# **Book Lovers Heaven**



owadays, there is a convention for everyone. Comic book lovers, action figure collectors, horror industry admirers – you name it, they have a convention for it.

It wasn't until a couple years ago, however, that someone posed the question, "Well, what about book lovers?"

What about book lovers? Where do we go to meet our favorite authors, or get sneak peaks into exciting new books and authors fresh to the scene? By the time they make it to The New York Times Best Sellers List. these books have been out for months, possiyears. Sometimes, the only way to find the next best thing, without help from a newspaper or bookstore, is to hunt for it. Whether you're randomly clicking around on amazon, or pulling every book off the shelf at the local bookstore, it's tough to find something out of the norm.

Two years ago, Reed-POP, the company responsible for New York Comic Con, Chicago Comic & Entertainment Expo, and Star Wars Celebration,

teamed up with BookExpo America to boost the image and attendance of the longest running book fair.

Now, when I hear the term "book fair," I can't help but flash back to grade school when the school library was packed collapsible with cardboard shelves and folding tables loaded with all kinds of books — usually Scholastic titles, in my case — but never anything that really interested me. Even when I was younger, I didn't necessarily like what everyone else did. Sometimes, it felt like people were trying to tell me what to read, instead of providing me with what I wanted to read.

Book Con, I came to discover, was nothing like my grade-school book fairs. I figured there had to be some kind of catch. Maybe it was something to exhibit new or unknown authors. Maybe the tickets would be an absurd amount of money, or maybe they were going to nickel and dime us.

So, I decided to investigate the lineup of authors, surprised to dis-



cover not only recognizable names, but that I was a fan of many of their books, including Ransom Riggs ("Miss Peregrine's Home for Peculiar Children"), Cassandra Clare ("The Mortal Instruments," "The Infernal Devices") and Sherman Alexie ("The Absolutely True Diary of a Part Time Indian").

The first Book Con was held May 31, 2014, in New York City and featured John Grisham, Amy Poehler, Martin Short, Jodi Picoult and Kathy Reichs. Not bad for the first year. The second year featured James Patterson, Alexie, Julianne Moore, Aziz Ansari and Mindy Kaling.

This year's event marked the first time it was held in Chicago — the past two were held in New York City — and boasted a stellar lineup, including more than 40 authors slated to sign autographs, answer questions and interact with fans.

Like any convention, I keep my eye on the lineup, making sure I know who's going to be there, what kind of panels are planned and what the schedule is so I can plan better. Two days before everything the event, seemed pretty standard: same authors, no new cancellations. But as I was scrolling down, a photo caught my eye: a new photo and info: "Ransom Riggs, author of 'Miss Peregrine's Home Children' Peculiar scheduled to attend Chicago Book Con."

My jaw hit the floor.

Ransom Riggs? THE Ransom Riggs? Author of one of my favorite series ever? From that moment on, it was set. I knew who my priorities were. Everything else could wait until after I hunted them down, met them, got their autographs and hopefully snatch a quick photo.

So, I started to do a little more digging. Being used to Wizard World Comic Con, I was shocked to learn that most of the author events were free, or at the least under \$10. Free books and free autographs?? I was in a book lovers heaven.

Held at McCormick Place, the floor opened at 10 a.m. Riggs would sign autographs at 11:30 a.m. I jumped in line for Penguin Random House Publishing, knowing Riggs' booth was part of its setup somewhere, and hoping someone could give me a better time frame. That's when it happened. The man himself passed through the line, trying to get to his booth, and walked right in front of me. Next thing I knew, the line starting moving, faster and faster. I didn't quite know what I was in line for, but hey, it didn't hurt to wait and see. As it turned out, it wasn't a line to meet Riggs...yet. It was a line for the publishing house itself, where guests could go to all the different booths and get free books, chapter samples and a schedule.

The reps at each booth handed out free books and chapter samples like it was nickel candy. I had never experienced anything like it. It was awesome, and that's coming from a certified book-a-holic. Working in a discount bookstore probably doesn't help either, but I digress.



