter. The NPS also will consider an option to include the Charles P. Nelson House, located directly across the street from the farm, for use as a residence.

The length of the lease is expected to be 10 years, but up to 60 years may be considered based on circumstances. The cost may vary, but will be bench-


marked at 10 percent of gross revenue, with a 1 percent reduction for certified organic products.

Proposals will be evaluated on factors such as their compatibility with the preservation, protection and visitor enjoyment of the park, as well as being compatible with its educational and interpretive programming.

This is the time of year when family and friends gather to celebrate the holidays. At one time, before some of my family moved away, there would be 30 to 40 people in my parent's house for Thanksgiving. That included grandparents, aunts, uncles, brothers and sisters and their families, complete with nieces, nephews and cousins, as well as family friends.

So many people were there, we needed three eating areas: the dining room table downstairs, the kitchen table upstairs and the requisite "kids" table downstairs.

It took my mother days to prepare for Thanksgiving. She had an oven upstairs and one downstairs that helped her get everything finished in time. She would cook a 25- to 30-pound turkey, along with a dozen or so extra drumsticks. Our menu, like most families, consisted of turkey and dressing, mashed potatoes, gravy, rolls, cranberries and assorted fruit salads and rolls fresh and hot out of the oven.

My job was to slice the jellied cranberry sauce. I had to open both ends of the can, push out the cranberry sauce, slice it and put it on a plate. We would go through a half dozen cans. To this day, I can't eat cranberries.

After the meal, there was football, the noise of nieces and nephews playing in the crowded house, the chatter of several different conversations going on at once.

Weather permitting, the kids would head outside to play while the tables were cleared and the dishes done. Everyone was anticipating some pumpkin pie with fresh whipped cream and other desserts.

I want to share with you two of my own recipes that have become family favorites. One is for yam or sweet potato casserole and the other for a fresh cranberry compote.

I prepare the sweet potato/yam casserole the day before so there is less mess and more room in the kitchen as you prepare your Thanksgiving meal.

Peel, cook and drain 3 pounds of yams/sweet potatoes and place in a large bowl and mash.

Add 2/3 cup of brown sugar, 2 tablespoons of vanilla, 1 stick of melted butter and 2 well-beaten eggs. Add cinnamon and nutmeg to taste. Mix the ingredients until blended.

For the topping, use 2/3 cup of brown sugar, 1/3 cup of flour, 1/3 stick of butter (melted), 1 cup of chopped pecans, walnuts or a mixture of both. Place the ingredients in a bowl and mix thoroughly. Place the potatoes in a greased 9-by-13 glass baking dish. Add the nut mixture on top and bake in a 350 degree oven 30 to 40 minutes until done.

For the cranberry compote, place 1/2 cup water and 1/2 cup orange juice in a medium saucepan.

Add 1 pound of fresh cranberries and cook until the cranberries pop open, about 10 minutes.

Peel and dice 1 Granny Smith apple, 1 pear, 1 large orange and place in a bowl. Add 1 cup of golden raisin and 1 1/2 cups of sugar.

After the cranberries pop, place the ingredients from the bowl in the saucepan and simmer until thick, around 25 minutes.

Once the mixture is thick, shut off the oven and remove from heat. Let it cool and add 1 cup of crushed pineapple and 1 cup of chopped nuts — your choice, if you like. Cover and place in the refrigerator. The cranberries will last up to two weeks in the refrigerator or six months in the freezer. The recipe can be easily doubled.



These recipes, for me, conjure up memories of holidays past.

I still remember my brother, Joe, standing downstairs eating a whole pumpkin pie by himself. Board games and cards were played, but you had to keep an eye on those you were playing with.

I can still see my grandmother and grandfather sitting and talking. I can still hear my dad telling his lame, silly jokes that would make you groan. I can see my mom, all 4' 11", frantically running around the house to make sure everything was perfect. Of course, she set out the "good" dishes and silverware. She had to make sure the grandkids got her special punch.

With the passing of time and loved ones, we have to be content with the memories of holidays past, a time when stores were closed on Thanksgiving, there were no early bird sales or Black Fridays and the Christmas decorations did not come out until Friday. Families spent the whole day together. They didn't eat and run so they could go stand in a line at a big box store hoping to get a deal.

From our family to yours, have a safe and happy holiday season.




























La Lumiere Earns Honors at Regatta



La Lumiere's crew team finished its third season this fall by participating in the Head of the Eagle Regatta in Indianapolis.

More than 20 teams competed from the Midwest, including Culver Academies and the Indianapolis Rowing Club. The Laker rowers earned a second- and third-place finish in the Boys Junior Double race, a third-place finish in the Girls Junior Double race and a third-place finish in the Boys Junior Single race.

Coach Kevin Spingler, a veteran coach with more than 30 years experience, started the program with 17 rowers and seven shells (boats). The team has grown to 27 rowers with 15 shells.

Starting a crew program was made easier by the fact that La Lumiere has its own lake on campus.

The school also permits team members to row two seasons—in the fall and spring—and during the offseason, student-athletes continue to build strength and skills on a dozen indoor rowing machines.

La Lumiere started a crew program to address its growing student body, and to provide its students with the chance to earn additional college acceptances and scholarships. More than 60 percent of girls and 20 percent of boys who seek college scholarships to row get them, compared to a national average for all sports of just 2 percent.

In the program's short history, La Lumiere School has placed three student-athletes into competitive college programs at Wake Forest, Marietta and Villanova.

The Forgers by Bradford Morrow (hardback \$24, online and in bookstores; also available as an ebook)

"They never found his hands."

When a story starts out like it, it has my immediate attention.

This book is classified as a "thriller," but it is so much more than that. The reader enters the bibliophile community of rare book deal-

ers — a world that should be pure and clear of any misdoings. But the truth is, there is a dark side to the business. Not only books of famous authors are bought and sold, but letters, notes and any other communications actually written by the author himself. And that, of course, leads to a very few talented forgers who can reproduce the paper, the ink and the exact flow of an author's hand.

Adam Diehl was a rather reclusive rare book collector who was found, sans hands, one day in his Montauk home on the ocean. Papers, books were scattered all over, the police botched the investigation and no one was accused of the murder.

Diehl had a sister, Meghan, who owned a bookstore in New York's East Village. Her boyfriend, Will, was one of those sometimes forgers. Oh, he was very good, especially with forging the writing style of Arthur Conan Doyle and Henry James. The story of <u>The Forgers</u>, in fact, is told through Will's voice.


The couple eventually marry, and Will is caught in his "craft" and pays his dues to society.

But soon, threatening letters start arriving and Will must decide where his life with Meghan will go from here. The letters allude to knowledge of Adam's death. The couple decides to move to Ireland to make a new start, Will in particular to get away from his obsession with forging.

But it soon becomes apparent a stalker is on the horizon and Will must decide how to handle him. What happens will make your hair stand on end! This story is a fascinating look into a little-known world, and an unsettling walk inside a desperate man's mind to keep his now pregnant wife safe. I've never read a more perfect book for the fall season: cold, gray dawns and windy, unyielding days.

You will either love or hate this book. There simply is no in-between.
