"Bette Davis: On the Edge" begins in the early morning hours of Oct. 31, 1962, as Davis, her career fading, awaits reviews of "Whatever Happened to Baby Jane?" The dark psychological thriller directed by Robert Aldrich ("The Longest Yard") starred Davis as a washed-up child actress who torments her actress sister, played by Oscar-winner Joan Crawford. If the movie flops, Davis fears her career will officially come to an embarrassing end.

(The movie ended up being a surprise hit, reviving interest in the careers of both actresses.)

St. John began her research in November 2009, finding anything she could about Davis. She got her hands on every book available — autobiographies and biographies — reading them over a short time period, from January to early spring 2010. She subsequently embarked on research at The Margaret Herrick Library through the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences and the Bette Davis Archival Collection in Boston.

"With an airtight treatment, or story outline, you can't go wrong," St. John said. "You spend an enormous amount of time outlining your story, figuring out what it is you're wanting to tell the audience through this story. With all of the help from everyone at the Motion Picture Academy Library and the Bette Davis Archival Collection, I was able to glean everything I needed in order to tell the story I thought she deserved."

The learning process didn't stop with St. John's first draft.

Once she met with a producer, the process started all over again. She ended up at the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences, taking paid tours and asking Patricia Hanson, of its library, any questions that came to mind.

"I could have called all of these people and asked them what they could find for me," St. John said, "but I just wanted to do it all myself, to make sure I ended up with everything I needed, and that's how it turned into a nearly three-year process.

"I had known her as an actress, but I didn't actually know anything about her. I knew what has been advertised, pumped into the public – all of the gossip, basically — but I wanted to know who she was as a person, not as a Hollywood starlet."

Through her research, St. John uncovered many interesting tidbits.

Davis was a devoted mother of three and fiercely committed to the Civil Rights movement. She enjoyed working on projects with actress Hattie Mc-Daniel ("Gone With the Wind"), and even set up a performance for African-American soldiers fighting during World War II with Lena Horne and Ethel Walters.

"I was reading through this and realized just how little I really knew about her personal life," St. John said. "I was so surprised that this wasn't included in any of the biographies I had read.

"All of these things culminated into the person we saw portraying all of these characters on the big screen. That's what I thought was most important about her. That's what I wanted to portray. So, I took all of these things I had learned about her and did my best to find her inner essence, the person she really was behind all of the characters and cameras."

A graduate of The Goodman School of Drama of The Art Institute of Chicago, St. John furthered her studies at The Sorbonne and The American Center, Paris.

For the past 24 years, she lived in London and was a founding member of the touring group Act 3 Theatre Co., performing in the works of Noel Coward, Anton Chekhov and adaptations of Edith Wharton. She also has been involved in theater projects in Ethiopia and India, and has been a Fellow at The Royal Geographical Society in London since 1993.

A former teacher and longtime friend of St. John's, Brody, the director, is an award-winning stage director, master teacher, former actress and casting director who has spent the past 30 years helping and developing actors. In 1980, she founded Acting Studio Chicago and has been a casting director since 1986. Her casting company, Jane Brody Casting, now known as Paskal-Rudnicke Casting, was instrumental in casting movies and TV shows such as "Groundhog Day," "The Women of Brewster Place," "A League of Their Own" and "Public Enemies." Her former students include Michael Shan-

"I am so excited to be working with Jane on this project," St. John said. "Jane is terrific, and she got things really moving. I'm very grateful to her. She's the best.

"I did the read-through for her, and that was that. The rest is history. There might be one or two that's good, but there is absolutely no one better than Jane."

So how did "Bette Davis on the Edge" end up having its world premiere in Michigan City? Through a unique turns of events.

After a Chicago theater didn't work out for the play, St. John and Brody started looking for a suitable replacement. While at Chicago's Royal George Theatre, the two met a friendly couple, Jan and Marian Dick, who were seated in the lobby and offered a helpful solution to their problem.

Jan is acting president of Festival Players Guild, which operates Mainstreet Theatre, home to Canterbury Summer Theatre. Jan and Marian insisted on offering Mainstreet as the site for the premiere. Brody was familiar with the area, so she and St. John accepted the invitation.

"The moral of this story is that one should always talk to strangers in lobbies, and that there are no strangers," St. John said with a laugh.