While I waited for the line to begin forming for Riggs, I somehow managed to jump in line for a free giveaway of audio version an of Brothers' the fairytales Grimm - completely unedited. The girls at the booth ended up giving me two, plus posters, because I told them how much I love the Brothers Grimm, and how I collect different editions of their tales. Including the audio book obtained at Book Con, I now have four different versions, including a 1960 edition and the fully unedited edition translated in English for the first time last year.

Considering it took no time at all to get through the line for the Grimm audio book, I was faced with what seemed like an eternity of waiting before we lined up for Riggs, let alone meet him, so I just kind of hovered. Not really sure where the line would start, myself and three other girls made sure one of us would be the start of the line. As fate would have it, I turned around to answer a question someone behind me asked and when I faced the booth again, someone had placed the sign for Riggs right in front of me. I was the first in line!

Finally, the moment arrived. Being so used to Wizard World Comic Con, I knew how some managers and staff could be when it came to asking celebrities for a photo op, but I figured the worst they could do is say no. I was so flustered, my face was boiling to the touch. For some reason, I was more nervous to meet Riggs than any of the actors I've met at other conventions, but I was pleasantly surprised to discover how normal he is. He talked to me like I was one of his friends, or just someone he wanted to make conversation with at a coffee shop. And when I asked for a quick photo, he smiled and said it wasn't a problem at all. 

op and autograph from Riggs, I held back, watching him interact with other fans. He took time with every single one of them, agreeing to photos with every person who asked, never once acting as if he didn't have the time or patience. It was wonderful.

Now that the time-sensitive event had passed without a hitch, I walked around the entire floor and investigated each booth. It was overwhelming. I wasn't used to being around so many books that were little to no charge. I was like a kid in a candy store...no, a bookstore where most of the books are free. There were so many books, and on nearly every subject: Disney, historical, New Age, handmade Greek mythology books with leather bindings and handpainted images, horror, adventure, fantasy, books on fairy gardens, foreign books, stationary kits, handmade puzzles based off of your favorite books, with Harry Potter being the best seller. There even was a wall for guests to write on with a response to the question: What does Harry Potter mean to you? Anyone who knows me knows I couldn't resist writing my answer.

It was all so much to take in at that I had to do at least half a dozen rounds. I gave every booth a fair shot, but some were more vocal than others, nearly throwing free books at me to get my attention. Most of them were horror or fantasy/sci-fi, so I wasn't mad about it. I even had the chance to meet a few first-time authors in random booths, handing out signed copies of their books. By the time I broke for lunch around 1 p.m., I had three totes full of free books, and one with a handful of books I purchased for a fraction of the cost.

# **European Farmers Market**

"I don't know what it is," Three Oaks farmer Leo Jovanovic remarked, "but what happens at Skip's European Farmers Market is magic. It truly is a magical place."

It's Skip's European Farmers Market New Buffalo, operated since 2009 and owned by the Sobecki family, which also own Skip's Restaurant & Catering. Being privately owned, that means cocktails can be served on the Market Day Café patio, along with chef-created breakfast selections and sweets provided by market vendors. Lunch starts at 11 a.m. EDT at the café.

The local attraction also has indoor bathrooms, an ATM and free shuttle service, which transports up to 11 people from New Buffalo at its designated pickup spot during market hours at New Buffalo Savings Bank; however, the shuttle service also is available for scheduled pickups at area hotels, the marinas and rental properties. The shuttle also is available for dining service at the restaurant beginning daily at 5 p.m. EDT.

Vendor fees help add new elements to the market. This year marks the inclusion of the shuttle and ATM.

Vendors offer seasonal produce, herbs, greens, flowers, fruit, honey, Michigan pure maple syrup, a Polish bakery, an Italian deli, breads and rolls, cheeses, jams, jellies, hot sauces, pickles, dip seasonings, teas, coffees, natural bug sprays, hand-crafted essential oil soaps and personal body-care products, handcrafted jewelry, art, home décor, hand-crafted furniture, a mobile pet salon twice a month, massages and clothing.

