

Perhaps it was the airplane? The house had two garages: one for a car and one for the airplane it was assumed we all would have in the future. There also was the dish washer that doubled as a clothes washer.

Some of these elements did not show up in the future, while some would need the future to work properly, such as the glass exterior/air conditioning combination.

Nonetheless, The House of Tomorrow made exciting steps

forward. It, and other homes at the World's Fair, later made an incredible journey across Lake Michigan to Beverly Shores.

Not long ago, these homes seemed doomed to decay, to be lost forever. But with the collaboration of the National Park Service, Indiana Landmarks and those leasing and repairing the homes, these marvels remain, brainchildren of creative designers and builders.

The first National Treasure in Indiana designated by the National Trust, Indiana Landmarks has joined in the effort to save The House of Tomorrow. With a \$2 million cost, Indiana Landmarks President Marsh Davis said, "Our goal is to preserve this outstanding building and raise awareness and appreciation of The House of Tomorrow, the architect George Fred Keck and The Century of Progress, both regionally and nationally, and to raise the money to make this possible."

Indiana Landmarks, Davis continued, is counting on "lots" of donations. The House of Tomorrow will join other great modernist masterpieces such as the Farnsworth House in Plano, Ill., and the Glass House in New Canaan, Conn.

As a side benefit, the restoration will contribute to other projects in the United States, training National Trust's H.O.P.E. Crew — young people learning preservation crafts while helping protect historic sites on public lands.

Architecture critic Paul Goldberger points out how special the landmark is.

"The House of Tomorrow...is one of the true early monuments of American modernism, brimming over with a uniquely American idealism and earnestness about the 20th century," he said.

"George Fred Keck was...interested in casting his net wide and demonstrating how future architecture would present new ideas about technology, about space, about materials. He put all of this together into a whole that is truly one of a kind."

Totally clad in glass on the second and third floors, mechanical engineers said that due to the expansive use of glass, the house couldn't be heated. Actually, the level of solar heat gain reduced the need for mechanical heating. Keck said he "discovered" so-

lar heating when he found workers inside the house wearing only shirtsleeves one winter day. Still, there was a problem: during the summer, the sunlight was too great for the home's air-conditioning system to handle and it failed, closing the house several times.


The interior is designed around a central staircase, with most rooms radiating off — a very efficient and open design. The house will be restored using today's common thermo-pane windows and a new heating and airconditioning system. So well designed and strong was the home's steel core, upgrading will cause no problems.

Just how and why did this home, and others at

the fair, end up in Beverly Shores? And how do you get a house up onto a dune from Lake Michigan?

The answers are, "Because someone wanted to elevate more than just the houses" and "Carefully."

The 1933 World's Fair remains a marvel of scientific and engineering feats. "Your Book of the Fair" told arrivals: "You will enter A Century of Progress for the first time perhaps like an explorer — curious and eager — penetrating an amazingly rumored domain in search of treasure. It well might be, whether

by day or by night you come, that the veritable bombardment of color and light that greets you may create the illusion of stepping within a giant jewel, its myriad facets flashing countless rays of beauty."

One area, "The Home and Industrial Arts Group," spotlighted houses with advances in modern materials, architecture and interior design. These modern homes made great use of sunlight and open living spaces. With innovations such as air conditioning, central heat and time-saving kitchen appliances, many of these were wonders predicting how we would live in the future. Another goal was the intended affordability of these homes.

Why did the houses travel to the Indiana side of the lake? Developer Robert Bartlett wanted to draw people to his new resort community, Beverly Shores. So, he bought these "myriad facets flashing countless rays of beauty" and transported them by barge across the lake, to continue the excitement they generated at the World's Fair.

Which gets you almost there, but not really *there*. How do you hoist these houses up onto the dunes? It took a series of jacking maneuvers from the barges: hoisted up, ever-higher platforms made of lumber. Photos show the Wieboldt-Rostone House on its barge, and as one of the "parade" of homes being jacked up the dunes.

Each house has unique design and construction. The Wieboldt-Rostone House was framed in steel. The materials that combined to make Rostone, slate and lime came from Indiana, while the chemists and engineers who developed the material came from Purdue University. The first manufacturing plant was built near Riverside, Ind., because a large supply of shale was nearby. Rostone I could be made in many colors and prefabricated to exact shapes and sizes. However, the material did not hold up well. The original Rostone, now covered by a synthetic material, Perma-stone, can only be seen surrounding the front door exterior, the entrance area and around the living room fireplace in the current house.

The Florida House also pointed to the future, constructed from pre-cast concrete. Its exterior and

interior design, however, were the most influential aspects. "Open" best describes the place, a facet of living that certainly has become more and more important in the modern era. With exterior overhangs, floor-to-ceiling windows and rooftop terraces, living in the open was possible as never before. The interior gently shocked, with its open floorplan and spaciousness.