# PNC Hosts "FLIGHT" Exhibit

Purdue University-North Central Odvssev Arts and Cultural Events Series will present the exhibit "FLIGHT," lithographs compiled by the International Rescue Committee, through May 31, 2015.

The series of 12 lithographs, each produced by a modern master of art, represent personal interpretations of the struggle to freedom people faced under dire circumstances. Three hundred sets of the lithographs were produced, the originals destroyed.

The International Rescue Committee was created in 1933, the same year Adolph Hitler became chancellor of the German Reich. It was formed by Albert Einstein, educator John Dewey, Eleanor Roosevelt and others, with the mission being to help those trying to escape the Nazis.

American journalist Varian Fry was asked to carry out a rescue operation to help those trying to flee Europe, among them artists, writers and other intellectuals in France who faced certain death. With \$3,000 strapped to the inside of his pant leg, Fry infiltrated Nazi-occupied France and made it possible for more than 2,000 refugees to come to America.

The committee exists to this day, and has aided millions of refugees.

In the 1960s, Fry was asked to assemble a collection of art the IRC commissioned to help raise money for its refugee aid. Some of the contributing artists had been brought to freedom through the IRC. The effort was completed in 1971 and included the works of Joan Miró, Marc Chagall, Robert Motherwell, Alexander Calder, Jacque Lipchitz and Adolph Gottlieb. Fry died in 1967 at 59 before the collection was completed.

One of the "FLIGHT" collections was purchased in 1971 by Warren and Lynda Meeker, supporters of the International

Rescue Committee and friends of Leo Cherne, chair of the IRC Board of Directors.

In 2014, Lynda Meeker donated the art to Sinai Temple in Michigan City in memory of her husband. The works exhibited at PNC are on loan from the temple.

The exhibit can be viewed in the PNC Library-Student-Faulty Building student lounge, Room 062. Building hours are 7 a.m. to 11 p.m. Monday through Friday and 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday. The building is closed Sundays.

# History, Tradition Focus of Polish Heritage Festival

Heritage, history, family and tradition.

All will be celebrated during the third annual Polish Heritage Festival on Sunday, Sept. 14, at International Friendship Gardens, 2055 E. U.S. 12.

People of Polish descent first arrived in the new world at the Virginia Colony in 1608. Their skilled craftsmanship was a welcome addition as the colony struggled to grow and survive. These early settlers quickly assimilated with other colonists, but retained the memories brought with them across the sea through foods, the arts and music, which they in turn passed down to their children.

These old world traditions added to the fabric of American culture — this is their heritage.

The celebration at the Gardens begins at 11 a.m. with a Polish-English Mass celebrated under the direction of the Rev. Steve Kosinski from All Saints Catholic Church, Hammond Ind. The Wedding Garden canopy will shade celebrants as they enjoy a choir singing traditional hymns of the faith and hear a message of inspiration in two languages. A host of young people in traditional colorful Polish attire will form the backdrop to the event in a garden awash in foliage of the season. A representative of the Consulate General of the Republic of Poland in Chicago will greet guests and join in the celebration of Mass.

At noon, a sumptuous feast will be served in the Celebration Garden. Festivalgoers will heap their plates with traditional Polish fare prepared by Cavalier Inn, Hammond. There will be plenty of tasty *pierogi*, pots of steaming *golabki* and, of course, juicy Polish sausage (*kielbasa*) to tempt the taste buds. The beer garden will provide a variety of domestic brews and a special Polish beer that should not be missed. All would agree that for a real taste of Poland, there is nothing like the culinary offerings of Cavalier Inn.

No celebration of Polish heritage would be complete without the joyous, energetic and lively music of the people, and wonderfully costumed dancers, who whorl, gallop and stomp to its contagious rhythms.

At 12:30 p.m., the enthusiastic young folks of Wesoly Lud will take to the stage. There is a certain sparkle and light that shines from the eyes of young adults who are inspired by the traditions of their grandparents, who honor the heritage from which they spring. These young people from Chicago will swing through the afternoon with grace, agility and enthusiasm, delighting young and old alike.

New to the festival this year is the "Male Wici" Youth Dancers, who will perform at 3 p.m. on the main stage in the Celebration Garden. These young people are sure to inspire a pride in the continuation of their heritage.