Updates are posted on the market's facebook page. Search for Skip's European Farmers Market New Buffalo. Hours are 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. EDT Saturday and Sunday through Oct. 9. Call (269) 469-3341 for more information.

The event is hosted by Matt and Sharon Kubik with John and Nora Ryzska. Those attending are requested to take a chair, dish or beverage to share, and artwork to show off. Musical instruments are encouraged.

Artists will have the opportunity to creatively explore the house and grounds to photograph, sketch or paint. Named "Singing Pines" by the original owner, the 1922 home is an arts-and-crafts masterwork directly influenced by the work of Gustav Sitckley and Frank Lloyd Wright. The home was constructed as a weekend estate house for a local manufacturing executive. # Uptown Fashion Affair More Evidence of Michigan City's Creative Rebirth

Women huddled around pedestal tables, laughing, gently cradling glasses of wine in their hands. Men reclined against the walls, shooting the breeze with friends while sampling local brews. Club-like music throbbed from overhead speakers.

Once the fashion show began, all eyes turned to the runway, the music intensifying. The models made their entrances, large lights casting intrigu-

ing shadows of their likenesses on the screen behind them. Thunderous applause followed each set of models.

It was then I turned to my wife and said, "This is downtown Michigan City on a Friday night. This is awesome!"

Nothing could tarnish the thrill, the adrenaline rush of experiencing Michigan City's artistic and creative rebirth through its Uptown Arts District. Nothing.

Well, not exactly. My 8-year-old son shrieking "You can see their boobies" after the swimsuit models arrived, instigating a ripple effect of giggles, stares and stink-eyes within the crowd, briefly stripped the event of any air of sophistication...but that's besides the point.

The point is, the Uptown Fashion Affair is one cool occasion. More than anything else, it is a cel-

ebration of community, of embracing the kinetic energy we're experiencing as more and more talented individuals make Michigan City their creative hub.

for people," Abigale Thayer, Uptown Fashion Affair's creator and coordinator, told *The Beacher*. "It's not by any means a get-fancy event, but it's something people can look nice or stylish for if they want and sit next to a runway and see what the local shops have.

"There's music, there's lights, there is so much going on that only this event offers right now."

The fifth Uptown Fashion Affair is at 6 p.m. Friday, June 17, at The Uptown Center, 907 Franklin St. The evening will showcase the region's boutiques, salons and artists, along with music, small bites, a cash bar and silent auction. A portion of the proceeds aids Michigan City's Mainstreet Association's efforts to bring live art events to the area.

The idea for the event sprang from Thayer, who in 2010 was working as a stylist at Lakefront Salon & Day Spa when she spoke to a few individuals, including Linda Weber, now owner of Urban Soles, about creating a fashion show/fundraiser for the Uptown Arts District.

"I thought it would be a really great thing that no one had done before," Thayer said, adding with a laugh, "but everyone looked at me like I had three heads."

Nonetheless, all the puzzle pieces snapped into place. The end result, held at The Pearl, which later became The Uptown Center, was a sold-out affair.

"People loved it," Thayer said. "They loved that it was something new and different, and they got to experience something that isn't typical for this area."

Thayer put the event on hold in 2011 because she was pregnant with her son, Oliver, but it resumed in 2012. With more boutiques and other similar shops opening in the UAD, the fashion show had expanded to include samples from numerous establishments. The event also moved to Barker Hall at Trinity Episcopal Church, which she described as in the heart of the city, a great location for three years.

This year, more than 100 models have signed up to be part of the experience, ranging from police of-



ficers to local politicians.

"It is so neat to see them volunteer their time," Thayer said. "They really enjoy it, both the men and women. They really have a great time doing it."

