

# It's Time to Fall Back

A Look at a Few of the Area's Enfamous Ghost Stories and Urban Legends

t was a dark and stormy night...

Or so the oft-told tale goes: screams, howls, moans and chains — there are always chains — rattling in the night, ghosts, skeletons and disembodied spirits roaming the woods, swamps and cemeteries, houses haunted with restless spirits of the long departed.

The lore of Northwest Indiana is filled with such tales told and retold by enthusiastic spinners of yarns to wide-eyed listeners who then must pass anxious hours of sleep-lessness and nightmare-filled dreams.

As Halloween approaches, interest in the spirit world increases, and the bare bones fingers of the leafless trees seem to reach out to grab the unsuspecting passersby and snare them within a scary web of haunted tales.

La Porte and Porter counties have been inhabited for centuries by many characters good and bad who have written their histories all over our landscape. Most of their stories are pleasant, but some are filled with grief and horror. These are the tales so often passed on enthusiastically over campfires on frosty fall evenings.

Do a search of the Internet — that source of all truth, right? — and you will be amazed at the websites that devote themselves to the haunting of Northwest Indiana. Check out "Haunted Places in Indiana," "Northwest Indiana Ghost Stories" or "Haunted Indiana" and "Indiana Haunted Houses." Michigan City Public Library has shelves dedicated to local ghost stories, some guaranteed to raise the hair on the back of your neck.

Michigan City has several sites that could be considered hot spots for wandering spirits looking for a home. Consider our lakefront where many a ship was washed ashore, with all hands lost to the waters of the lake, or the site of the Battle of Trail Creek, Indiana's only Revolutionary War battle, fought, some say, about a mile east of Sheridan Beach. All American fighters died in the skirmish except the commander, Tom Bradley, who was taken to Canada to be hanged.


Of course, there is the famous legend of Diana of the Dunes, who some say still wanders the dunes and takes an occasional skinny dip in the lake near here, and the infamous Belle Gunness, who lured unsuspecting men to their death in the farm country of La Porte County.

But as a curious person, I need a closer look. "Haunted Places in Indiana" mentions a tempting tidbit about a location near my home. It reads, "White house on 50 North; There is a vacant house where it is rumored that a man went insane and murdered his entire family. It is also rumored that he buried them in the basement floor. People have reported hearing cries and moans coming from inside the home."

This is not the kind of exploration a person wants to do on his own, so I recruited my grandson to ride along with me. When asked if he wanted to visit a haunted house, he assumed I meant the kind that are so common in the area during Halloween time, where you pay to get in and have fun being scared. He is just learning to drive and jumped at the chance

to be my chauffeur.

We located County Road 50 North near Otis and turned onto a very nice street lined with well-maintained homes. Looking for a haunted house, I was disappointed until we drove to the end of the road, and there in a field of weeds at the end of a rutted gravel road was a white house. By the conditions of the grounds, it appeared to be abandoned, though I can't say for sure.

"Drive down that road," I told my grandson.

As we approached, the structure loomed out from between overgrown trees. Was this the house mentioned in the website? I jumped out of the car in a hurry and snapped a few pictures. I felt an ominous, creepy sensation, and my grandson could not wait to drive out of there in a hurry.

I can't tell what gave me the creepy sensation. Was it that I was sitting on property where I did not belong and was not invited, or was there something there that was disturbed by my presence? I left in a hurry...and do not care to return.

Another interesting entry in the same website offered this clue to our next stop: the clinic at La Porte's I and 10th streets. This once was used by Native Americans who made camp as part of the Trail of Tears. During one of the winter stays, a young woman died. There is now a clinic atop the small hill. There have been reports of the elevator working by itself, objects have been moved by unseen hands and one of the restrooms has been locked from the inside several times, according to

Some say this corner is the location of an ancient Indian graveyard, and the woman who died and was buried there was a princess of the tribe. These stories have a life of their own. A short drive took us to this location across from La Porte High School. I went inside to interview anyone I could find who was willing to talk, but was not successful.

There has been talk — a persistent rumor among some — about a train that went into Clear Lake behind La Porte's Kroger many years ago, that it sank into the muddy bottom with numerous passengers aboard. This is an unsubstantiated story, but we decided to take a look anyway.

The lake definitely has a creep factor about it, and train tracks still run by it. It is possible the truth about this story will never be known, although La Porte County Historian Fern Eddy Schultz says from her research, it could not have happened.

It is, perhaps, a true urban legend.

This research into the paranormal side of Northwest Indiana would not be complete without an interview with our own Ghostbusters, and what better place to meet with them but La Porte's Pine Lake Cemetery at midnight...or maybe 4 in the afternoon would suffice.