The entire day will be filled with the joyous sounds of Eddie Sienkowski and the E-Z tones, a band that has been a tradition in the area for more than 40 years. No written music is used by these musicians as they carry the refrains of familiar polkas in their hearts and pass them, with joy, directly to the hearts of all who hear them. Everyone is invited to join them and dance the polka.

Vendors and displays of Polish culture will be in the Celebration Garden. Guests are invited to stroll by them to see the Polish pottery of Krystyna Sweeney, the ornate wood carvings of Robert Tylisz or take home a souvenir of Poland. There will be a raffle of Polish items and a booth displaying artifacts of the history and traditions of Poland. Baker's Dozen, a favorite from last year, will return, offering delicious Polish bakery products.

Theresa Child will demonstrate the folk art of *Pisanki*, or egg decorating, a process described as "wax resist," a skill she learned from her grandmother. These beautiful creations, with their delicate filigree, are stunning examples of art from Poland.

For the third year in a row, local partners have united to host a visit from Wilderness Inquiry's Canoemobile - a fleet of six 24-foot Voyageur canoes rolling into Michigan City on Sept. 15-20 to educate local youth while paddling Trail Creek.

-based education on urban rivers and waterways nationwide. In collaboration with the Trail Creek Watershed, local partner organizations, which include the Indiana Department of Natural Resources, La Porte County Soil and Water Conservation District, Urban Waters, Izaak Walton League, Michigan City Sanitary District, Shirley Heinze Land Trust, Dunes Learning Center, National Park Service, Michigan City Parks and Northwest Indiana Paddling Association, will bring a wide array of educational opportunities as part of the week-long effort. Activities will focus on water ecology, fishing, the river's history, wildlife, water safety and paddling.

The Canoemobile will tour 24 cities this year, including New York City, Philadelphia, Washington, D.C., and Michigan City, serving more than 7,500 kids. Since its inception in 2010, it has served more than 10,000 students, addressing nature deficit disorder, summer learning loss and the achievement gap. Participants will experience Trail Creek from 24-foot, handmade voyageur canoes that seat nine participants and are captained by trained guides.

A public event is planned on Trail Creek on Saturday, Sept. 20, following the "Beaches and Blueways" scheduled from 9 a.m. to noon. Participants can explore the shoreline from the safety and stability of a Voyageur canoe. Wilderness Inquiry provides all the necessary equipment. No experience or registration is necessary.

# Old Lighthouse Museum Honors Michigan City Fire Department

What do you do when you have one turnout coat and helmet, one dress blue uniform and hat, a plethora of photos and a million memories?

You create an exhibit honoring the Michigan City Fire Department back through the years.

That's what Old Lighthouse Museum volunteers

Rod and Jan Hoeppner did.

"My dad, Jim Schroll, who passed away in 1998, was a Michigan City fireman from 1948 to 1968," Jan said in a press release. "His dress uniform and fire turnout coat have been hanging in one of our closets since 2002 when our mom, Pat, passed away.

"Childhood memories of being a fireman's kid abound, as they do for all firemen's kids. Visiting the stations with my brothers, Jim, Jerry and Garry...my dad giving my Brownie troop a tour of Central Station when we were in second grade...when

my dad would be called into work on a day off to assist on big fires and our mom would listen to the radio to try to keep track of what was happening... hearing the stories of the fires from the previous day at work, and learning lessons of what to do if we were to find ourselves in similar situations.

"When thinking of an exhibit, it was the obvious choice."

The connection to the Michigan City Fire Department for the Hoeppners, however, was not one-sided.

"My great-grandfather, Fred Schultz, son of Dr. Henry Schultz who immigrated from Germany to

evolved into the Coast Guard," Rod said.

He has a couple of the original certificates his great-grandfather earned as a member of Michigan City's Osceola Hook and Ladder Co. No. 1 in 1890 and 1892.

Rod began to hunt through the Old Lighthouse Museum archives. He began to accumulate many old Fire Department photos and articles, back as far as the 1880s. They added photos from the publications put out by the Michigan City Fire Department through the years, along with photos and articles from Schroll's own scrapbooks that chronicled years of the Michigan City Fire Department.

The exhibit covers fire stations, fire trucks, firemen and some of the big fires. Thanks to Assistant Chief Daryl Westphal, it also contains a set of the clothes firemen wear into fires in present day. That allows visitors to compare what firemen wore previously to today's gear. Westphal also has donated the nameplates from several

past fire trucks.