The whole place borrowed modern ideas from the Bauhaus and Le Corbusier, seeing a house as a "machine for living" and "designed from the inside out." Uncrowded, flexible and simple, there would be no cramped rooms, nor tripping over oversized furniture, nor even unnecessary cleaning. Uncluttered cabinets, lack of surface decoration, bathtubs and other built-ins that went all the way down to the floor left few hidden, difficult spaces for dirt to collect. Although this dwelling was designed specifically for subtropical climates, its influence on today's homes is easy to see.

Another home designed for a special site was the Cypress Log Cabin. Intended for a mountain environment, it had a lodge ambience in its interior decorations and its landscaping. None of that was kept when the house was moved to Beverly Shores. Flint Alm and his wife, Jamie, restored the Cypress Log Cabin. Its major original purpose does remain, however, to demonstrate the qualities and uses of cypress. Cypress is

now seen as a durable building product and often used as natural wood siding and decks.

The Armco-Ferro House was restored by Chris-

toph Lichtenfeld. He noted, "There was water running down, corroding everything. Had anyone what known it would've been like, it would've been condemned or no one would've taken it."

Battling through rusted-out supports and decaying window frames, the Lichtenfelds labored on, enlisting Iron Workers Local 395, which agreed to allow 14 of its apprentices to help with the project. This house incorporates all the Fair Committee's design criteria: new ideas, a house that could be mass-produced and affordable for the average American family. The construction system was totally new, corrugated steel panels bolted together. Porcelain-enameled steel panels made by the Ferro Enamel Corp. created the exterior. A similar construction system was used in the post World War II prefabricated Lustron houses.

All of these homes, with their "Century of Progress" theme, new building materials and new construction techniques, can be seen from the outside at any time. There is off-street parking available, and information in front of each dwelling. Indiana Dunes National Lakeshore offers a tour of the interiors each October. Each home deserves to be seen, and preserved for future generations to be seen. They embody our hopes, our past architecture and, most importantly, our creativity.







An annual holiday tradition, Barker Mansion, 631 Washington St., will open its decorated rooms to the community for viewing.

"We had a spectacular performance last year," Bauman said. "It was a deeply moving experience for all of us — soloists, chorus, orchestra and the audience.

"I'm excited to once again dive into the this magnificent music and guide the talented forces, including four outstanding soloists, into another deeply spiritual experience."

The presentation is at 3 p.m. Sunday, Dec. 18, at First Presbyterian Church, 121 W. Ninth St. A preview performance (dress rehearsal) open to the public is at 10:30 a.m. Saturday, Dec. 17. Bauman has begun his 22nd season as music director of La Porte County Symphony Orchestra, and his 15th season conducting the Northwest Indiana Symphony Youth Orchestra, which in 2014 presented an international tour in Austria and Germany.

The soloists include soprano Sarah Gartshore, mezzo-soprano Quinn Middleman, tenor Matthew Daniel and bass Peter van de Graaff. All are experienced, professional "Messiah" soloists who have performed throughout the United States, Canada and Europe.

The Chicago Tribune recently described Gartshore as "particularly impressive" and possessing a "rich, shining soprano" after performances with Music of the Baroque and Chicago's



Apollo Chorus. Her performance of excerpts from Stravinsky's "The Rake's Progress" with the Richmond (Va.) Symphony (VA) inspired *The Times-Dispatch* to write, "Soprano Sarah Gartshore sang the arias with strong characterization, full-bodied tone and unusually clear diction, promising some fine portrayals of Anne Trulove in future productions of this opera."

She also is heard performing with guitarists Sergio and Odair Assad on "Merry a Holiday Journey," a CD of Christmas selections by violinist Nadja Salerno-Sonnenberg and friends.

Praised for her "expressive" and "persuasive" performances, Middleman is equally at home on the operatic and concert stages, and maintains a wide variety of repertoire ranging from early music to bel canto to world premieres. She also boasts a background

as a professional orchestral and solo oboist.

Area performances include the Chicago premiere of Philip Glass' "The Perfect," and alongside Dawn Upshaw, Sanford Sylvan, John Harbison, Lucy Shelton and Kayo Iwama as a Fellow at the Tanglewood Music Center in 2015 and 2016. She received many accolades this year for singing the world premiere of Harold Meltzer's "Variations on a Summer Day" for the Tanglewood Festival of Contemporary Music. In 2015, she sang alongside Lucy Shelton in the premiere of Yehudi Wyner's "Sonnet: In the Arms of Sleep."

Quinn received her master's degree at Northwestern University, where she was seen as Marcellina ("Le nozze di Figaro"), Dinah ("Trouble in Tahiti") and Sister Helen Prejean in the Chicago premiere of Heggie's "Dead Man Walking." She co-founded the new student opera company Chamber Opera Initiative and performed the title role in Handel's "Ariodante" with the company in 2015.

