





The Right Environment

Retiring Chancellor Reflects on Growth of Purdue Campus

The name James Dworkin is known throughout Northwest Indiana. Mention it, and people reply by saying what a great guy he is, how down to earth he is.

How people know him, though, is the real story, for the retiring chancellor of Purdue North Cen-

tral has touched so many lives, not just on campus, but also within the community.

It has been 16 years since Dworkin took over the helm of Purdue North Central. Upon arrival, he identified important goals and has worked on them ever since.

The campus truly has benefited from his guidance. As chancellor, his internal responsibilities range from strategic planning to day to day operations. He also has an external role by being involved in La Porte County's economic development, something he has taken seriously from Day One.

"I have different vice chancellors that report to me," Dworkin said. "I basically try to set the direction for the university, where I think we should be going, based on con-

versation with lots of people."

When he arrived on campus, there were three buildings: Schwartz Hall, Library-Student-Faculty Building and the almost completed Tech building. Today, the face of the campus has changed.

From the start, he saw the need for a student services and activities building. PNC was the only university in the state that did not have such a facility. He worked on the project for 10 years. Finally, two years ago, the state legislature approved money for the complex. Dworkin oversaw raising \$3.5 million


for the almost 100,000 square-foot complex that houses a gym, running track, cafeteria, gathering space for students and more. In May, the first graduation ceremonies since 1971 were held on campus in the great hall at the building that bears his name — a great honor for him.

"A lot of people joke. They say we don't know anybody who is alive that has a building named after them on the Purdue campus," Dworkin said. "It was very moving. It was such an honor for me. I can't thank them enough."

In addition, two public-private partnerships have occurred. The 24-hour Veterinary Emergency Clinic is housed on campus. Across the street are apartments and houses on land originally purchased by The

Purdue Research Foundation. While not specifically student housing, of the 12 buildings, approximately five are occupied by students.

Other visions Dworkin had involved obtaining academic autonomy from Purdue University, getting

the school accredited, adding a business degree and increasing academic choices.

"I used to teach in Budapest Hungary," Dworkin said. "I was there under Communism, and I was there after Communism. After Communism, they would say, come to our stores and see all the merchandise. I'd go in their stores. The shelves would be empty. They had like one choice.

"I kind of used that analogy a lot when I came here. Students only had six choices. I knew we had to fill the shelves with more programs."

At the time of his arrival, the school offered numerous associate degrees, but limited bachelor programs. He viewed this as an opportunity. Ivy Tech was offering many associate programs. Working with them, a deal was made for Ivy Tech to offer associate degree programs, while the regional Purdue campuses would offer bachelor and master degree and an MBA program.

"When I first got here, most of the kids would say, I went to Purdue North Central when they couldn't go anywhere else," Dworkin said. "Now, it's changed."

Now, he can step back with a sense of pride and accomplishment.

"We went from six bachelor degree programs to 24," Dworkin said. "In the old days, people had limited choices. Now we have three engineering programs, early childhood, psychology, communication. With the merger with Purdue Calumet, students have access to all these different graduate programs."

Another goal was to boost the overall quality of life for students. Dworkin helped accomplish this by trying to make it friendlier, putting in a cafeteria, hiring a chef for better quality food, starting athletic and intramural programs, student clubs and bus service. He also tried to make sure students had internship opportunities in the community.

Dworkin has set the type of climate on campus that is reflective of him: a friendly climate where people felt comfortable to talk to him.

"If you create the right environment, people will react to that...I think my background as a mediator and arbitrator is useful because I'm a good listener," he said. "So when people come in, I listen to them. I don't just tell them right away, that's terrible. I just listen. I say, I'll see what I can do. I think people appreciate you giving them a good hearing. In my open office hours, I would talk with students, staff or faculty. I would talk to them about anything. It's actually worked out pretty well."

Dworkin is a firm believer if you want people to work with you, you need to build relationships.

"You can't come in the first day and say, let's do this, this and this," Dworkin said. "Once you build these relationships, it's a lot easier to be able to accomplish some goals. Because people know you're not out to do anything terrible. You're out only looking for the best.

"The same thing in the community. It's hard to go meet someone for the first time and ask them for \$10,000. First, you build friendships. That's what Nancy (his wife) and I were good at. We build relationships. We call it friend raising. After that, it's a lot easier when someone is friendly to ask them for \$10.000."