Michigan City firemen who lost their lives in the line of duty are also honored. The names and photos of Alfred "Legs" Zoch, George Neulieb, George Dabagia and Lee Brady are displayed.

Jan clearly remembers Dabagia and Brady.

"They were good friends of my dad," she said. But along with them is a name some people may not be familiar with.

Harold Nolen was a young man in his 20s who lost his life in the line of duty back in 1921.

Expressing his appreciation, Michigan City Fire Chief Ronnie Martin said, "I applaud Rod and Jan for capturing the rich history and tradition of one of America's most heroic professions."

Next, Karol heartily sang "Fools Rush In." The next words after the title are "Where Angels Fear to Tread." Another of my favorites was next. "Don't Fence Me In" was performed by the quartet of Laura, Noel, Karol and Dan. Though not mentioned in the program, the song appeared in the movie "Paleface" with Bob Hope, Jane Russell and Bing Crosby. Another song in this movie was "Buttons and Bows," which became "my song." I even named my male Siamese cat Buttons. In the very early part of the program, Frank belted out "You'll Never Know." What "Will You Never Know?" "Just How Much I Love You." That could be a game.



The last selection of the afternoon was "Rum and Coca Cola" sung by a female trio of Felicia, Deb and Laura. I remember hearing that song when I was in high school, and I could relate my after school experience with those two ingredients...but I won't do that. Some things are better left to one's imagination!

A short intermission gave entertainers a chance to rest their vocal chords and the audience a chance to visit with friends and stretch their legs. Two women shared an umbrella and found it cooler beneath its shade. Others wore hats to be more comfortable. Deb, one of the soloists, wore a summer hat and a delightfully flowery dress. During intermission, some people moved underneath the shaded patio where a delightful breeze blew through. Others fanned themselves.

The crowd applauded heartily to indicate they would consider returning to the mansion again next year for such a great performance. Those who still had time before they had to leave stopped underneath the patio to have Barker Mansion iced tea, water or coffee with an array of chocolate and non-chocolate cookies. And, again, more time to visit with friends or meet new ones.

I chatted with Angie Zdyb, Trail Creek, and her daughter, Dolores. Both volunteer at the mansion. Dolores sometimes guides tours. Angie not only volunteers at Barker Mansion, but also attends events there.

The 13 sculptures were created by artists from all over the



Music Director Robin Fountain will host a Pre-Concert Conversation at 3 p.m. EDT in the auditorium, offering insight into the music and music-makers.



A variety of free games and activities for all ages starts at 6 p.m. The band Black Water Levee will provide musical entertainment. Food vendors will have items for sale.




In my role as nursing chair for Michigan City Area Schools, I was able to help organize this event and participate as a volunteer. It was so gratifying to watch the

# **PNC Receives 9/11 Sculpture**

Purdue University-North Central has received, as a gift, a large marble sculpture commemorating the 9/11 attacks that will become part of its permanent collection.

The sculpture will be unveiled and dedicated during a brief ceremony as part of PNC's 9/11 memorial service Thursday, Sept. 11, marking the 13th anniversary of the attacks on the World Trade Center. The public is invited. The service starts promptly at 7:30 a.m. at Schwarz Hall. A moment of silence will be observed at 8:03 a.m., signifying the time the second plane struck the South Tower of the World Trade Center. The event ends at 8:30 a.m. Light refreshments will be served.

The sculpture, "Lexeme VIII," is a gift from internationally acclaimed artist Bill Barrett and his wife, Debora. The Barretts will attend the memorial service and dedication. Judy Jacobi, PNC assistant vice chancellor of marketing and campus relations, contacted the Barretts in June about hosting one of Bill's pieces as part of PNC's Odyssey sculpture collection. Instead, the Barretts offered "Lexeme VIII" as a gift. A Purdue alumnus, Thomas Lawyer, and his family co-sponsored transportation of the piece from Carrara, Italy.

Barrett, born in 1934 in California, attended high school in South Bend. Over the years, he made a name for himself by shaping aluminum and bronze into abstract sculptures. He has a studio in New York City just 10 blocks from what is now known as Ground Zero. In the aftermath of the attacks, he began a series of work he called "Lexeme," which grew to 15 pieces in total.