The Ghostbusters of Northwest Indiana officially became a non-profit entity in 2011. The four members — Mike Murray, Matt Paige, Curt Collins and Caleb Fairres — don their Proton Packs and rush to the scene of paranormal activity. They travel in their especially equipped SUV, complete with flashing light bars and mysterious looking tubes, wires and gizmos. The group spends weekends lending their supernatural presence to groups and organizations gathered for charitable purposes rather than ghostly activities. They donate their time and expertise helping others raise money for worthy causes. Basically, they enjoy being Ghostbusters and helping out in the community.

These Ghostbusters do collect plenty of ghost stories along the way.

Murray says he often is cornered by someone who just needs to share a spooky tale about a ghost in their attic. He grew up across from Patton Cemetery in La Prote and can remember a particularly haunting night there himself.

Schultz says many people who come to La Porte County Historical Society Museum, 2405 Indiana ave., to do research are hoping to prove they live in a haunted house. It seems that although we fear the unknown, we are drawn to it. Why is that? Where do these legends of hauntings come from and why do they persist in our culture?

A fun story illustrates how some of these legends might be perpetuated. This tale was related to me by my son, who lives in Valparaiso. Several years ago, he booked a Halloween tour of local haunted places. It was led by a rather corpulent, yet flamboyant storyteller. The tour lasted several hours and was designed to build to the final stop: a particularly spooky cemetery in a nearby community. This small, overgrown, out-of-the-way spot is known as one of the most haunted places in the Midwest.

The tour bus stopped under a street light across the road from the cemetery, and the guide dimmed the interior lights so everyone could appreciate the spooky scene.

After a bit of time spent gawking, anxious faces presses against fogged windows, the bus drove off and my son was disappointed they did not disembark to explore.

Fast forward to several weeks later. My son and a few friends decide to visit the same graveyard foot in the middle of a cold November night. They approached cautiously and began exploring the graveyard, looking in particular for a fabled "jumping" tombstone. My son began retelling the story of his disappointing ghost tour when what appears under the street light across the road but a tour bus led by the same rotund, voluble gentleman.

Waiting quietly behind the tombstones, my son and his friends watched until the bus began to pull away, at which point he stood in the shadows and waved his flashlight quickly and briefly in the air. The bus screeched to a halt, and camera flashes exploded from the windows of the bus, but none dared to leave the safety of the vehicle to further explore the creepy phenomenon in the graveyard.

After a while, the bus left and all was quiet. The friends continued to explore, laughing to themselves and thinking the night's excitement was over...until a short while later, a clatter and the scraping of shoes over the gravel driveway could be heard in the distance. Someone was coming: young people laughing and joking nervously with each other.

Hiding once again in the shadows of the grave-

stones, the friends waited until the approaching group of explorers drew near. Then, at just the right moment, my son let loose his most hideous laugh and one of the female friends, who was with the party, screamed a scream to curdle the blood.

There was a moment of pause, a breath, a heart-beat and the air was filled with the sounds of feet

pounding on gravel and stones flying as the erstwhile adventure seekers screamed, yelling and scrambling. They wasted no time getting away from the scene of such horror.

What stories might the folks on the bus, and especially the adventurous group on foot, taken back home with them that evening? Can you imagine that any of them had a difficult time sleeping that night? For whatever it is worth, if you were to look up that particular graveyard today, you would find claims it has "more paranormal activity that any other cemetery worldwide."

So whether you believe in ghosts or not, or just like a good spooky story and a scare every once in a while, take Schultz's advice.

"You can believe what you want," she says. "Just be careful what you pass on."

### "Aelita, Queen of Mars" Returns to Mainstreet

Michigan City composer Dan Schaaf doesn't remember how the idea came about, but it seemed liked a pretty good idea: Why not have live actors do the dialogue of an otherwise silent film?

The result was "Aelita, Queen of Mars," the silent movie musical with which Schaaf's actors have been perfecting over the years throughout Northwest Indiana and Chicago.

Performances are scheduled for 8 p.m. Friday and Saturday, Oct. 31 and Nov. 1, at Mainstreet Theatre, 807 Franklin St., Michigan City. On Halloween, theatergoers are encouraged to participate in the "Dress Like a Martian" costume contest.



"Aelita" was a silent sci-fi film made in Russia during the brief liberalization between the civil wars of the 1920s and Stalin's reign. It features futuristic Martian landscapes, a cast of thousands and the exotic title character.

The film is based on the novel by Alexei Tolstoy, a distant relative of Leo Tolstoy. The speculative novel depicts an engineer longing for his dead wife and looking to the stars for relief. Though the general plot remains, the film dispenses with the novel's serious, scientific tone.

In the film, the engineer, driven by jealousy, imagines a fantasy "Queen of Mars" who rules a race of robots. He rockets himself to Mars, participates in a Soviet-style revolt, makes love to the Queen and returns to find that not much has changed in Russia.