Indeed, the campus not only has benefited from Dworkin at the helm, but also from its First Lady, Nancy.

"The chancellors says Purdue North Central could not have a better First Lady for the last 16 years," he said. "She knows everybody. At an event, we would split and would cover the entire room. Between the two of us, we will have talked to every-

one. She's really good at that. Everybody at Purdue North Central knows that Nancy Dworkin was very special to the campus."

He continued.

"Five years ago, the early childhood department put a born learning trail on campus. It's a trail of activities for young children, and they named it in honor of Nancy. They just planted a tree there in her honor.

"For me, I have a lot of people I could thank, but probably have to thank Nancy No. 1 because she has been so instrumental in helping with all the things. (She's) not only a good person to help with fundraising, but also a good person to bounce ideas off of all these years. It's been a true partnership. So I just appreciate everything she's done."

When the Dworkins first came to the area, they wondered why Purdue had two regional campuses within close proximity of each other. The seed was planted in his mind for cooperation between Purdue North Central and Purdue Calumet. That seed, which the two campuses have been working on the past two years, has finally germinated into Purdue Northwest.

The biggest challenge was to file an extremely large document, which took nearly a year to write — the change of control document — with the Higher Learning Commission, as both campuses were accredited by them. The commission then looked at both campuses and approved change of control as of July 1.

According to Dworkin, Purdue Northwest is now the fifth-largest university in Indiana. Between the two campuses, there will be about 15,000 students covering all of Northwest Indiana, along with drawing students from nearby Illinois and Michigan. There will be five colleges and 17 departments,

creating more efficiency. Students can complete a degree on either campus. There will be one chancellor. This new approach ultimately has saved a lot of money that will be put back into helping students.

In his 16 years as chancellor, Dworkin has a list of major accomplishments, beginning with the growth of the number of academic programs, to the new Student Services complex, to the relationship he has established between the local towns and university, to uniting the two campuses, to keeping tuition increases low and working with area high schools on concurrent enrollment.

"When I first got here, we had nobody from the high schools coming in with college credits unless they took the advance placement tests," Dworkin said. "But now, probably 1/3 of our students come in with credit hours."

With such responsibility and influence, one might think that would change him. However, Dworkin has stayed true to the values and principles taught and instilled in him by his grandfather and parents.

"My grandfather was not wealthy. He was a shoe salesman all his life," Dworkin said. "He didn't make much money. He just enjoyed life. My dad and mom instilled the principles of everybody is human, everybody is the same.

"I just don't think I've changed very much. I don't let it get to my head. It's not an ego thing. I can talk to a union welder, a union laborer, I can talk to the CEO of a corporation. I'm going to be the same way. If they like it, fine. If they don't like it, that's fine, too. I'm going to be true to myself.

"I'm definitely down to earth, but I know how to get things done. I'm a good manager. I'm good at running meetings, but I don't get too full of myself. I'll tell you that because I realize everything in life is transitory. You need to be a good person because you're going to be held accountable in the end some way...I've just been very honored to have had this position. It's been one of the great of honors of my life."

His advice to the everyday student, Continued on Page 6

whom he views as the lifeblood of our country, comes from him not only being a respected chancellor, an award-winning professor, a successful arbitrator, a published author, a father, but also a kind person.

"Be a good listener," he advised. "If you can be a good listener, I think you can understand people and you can understand and appreciate a diverse crowd.

"Be eclectic, try a lot of different stuff out," he said. "I thought I was going to be a doctor. (But) when I took economics, itjust made sense. Keep an open mind. Keep your options open."

Dworkin's term as chancellor ends June 30. Purdue has a rule that when you reach 65 and are in a highlevel administrative position, you must step down. His contract, however, was extended an additional two


years so he could help complete the merger between the two campuses.

What does Dworkin hope Purdue's North Central Campus looks like in five to 10 years?

"Not only do we have a strategic plan, but we have a master plan for the campus. I think we need an additional classroom building eventually. I would like to see that get somewhere in the cue. I would like to see more and more students come onto this campus and matriculate in four years...I would just hope in five years the culture of this campus remains the same. It will be a friendly place, a welcoming place."