The lineup includes: Luxe Boutique; Paris House of Bridal with Lakefront Salon & Day Spa; The Closet by Franklin Vintage with Elle Salon; Chef Bizzaro Millinery with Salon Cilla; Urban Soles Inc.; The Nest Michigan City; Darling with Timothy Jeffry Salon; Younique Boutique; At the Beach Swimwear Boutique; Man About Town; Rusted Oak; Nichole Schaeffer (art element); Prestige Beauty School; and Ashley Castro Salons. Light bites, included in the ticket cost, hail from Maxine's, Fire & Water, Mucho Mas and Arturo's Baked Goods & More.

The event also has switched locations, returning to The Uptown Center, but not because of any dissatisfaction with Barker Hall.

"We wanted to make the event more user friendly for people who are mildly disabled," Thayer said. "And with this being the fifth year, it's exciting to take it back to where it all started."





# **Training Against Invasive Species**

Indiana Dunes National Lakeshore, in partnership with the Indiana Coastal Invasive Plant Network, will unveil a new opportunity to adopt trails and help keep invasive species from eroding park biodiversity.

The hands-on training is from 9 to 11 a.m. Saturday, June 11, at Paul H. Douglas Center for Environmental Education, 100 N. Lake St., Gary.

Participants will learn about invaders that Northwest Indiana natural-area managers are most concerned about, and habitats where they can be found. They also will be trained on how to report species found to www.eddmaps.org/Indiana or by a smartphone using the free Great Lakes Early Detection Network application. Attendees receive a free set of laminated cards that can be used for species identification in the field. They also will learn about National Lakeshore trails that can be adopted, and what is required of volunteers involved in that effort. Take smartphones to the program.

The Indiana Coastal Invasive Plant Network recently was launched to help call public attention to the area invasive species and their impacts on the natural world. Organizations involved include Indiana Dunes National Lakeshore, The Nature Conservancy, Save the Dunes, the Indiana Department of Natural Resources, Shirley Heinze Land Trust, Coffee Creek Watershed Preserve and the Wildlife Habitat Council.

Program funding came in part from the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration and Indiana Department of Natural Resources, Lake Michigan Coastal Program, the Gaylord and Dorothy Donnelley Foundation and ArcelorMittal.

# FADA : A "COMMUNE OF COOL"

Every now and again, all of the right parts fit together at just the right time. The right players take the stage at just the right moment when the world is ready for their brand of magic.

It is a perfect storm of amazing accomplishment. When with a team of friends, we sometimes became more together than we were as individuals. Often, at the time, we could not see the magic. Only when looking back do we realize what we had done and where we had been.

I write this for our readers so they may experience this rare magic firsthand, in real time, as it is happening and being created by the members of Franklin Arts District Artists.

FADA, as they are known, is a group of friends who share their art and embody the heart and soul of the creative process. They united through mutual support and encouragement in their love of the visual arts. Amid Michigan City's creative rebirth through its Uptown Arts District, FADA is helping lead the charge, real working artists all dedicated to their dreams and making it work on the street.

The group has the common goal of making a difference, of helping people and inspiring others to do what they love. Their little shops and studios

huddled together proclaim, "This is the place to be." It is, in Amy Bowman's words, a "commune of Cool." This group, which will always be friends, intends to "rock the halls of 617 Franklin."

When you walk in the door of FADA, you are greeted by a warren of little studios. Each unique space is an incubator of creative thought. The doors are thrown open and



music flows from each, forming a pleasant blend of rhythms and melodies. The artists often bring their dogs to the shop to greet visitors with a wink and a wag of their tails.

The space is perfectly suited to small studios clustered closely together. The interior of the building originally was designed for Duneland Lutheran High School. For that purpose, the space was divided into individual classrooms that now have been transformed into small private studios and work spaces, each decorated differently. The entire FADA endeavor is infused with a spirit of camaraderie.