In attempting to compete with Hollywood spectacles, the Soviet filmmakers threw in every style they could manage: comedy; social realism; adventure; fantasy; epic battles; love stories; and political commentary. The mixture of styles baffled critics, but delighted audiences. In recent years, scholars have noted the film is a veiled, but strong criticism of the political and social state of the Soviet Union. The filmmakers felt safe making such criticism since the action is on Mars. In the 1950s, the Soviets finally banned the film.

Schaaf re-edited the film, added sound effects, songs and dialogue performed by live actors. The ersatz Muscovite Repertory Theatre Co. includes Susie Richter (La Porte) as Aelita, Larry Jortner (Valparasio) as Tuskub, King of Mars, Robert Richter (Michigan City) as the Radio Moscow engineer, Sandy Gleim (La Porte) as his beautiful wife and Noel Carlson (Michigan City) as Gussev, an accidental traveler to Mars.

This performance includes remastered surround sound and video newly enhanced by Moscow State University software.

Schaaf's other shows include "MacBeth! The Rock Opera," Jeff Schmidt's one-man musical, "Sparkle," and his musical revue, "Seven Day Wonder," performed last year at Mainstreet Theatre. For several years, he was the resident composer at Chesterton's 4th Street Theater, composing incidental music for numerous shows and winning an NIETF award for his score for "Lion in Winter."

# New Lantern Room Dedicated at Old Lighthouse Museum

A large gathering of museum enthusiasts, lighthouse volunteers and local dignitaries stood below to celebrate a ribbon cutting and dedication of the new structure. After two years of dreaming, sketching, drawing and planning, grants were awarded, the construction completed and the new lantern room raised into place.

At 11 a.m., Michigan City Historical Society President Larry Swiger, standing on the museum east porch along with Mayor Ron Meer and Shannon Eason, Michigan City Parks and Recreation Department administrative director, welcomed the crowd and addressed the gathering. This, Eason said, was an "example of what could be done for the community when all work together."

Swiger pointed with pride to the fact that all of the work at the museum is accomplished by dedicated volunteers from the city and beyond who believe in the importance of preserving this piece of local history for the people of Michigan City. Several Hoosier Lighthouse Club members were on hand. They regularly volunteer, travelling from all points of the state to preserve and maintain the historic structure.

There are officially five lighthouses in Indiana: three on private piers

According to Swiger, the day's ceremony was a "miraculous" culmination of work by the volunteers, and a perfect way to end the 2014 museum season. After opening remarks, the group was invited inside the 156-year-old building to witness the official ribbon cutting, tour the building and climb the spiral staircase to the new lantern room itself.


The new structure is the design of Michigan City architect Roger Potratz. It was assembled on a trailer in an empty space next to the zoo. This clever procedure allowed the completed structure to be easily transported to the museum building, and it required only one lift operation from the trailer to the top of the building. The existing lantern room that was replaced had been in operation since 1973 when the museum first opened to the public. Because the new structure

is much heavier than the one it replaced, considerations had to be made for the modification of the support structure as well.

Accessed from the second floor of the museum, a narrow staircase leads to a beautifully paneled anti room that houses a spiral staircase leading to the cupola of the lantern room itself. Those who make the climb are treated to a spectacular view of Washington Park, the marina and a vista of Trail Creek.

It is in this very place that the lightkeepers of Lake Michigan's storm-tossed shore climbed to tend the light in all types of weather from 1858 until the new lighthouse was established in 1906. From its lofty height above the beach, the original light keepers at first tended a wick and oil lamp, then finally an electric light reflected and amplified through a Fresnel lens. The light and lens projected a guiding beam 15 miles out into the lake, shepherding ships

to the safe haven of the harbor at the mouth of Trail Creek.

This celebration and dedication marked the beginning of more work to come in the next year as porches are rebuilt and shingles repaired, all in the name of preserving this wonderful landmark.



Having turned 64 on Oct. 24, I couldn't help but think of that Beatles song, "When I'm 64." I was only 17 when it hit the charts in 1967, and 64 sure seemed a long way off.

I remember on my 14th birthday a very good friend of my father's, Joe Yonto, the former football coach at St. Mary's in Michigan City, was a defensive coach for the University of Notre Dame. He gave my father and me tickets to the Stanford Cardinal/Notre Dame game on my birthday, Oct. 24, 1964. ND was ranked No. 2 at the time and won the game 28-6. Check out the ticket price — \$5.50 — and the program was 50 cents. My how times have changed.

After the game, we were invited to Coach Yonto's house. When we arrived, there were many Notre Dame players ready to share some birthday cake and ice cream with me. What a thrill for a rabid football fan.

I never forgot Yonto. His daughters and I would hang out when they came to Michigan City to visit their aunt and uncle.