Dworkin's impact, it must be noted, extended far beyond the campus grounds. For instance, he served on numerous boards. He's able to do so because he manages his career and outside life through strong time management and organizational skills. He does not overburden himself, and he definitely leaves white space on his calendar to get things done.

"One of the things I was proud of from being chancellor is all the new bachelor programs we have at Purdue North Central," Dworkin said. "We went from six to 24 programs, and one of the ones that we picked up was early childhood education.

"Every year, I have been going to early childhood education conferences. and I get asked to go speak in the classes and talk about writing a children's book and how to do that. I think maybe that was part of it."

As the days rapidly come to a close for Dworkin as chancellor of Purdue North Central, what is next? The Dworkins will take a year sabbatical. They will continue living in the area. Upon their return, he will have an office at Purdue Northwest's North

Central campus in the activities complex named after him and plans on being there, but not every day. As a tenured faculty member at Purdue University's Krannert School of Management, he will return to teaching.

The thing he will miss the most is the interaction with people. One can easily understand, with his involvement and strong interaction with those on campus how at the start, it will be difficult for him.

However, Dworkin's life has come full circle. He started his first job at Purdue University in 1976.

"I just celebrated my 40-year anniversary at Purdue," he said. "Basically for me, it's back to the future. I started at Krannert at West Lafayette. I was there from 1976 to 2000, and now I was here from 2000-2016. I'm going to take a year off and probably starting 2017, for who knows how long, I will go back and teach a little bit at the Krannert School... back to the future."

Besides going back to teaching, Dworkin still has other goals and dreams.

"I serve on some boards so I'm going continue doing that...," he said. "I'm a labor arbitrator. I resolve labor management disputes. I want to be the best labor arbitrator I can be... When I go back to teaching, actually I've taught every year that I was here at PNC...I want to be a really good teacher...

"I'm really happy about the progress of my children's books. I want to continue on working on that series. Basically, my goal is to get really

young kids interested in reading and writing at a very early age. Then, I'd like to continue being the best husband I can be to Nancy and be a great father and a great grandfather to the five kids."

Many may be saddened by Dworkin's departure, but the mark he has left on Purdue North Central, and the numerous lives he touched, has been woven into the fabric of the future of the campus.

Steve Turner, campus vice chancellor of finance, probably said it best at an annual honors convocation, asking people to stand up if Dworkin, sometime during his time as chancellor, stopped them and asked about their family.

"About everybody in the room stood up," Dworkin said. "It almost brought tears to my eyes."

The Pleasure of Giving a Sleeper Hit a Second Chance

A distinct pleasure for any film lover is the movie that comes out of nowhere, with little fanfare or expectation, but yields more joy than anything churned out by the Hollywood hype machine.

"The Intern" arrived in theaters last September, typically the lull before studios unleash their prized Oscar bait. Modestly budgeted at \$35 million, it quietly, yet steadily, found an audience, generating nearly \$195

million in worldwide box-office receipts.

The movie's unforeseen triumph should not have come as a shock to anyone. Writer-director Nancy Meyers is known as the "queen of the chick flick," a moniker she no doubt detests because it's frequently hurled about by men as a patronizing kick in the teeth. In the 1980s, she wrote the scripts for a string of successful comedies, such as "Private Benjamin," "Irreconcilable Differences," "Protocol," "Baby Boom" and the "Father of the Bride" pictures. She stepped up to the director's chair with equally profitable comedies like "What Women Want," "Something's Gotta Give" and "It's Complicated." Each picture a hit, each exploring the ways men and women relate to each other.

Initially, "The Intern" had zero appeal for me, not because it appeared to be a "chick flick," but

because its stars, Robert De Niro and Anne Hathway, run hot and cold for me. But when both my bosses tell me a movie is worth a look now that it's on HBO, and these two are selective about what they watch, it was time to set aside any indifferences and give the movie a shot.

What I discovered is this: "The Intern" made me smile more than any picture of the past year. In addition to being enormously

entertaining, it may be the smartest comedy to address the generation gap that exists in the work-place. The wittiest, most inciteful script yet from Meyers, there are no lazy jibes at the young or old, no villains, no forced romantic love interests, just smart, flawed, vulnerable individuals who realize they have far more to learn from each other than they would like to admit.