The sculpture is made of marble. It measures 11 feet high, 8 feet wide and 6 feet deep. PNC will keep it on permanent display on campus. The public may visit any time the campus is open. Parking is free, but guests are asked to not park in the "A" or reserved spaces. More information is available by calling Jacobi at (219) 785-5200, Ext. 5593.

With the start of school, I can't help but think back before the days of closed lunches at Elston Senior and Junior High Schools, and all of the great places a starving student could get lunch.

There was Belle's Grill at Barker and Franklin, The Sugar Bowl and the Hilltop Restaurants between Williams and Ripley streets. All three were great places for lunch. My lunchtime pal through most of junior high school and part of senior high was Chuck Lungren.

Chuck and I would race down Pine Street to Eighth Street to the little train car called Harold's Diner, across from Sears, because they only had 10 stools at the counter and you had to hurry to get one. Hamburgers were just a quarter, and your mouth would water while you listened to them sizzle on the hot griddle. The buns were grilled and the steaming burger placed upon it: well worth running for. A really great lady, Mrs. Feldman, bought the place, always welcoming starving students.

On alternate days, we would go to Woolworth's and get those great hot dogs with the grilled buns. The buns were flat on the sides, buttered and placed on the grill until they were nice and toasty. The dogs rested deep in the bun, making plenty of room for your "fixins." I always had two.

Maybe one day we would have a Hoagie filled with meat, cheese, lettuce and tomato and the best vinegar and oil dressing. It was a whopping 39 cents, if memory serves correctly. Some days, we would top off lunch with a huge bag of hot, fresh popcorn.

Some days, we would go to the Eighth Street Cafe owned by Norm Hutmacher. He used to feed those great Fighting Red Devil basketball teams before the games. I used to like the open-faced turkey sandwich with dressing, mashed potatoes and gravy: Just the thing to warm you up for the walk back to school those cold and windy winter days.

If you are a 60-something like me, I am sure you remember these things...and more.





# THIS WEEK IN HISTORY



On September 11, 1677, Maine became the first American colony to pass a law against the public sale of liquor.

**On September 11, 1847**, at Andre's Eagle Ice Cream Saloon, in Pittsburg, the audience sang Stephen Foster's *Oh Susanna*. This was reported to have been the first public performance of the song.

On September 11, 1897, a strike in Pennsylvania, Ohio and West Virginia ended with coal miners winning an eight-hour workday.

On September 11, 1927, an American meat packer announced the production of a frankfurter with a zipper. The instructions were: "boil the hot dog in its zippered casing and then discard it." There is no record as to how many, following these instructions, threw away the hot dog and kept the casing.

On September 11, 1954, the Miss America Pageant was shown on television for the first time. The winner was Lee Ann Meriwether, Miss California.

On September 11, 1961, "Bozo's Circus" made its TV debut on WGN.

**On September 11, 1962**, the Beatles recorded their first single – "Love Me Do" and "P.S. I Love You" – at Abbey Road Studios in London.

On September 11, 1985, Pete Rose, of the Cincinnati Reds, got hit number 4,192, breaking the record held by Ty Cobb.

**On September 12, 1886,** the opening of the New York stage show, *The Black Crook*, marked the beginning of the era of "girlie" shows in the United States.

On September 12, 1972, the situation comedy "Maude" premiered on CBS.

On September 12, 1984, the Chicago Bulls selected Michael Jordan as their No. 1 choice in the NBA draft

On September 12, 1992, the space shuttle *Endeavour* blasted off with Mark Lee and Jan Davis, the first married couple in space; Mae Jemison, the first black woman in space; and Mamoru Mohri, the first Japanese citizen to fly on a U.S. spaceship.

On September 12, 1994, a stolen single-engine Cessna crashed into the south lawn of the White House, coming to rest against the executive mansion; the pilot, Frank Corder, was killed.

On September 13, 1872, presidential candidate George Francis Train described his qualification for office as follows: "I am that wonderful, eccentric, independent, extraordinary genius and political reformer of America, who is sweeping off all the politicians before him like a hurricane. I am your modest, diffident, unassuming friend, the future President of America -- George Francis Train." He received no votes in the general election the following November.

On September 14, 1741, George Fredrick Handel, having worked without interruption for 23 days, finished his composition of *The Messiah*.

**On September 14, 1886**, George K. Anderson, of Memphis, TN, patented the typewriter ribbon.

On September 14, 1901, President William McKinley died, in Buffalo, of gunshot wounds inflicted eight days earlier. Vice President Theodore Roosevelt succeeded him.