Linda Mickevicius, the business head of the group, is the owner and creative force behind Beach Bum Jewels. She collects colored sea glass from local dunes beaches and exotic locations all over the world. She then creates jewelry from these bits of colorful, rounded glass baubles, adds silver accents and bezels' a bit of chain and fine wire, and voila, magic.

Next to Beach Bum is a little jewel of a store run by Linda's daughter, Jamie Kessler, called Treasures by the Lake. Here, you can find beach signs, framed photo-

graphs and other treasures.

At Beachbased Designs, you can meet Cheryl, who has been collecting driftwood from our beaches for 20 years. She loves decorating and creates natu-

rallv twisted sculptures and wall hangings from pieces of weathered driftwood. Her store lends itself to a nautical theme with framed charts photoand graphs of boats and the lake.

Carol Estes invites all to enter her world, which she expresses as "Life as I see it." She is a photographer, as well as a writer of prose and poetry. Her photographs and writing intertwine to create graphics that lend stories to the heart through words and colorfully moving shapes. She has an enthusiasm for life that is contagious.

Cheryl Heninger's studio, Second Chance Artists, is dedicated to giving people a second chance in life. She is a sponsor of Worthy Women Recovery Home. Much of her art is created from repurposed items, and she sells art for struggling artists on consignment.

"If you're a school or recovery group," she said, "give us a chance to consign your art and help give you a second chance." Her studio is a place of hope and a second chance.

April Lynn is a photographer who believes that "people are their own individual pieces of art." She mixes her photographic studies with an ancient art form called encaustics, a process that creates etchings employing melted bees wax with resin. When the door to her studio is open, folks are invited to stroll in and watch her work. She says, with a smile, that she is often "up to the elbows in stuff."

In her studio, Rhonda Mullin specializes in Whispered Photography: intimate studies of children, newborns, pets, engagements, small weddings and family groups.

Henry Schultz Photography specializes in formal studio photography and fine art photography for any age. He welcomes single clients, couples or families. He also is an accomplished painter who experiments in what he calls "pin stripe painting." Besides all of this, he creates works in stained glass.

Last, but certainly not least in the universe that

is FADA is the artist Brabant. Brabant paints bold colors and strokes of the brush that reflect all of the feelings and moods of his subjects. He is a largerthan-life personality.



see his work, you not only experience life, as Brabant sees it, with your eyes, but also with your emotions. He invites you to experience the commonplace things of the world in an uncommon way.

Three other businesses share the building with FADA, but are not formally part of it, yet their presence lends to the magic there. They are located at 621 Franklin St. — same space, different door and are part of the group of friends, this "Commune of Cool" that makes the whole experience work.

Patina Vintage Goods is filled with items that have been collected and loved and are now being passed on to new friends. Amy Bowman and Vallarie Pickens have a great love of antiques and share that passion with others.

Man About Town is a store dedicated to men. It is a "modern twist on an old school haberdashery," proprietor Sabrina Sanders says. The shop is outfitted and decorated with the "stuff of men." Sanders even plans to have a barber in a future expansion.

Indiana Pickers is owned and operated by "Chief Picker" Bob Lake. He not only picks and discovers interesting memorabilia throughout Indiana, but also is the owner of the property where the magic happens. Bob is an energetic man who is "always looking for his next project." He prides himself in preserving the history of Michigan City and Northwest Indiana. Bob says when he met the FADA group, they hit it off right away. It is obvious by his enthusiasm for the group and their projects, and in turn their respect for Bob and his work that the feeling is mutual.

617 Franklin St. and the studios of FADA are the epicenter of a movement to repurpose the heart of Michigan City's downtown. While many old-timers have fond memories of the shops and theaters that once lined the street today, new memories and traditions are being made. Take advantage of the opportunity and experience, firsthand, the magic of this "cohort of creativity."

### Off the Book Shelf

<u>Heat & Light</u> by Jennifer Haigh (hardcover, \$26.99 in bookstores and online; also available as an eBook)

This may be a novel, but the subject is as real as the weeds in your lawn. Here's why...