On my 16th birth-day, I got to take the

car out. I did the cool thing at the time: drove to Washington Park via Franklin Street, then the return trip back uptown to the McDonald's parking lot, repeating the trip as many times as possible before having to get the car home.

We sometimes would park in the Jewel parking lot on Franklin Street across from Ames Field and talk to our friends, or wait for them to see us and stop. Who does not remember Catting the Drag?

My wife, Suzanne, got us tickets to see my all-time favorite New York Yankee, to watch the first game of the 2012 World Series with him (and a few others) at the Yogi Berra Museum and Learning Center on the campus of Montclair State University in New Jersey. We even made a side trip to Carlo's Bakery.

Suzanne made from scratch German chocolate cake for my birthday: my favorite. I make some homemade chocolate and vanilla ice cream, and our sons and their families usually come over to celebrate...I mean eat. There generally is a nice meal served before the dessert.

Sue has great recipes for coconut and chocolate frosting for the German chocolate cake that I would like to share.

For the coconut pecan frosting, you will need:

- 1 cup evaporated milk
- 1 cup sugar
- 3 egg yolks, slightly beaten
- 1/2 cup butter
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 1 1/3 cup flaked coconut, set aside
- 1 cup chopped pecans, set aside

Place all ingredients in a saucepan. Heat and stir over medium heat until thick, about 12 minutes. Remove from heat and add coconut and pecans.

For the chocolate frosting, you will need:

- 1/2 cup of cocoa
- 2 2/3 cups of powdered sugar
- 1/3 cup milk
- 1 tsp of vanilla
- 1/4 cup of butter, softened

Sift the powdered sugar and cocoa together and blend in the other ingredients until smooth.







### Off the Book Shelf

Here's two reading recommendations for creepy October reading — ghosts, demons and lots of paranormal happenings. One is a novel, the other a collection of short stories and a one-act play. Enjoy!



Haunted by Kay Hooker (hardcover, \$26.95 in bookstores and online; also available as an ebook)

"There were, he knew, people who had to pay.

"That was something he was certain he knew how to do.

"Get justice.

"Be the sword hand of God.

"When he realized that, all his confusion and uncertainty melted away.

"And the plan began to take shape."

Gear up for this one — a suspense-filled murder mystery with an added element of the paranormal. It's new subject reading for me, maybe for you, too. This book is one of a continuing series of best sellers about Noah Bishop and his Special Crimes Unit of the FBI. "Special" because Bishop's people have psychic abilities: empathy, touch-telepathy, medium and more. Here's how they get involved in this investigation...

The Blue Ridge Mountains are beautiful. A perfect place for hikers and nature lovers alike — until young women started disappearing. First, two women hikers, then another two women who'd just stopped at one of the lookout points to take a picture. When the bodies of the first two were found, police agencies in the area were notified, including the sleepy town of Sociable, Ga.

Even towns like Sociable have their dirty little secrets, and when the body of Scott Abernathy was found there not long after the report on the hikers came in, Sheriff Trinity Nichols knew she had her hands full. Scott's apartment was locked with no sign of a break-in or even a struggle. A small handmade cross was found stuffed in his mouth. Guess what? Similar crosses were found in the mouths of the murdered hikers.

Sheriff Nichols calls on Bishop at the FBI, and he sends two of his best agents to help in the investigation. Another member of his team, Deacon James, shows up in town on his own. It seems his sister, Melanie, had a very public and loud breakup with Scott and now was the No. 1 suspect in his murder. But wait! There's more murders to come. Isn't there always?

The murders are creepy enough, not to mention

gory, but the added paranormal events make it doubly so. The violent climax comes in a church parsonage on the side of a hill high above town.

"These Woods are Dark" is every child's nightmare — the hiding under the bed with a flashlight tale. Trying to remember a long-ago nursery rhyme keeps a child awake all night, especially when he finally remembers the last lines. Maybe he shouldn't go to sleep...or look out the window?

"What is Lucy For" finally answers the questions Lucy has been asking herself for a long time. Like why she has no friends. When a strange man explains what she is doing on Earth, well, you will understand about redemption and finding a purpose in living.

Is Earth merely some supreme being's canvas? A place to show off his work at a celestial art show? "Medium" finds the artist explaining his latest work to the critics. I think you'll find his techniques...interesting.

"Forgive Me, Father" finds a man face to face with his god, who presents a dilemma, the elements of which you might find confusing until the very last page presents a startling revelation.

"The Definition" asks the reader, what is the definition of insane? This one is shades of Alfred Hitchcock!

And now for the pièce de résistance —"Hi, My Name is Grace." This one-act play won Best Script and Best Production awards at the 2013 On Your Marks Festival in Michigan City.

The stage is a "blank canvas within an author's mind." So, who is Grace? Well, nobody at the onset. But when another woman joins her onstage, you'll read the most clever and thoughtful premise for a one-act play, ever. Period.