On September 14, 1972, "The Waltons" premiered on CBS.

On September 15, 1949, "The Lone Ranger" premiered on ABC television.

**On September 15, 1966**, *Gemini 2*, after a record 3-day space flight, splashed down in the Atlantic Ocean.

On September 15, 2003, the WUSA soccer league shut down operations five days before the Women's World Cup, saying it didn't have enough money to stay in business for a fourth season.

On September 16, 1620, after two previous false starts — 74 men and 28 women — along with a small crew, set sail from Plymouth, England aboard *HMS Mayflower*. The "Mayflower," originally designed as a wine ship, reached Provincetown, MA, on December 26, 1620.

On September 16, 1908, General Motors first filed papers of incorporation.

On September 16, 1953, "The Robe," the first movie presented in the widescreen process Cinemascope, had its world premiere in New York.

On September 16, 1966, the Metropolitan Opera opened its season in the new opera house at New York's Lincoln Center. The audience saw the premiere of Samuel Barber's "Anthony and Cleopatra."

**On September 16, 1971,** citing increased postal rates and declining advertising revenue, "Look" magazine announced it was discontinuing operations.

On September 16, 1972, "The Bob Newhart Show" premiered on CBS.

On September 17, 1920, the American Professional Football Association — precursor of the National Football League – was formed in Canton, OH.

On September 17, 1972, "M\*A\*S\*H" premiered on CBS.

**On September 17, 1976,** NASA publicly unveiled the space shuttle *Enterprise* at ceremonies in Palmdale, CA.

On September 17, 1994, Heather Whitestone of Alabama was crowned Miss America, the first ever deaf contestant to win the title.





Kind of a posh place for a cop's daughter, but Moran never questioned her dad since he could help him get into the tight-knit Murder Squad...if he wanted to.

Holly met Moran when she was only 9 and the witness to a murder. Now, she presents him with evidence that could help in an unsolved murder case. Just last year, 16-year-old Christopher Harper was found murdered, his head bashed in with a garden hoe on the grounds at St. Kilda's. He had attended Colm's, a private boys school not far from St. Kilda's.

Holly gives Moran a picture of the dead boy with the words "I know who killed him" underneath. She says she found it on the board known as The Secret Place, a bulletin board at St. Kilda's where the girls can vent their feelings anonymously. What a stroke of luck! What with the lack of evidence in the past months, this may be Moran's ticket into the Murder Squad.

Moran meets Det. Antoinette Conway, the lead detective on the Harper case. He's not ready for the unpleasant Conway, who's rude, short-tempered and also a product of inner-city Dublin. It is obvious she's had to work harder than any man to prove her place in this boys' club of cops. That's OK. Moran can handle it. After all, he just wants to make himself worthy of notice by the powers that be.

Since Moran has a connection with Holly, the decision is made to temporarily release him from Cold Case and let him work with Conway. Armed with the new evidence, the pair visit St. Kilda's and begin the process of first narrowing down the



number of girls who have knowledge of Harper. It doesn't take long to get the list down to two different groups of fourth-year students: Holly Mackey and her friends Selena, Julia and Rebecca, and the group led by Joanne Heffernan ("queen bee of cool crowd") and friends Orla, Gemma and Alison.

Not making the headmistress very happy, but realizing that dealing with the police is better than dealing with angry parents, she allows Moran and Conway to interview each of the eight girls separately. This is where teenagers' natural aversion to adults and Moran's natural ability to get people to talk to him become interesting, indeed.

Friendship at the teenage level can be complicated, hard to understand, but very loyal. Moran's and Conway's tactics of asking seemingly simple questions that make the girls wary eventually give the detectives an ever-evolving picture of misplaced loyalty, brutal rivalry and a whole lot of teenage hormones.

As the detectives keep honing in on what really happened last year at St. Kilda's, the story uses alternating chapters to take us back a year and unfold the story of what was going on then, but not to the extent of giving it all away. Oh, no. It will take you to the stunning conclusion of the investigation to see "oh what a web we weave, when first we practice to deceive."

French gives an amazing wealth of knowledge about teenagers and their secret world. I was mesmerized by how easily she slipped into their feelings of love and friendship. But don't forget the adults in this story — they're pretty complicated, too.

At 452 pages, this is not a quick read, but one you will relish every word of.