Bakerton, Pa., was a coal-mining boom town. Businesses flourished, families had a decent living and the town was living the American dream. Then the mines failed, jobs disappeared, businesses disappeared and many were forced to leave and find a living elsewhere.

Then came 2010 and the promise of a new awakening for Bakerton — natural gas. Forget coal, natural gas is in the ground in abundance! So say the salesmen who come into the area painting a rosy picture for the future, coaxing property owners to sign over drilling rights on their land in exchange for an upfront bonus, followed by future big payments. Just sign on the dotted line! The thought of recouping the past lean years certainly has a golden ring to it.


The salesmen are the front line of attack. They are trained to get in and get out with as many leases as possible, ahead of other drilling companies who will be nipping at their heels.

"Buried treasure..." That's how salesman Bobby Frame portrays it. He's the best salesman Dark Elephant has, one of the drilling companies now flooding the area with their salesmen. His speech is snappy, takes a short time and leaves people either baffled, dead against it or ready to sign...most ready to sign...and most not asking how Dark Elephant is going to get the natural gas out of the ground. Perhaps they should have done some research and read the contract thoroughly before signing.

Here's how Bobby explains the beauty of fracking: "We drill a half mile down. Then we turn the bit sideways. We can drill for miles like that, right under your property. We're so far down you'll never know we're there."

Needless to say, it's not quite like Bobby describes it. By the time papers are signed and the engineers have figured out where the drilling pads will be, the ground is shaking from the big trucks and other equipment pouring into town, and the noise is rattling the property owners' eardrums. And that doesn't include the workers brought in, not hired from the locals, but men from all over the country.

Ah, the workers. They are not trusted by the townsfolk, sometimes with good reason. "It is backbreaking work, punishing to the body. There are no soft jobs on a drill rig." Bring a man in from thousands of miles from home, work him all hours of the day and turn him loose with a paycheck and see



where he ends up. You can bet it won't be the local Bible study class.

Now we meet some of the locals. People who have signed with Dark Elephant, and some who have not. Let's start with Rich Devlin. He had 60 acres of land he wanted desperately to farm, but didn't have the money for stock and supplies. He's had to take a job as a prison guard. The leasing contract seemed like manna from heaven. But soon, his wife says their daughter is suffering from constant stomach problems and the water smells funny. And Rich didn't count on heavy equip-

ment rumbling on his land seven days a week. "It's as though an aircraft carrier has run aground in Rich's back yard."

The Devlins are a family in crisis. And they're not the only ones in Bakerton. There's Pastor Jess, a widow and minister of a local church. She meets Herc Bonner, one of the men drilling. Herc seems like the nicest guy. What he doesn't bother to tell Jess about is his wife and two kids back in Texas.

Mack and Rena, a lesbian couple, run the Friend-Lea Acres dairy farm. While not signing a lease, Rena does get involved with an environmental organizer whose infectious enthusiasm and commitment makes Rena overlook his personal ambitions.

What are you to do when it seems you are being handed the goose that laid the golden egg? Many are cautious. After all, the people of Bakerton were fooled before. Haigh has an innate sense of the human capacity to rebound and believe what the heart wants to believe while the brain is trying to put the brakes on. It's a conundrum she faces with a firm grasp on human nature.

The intertwining of the Bakerton residents' stories with the drilling company presents some interesting contemplations. Both sides have decisions to make; both sides have responsibilities to their families and their employers.

Greed, ambition and the American Dream come crashing together with all the fears and desires of our time. Haigh has told a story neither condemning nor approving. She's just told one hell of a story that I see could make a great book club read. Imagine the discussion!

It's truly a story that will make you stop and think—long after the last page is read.

National Book Award winner Ha Jin (<u>Waiting</u>) said: "<u>Heat & Light</u> is an intricate and ambitious novel, firmly grounded in history and our time."

Haigh is the author of four novels and a shortstory collection. She has won several prestigious writing awards and lives in Boston