Daniel is in his 12th season with Lyric Opera of

As a soloist, he has performed many opera roles, some of which include Pinkerton in "Madama Butterfly," Rodolfo in "La Boheme," Hoffmann in "Tales of Hoffmann," Nemorino in "L'Elisir d'amore," The Duke in "Rigoletto," Turiddu in "Cavalleria Rusticana," Eisenstein in "Die Fledermaus," Canio in "I Pagliacci" and King Kaspar in "Amahl and the Night Visitors" with David Aiken tours. Opera companies he has worked with include Opera Grand Rapids, Harrisburg Opera, Indiana Opera North, Opera!Lenawee, Aspen Opera Theater and most recently Harbor Country Opera. Orchestras he's appeared with include LCSO, Adrian Symphony Orchestra, Elkhart Symphony,



Illinois Valley Symphony Orchestra, Charlotte Philharmonic, South Bend Symphony and Indianapolis Symphony.

Hailed by critics as possessing a "resplendent voice," a "rich, burnished sound" with "formidable skill" and a "commanding grace and strength," van de Graaff recently completed a seven-concert tour in China. In Europe, he was a featured soloist at the International Vocal Symposium in Salzburg. He also has performed with Lyric Opera of Chicago, Florentine Opera, Milwaukee Opera, Rochester Opera, Chicago Opera Theater and Cedar Rapids Opera.

His recordings include three intermezzos on the Naxos label and Menotti's "The Medium," and Vorisek "Mass in B-Flat" and Mozart arias and duets, all on the Cedille label.

The Woman in Cabin 10 by Ruth Ware (hardcover, \$26 retail; also available as an eBook)

Not long ago, I reviewed Ware's first book, <u>In a Dark, Dark Wood</u>. A tough act to follow, but I must say, this book is even better! The psychological mystery, played out in the cold waters of the North Sea, will leave you speechless! But, I'm getting ahead of myself, so let me give you just enough information to whet your reading appetite.

Laura (Lo) Blacklock is single and 32. She lives in England and works for a travel magazine called *Velocity*. After 10 years on the job, she has yet to become the hot journalist she envisioned herself to be. But now, opportunity just might have knocked on her door...


A rich businessman, Lord Richard Bullmer, is going into the luxury cruise arena with the maiden voyage of his ship, *Aurora Borealis*. Not as big as most cruise vessels, the *Aurora* is a "...boutique tencabin cruise liner conceived as a super-luxury retreat for hopping the Scandinavian coastline."

Lo's boss has received an invitation for the inaugural trip, but can't make it. She calls in Lo and asks her to take her place. Wow! What an opportunity for Lo to show her talent and finally become a feature writer.

There's one small problem...isn't there always? Just a few days ago, a burglar entered her small basement flat. She awoke face to face with him. Fortunately, he got away with only her purse. No physical damage to her, but much psychological damage. See, Lo has anxiety attacks and has been on meds for a long time. The incident throws her a curve, and she becomes sleep deprived, drinking too much.

Lo pulls herself together enough, however, to take on the assignment after talking to her boyfriend, Angel Lewis. The whole incident, which jumps out at you right on Page 1, is the defining incident that will shape the coming events and the eventual outcome. It's important to see what drives Lo's personality and problems. You may or may not like her, but she is a survivor. She may not know it at the time, but coming events will cause her to face her fears head on.

Arrangements are made, the ship boarded by several businessmen, a famous photographer and several other journalists for high-class travel magazines. Lo is put in Cabin 9 at the end of the corridor: a pleasant and nicely furnished cabin. Getting



ready for the first night formal dinner and cocktail party, Lo discovers she has forgotten her mascara. She knocks on Cabin 10 next door, and a young woman answers, obviously upset to see Lo there instead of...who? She gives her the mascara, and Lo eventually makes it up to the formal lounge, where she is surprised to see Ben Howard, former mate at *Velocity* and former boyfriend.

After dinner and a cocktail party, during which she drinks too much after too many sleepless nights, Lo falls into bed, only to wake up suddenly around 4 a.m. She's sure she heard a woman scream, followed by the sound of someone being thrown overboard. It's coming

from Cabin 10.

Lo calls the captain, who's skeptical of her story. Why? Because no one has been assigned Cabin 10. The businessman supposed to have come along bowed out at the last minute, so that cabin is empty. He even takes her around to meet the crew of the ship, but no one matches the description of the woman Lo saw earlier.

Even Ben suggests her anti-anxiety pills, coupled with too much to drink and too little sleep, might have made her susceptible to a bad dream. Hmmm? No, Lo is adamant. She knows what she saw and heard. But how do you persuade everyone else when Cabin 10, which had the woman there, her clothes strewn on the bed, is suddenly empty and very clean — no clothes, no nothing.

What follows is something Agatha Christie would be proud of: a boat full of suspects, practically all of them making Lo suspicious with their lies and secrets, and a phone and computer unable to pick up any signals until they get to Trondheim, Norway, the next day.

The story is pure adrenaline-fueled reading! What's really going on? Who should Lo trust and who not to? And how far will someone go to keep the secret of Cabin 10?