The premise is simple. Ben Whittaker (De Niro) is retired, having worked for years as a phone company executive. He's also 70 and a widow. Determined not to wither away, he creates a youtube video of himself explaining why he'd be perfect as an intern at About the Fit, an online fashion startup created by working mom Jules Ostin (Hathaway). She's struggling to juggle her career with her crumbling home life, so Ben's presence is more of an irritance. Gradually,





though, Ben emerges as the company's father figure, taking not just his young colleagues under his generous wing, but Jules as well.

As "The Intern" locked itself firmly into the construct of a workplace comedy, I prepared for a barage of age-oriented gags, with De Niro being the crusty codger and About the

Fit staff depicted as young, naive and stupid.

Not so.

De Niro, who has played so many unpleasant types over the course of his varied career, is uncharacteristically warm here. And sharp. His Ben is on the ball, willing to embrace change. What he craves is purpose, the feeling he's needed, responsibilities that give his life meaning. His coworkers, by comparison, are bright, but chained to their desks, obsessed with work. They need to live a little.

How these polar opposites compromise, softening around the edges, gives "The Intern" its appeal. Some of the transformations are obvious, as when Jules help Ben create a facebook page. Others are so subtle, you might miss them, as when one of Tom's colleagues eventually shifts from sloppy work attire to tie and sportcoat. And when Rene Russo turns up as the company's own massage therapist, the actress — now in her 60s — proves that aging naturally is sexier than the botox babes Hollywood places on cosmestic-surgery pedestals.

The comic highpoint arrives when Ben persuades three of his co-workers to join him as they break

into Jules' mother's house, the mission being to delete a bitter email Jules accidentally fired off to her mother. The younger staff, jittery about committing a crime, nervously banter about which "Ocean's Eleven" character they might be. And when the act finally goes down, how they survive it is deliriously funny.

The quartet of makeshift thieves feels most alive when they're behaving at their naughtiest.

I laughed a lot in "The Intern." Meyers creates such a wonderful, inviting universe, you'd love to believe that, by the end, these colorful folk will stay together for quite some time. The movie, for all its witty observations, is a comedy about hope, that

each generation can learn from each other to create the perfect picture of efficiency not just in the workplace, but in our personal lives as well.

Educators, pre-service teachers, naturalists, interpreters, Scout leaders, youth leaders, homeschooling parents and anyone working with middle-and high-school aged youth can attend a day-long workshop investigating educational activities dealing with water quality.

The session is from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Thursday, June 23, at the Paul H. Douglas Center for Environmental Education on Lake Street in Gary's Miller Beach neighborhood.



Off the Book Shelf

The Oxford Inheritance by Ann A. McDonald (hardback, \$25.99 in bookstores and online; also available as an eBook)

"Black is the badge of hell, the hue of dungeons, and the school of night."

Those words are from Shakespeare's Love's Labour Lost, providing the foundation for this story of family, loss, Gothic horror, academics and Sir Walter Raleigh. Strange combination, yes? Stick with me, it will all — well, most of it anyway — become clear.

Cassandra Blackwell, an American student, has won a scholarship to the prestigious Raleigh College at Oxford University. Not by accident, exactly. Here's why...

Cassie has pretty much taken care of herself most of her life. Her mother, Joanna, was plagued with bouts of deep depression and violent outbursts, while her stepfather was a horrible human being. Joanna finally ended it all one day. The 14-year-old Cassie came home from school to find her mother dead in the bathtub. She slit her wrists.

Cassie managed to stay out of the clutches of the DFC after that and raise herself. She was a very self-reliant girl. Her stepfather? Well, he came to an end in a home fire ruled accidental by the fire inspector. Hmmm.


Cassie didn't give up on studying and after high school was accepted to Smith College. One day, she receives a strange package. "The foreign stamps were peeling, and the original Oxford postmark was smudged and faded, the labels pasted in turn, redirecting the box through old apartments and past crimes all the way back to the original recipient."

The package contains a ticket stub (showing a voyage from Plymouth, England, to New York City in 1995), a picture of her mother in black robe at Oxford University, along with a cryptic note: "You can't hide the truth forever. Please come back and end this for good."

Well, first of all, Cassie never knew her mother went to Oxford. She never told her anything about her past life, including who Cassie's real father is. And, what's more, how could Cassie reconcile the happy woman in the photo with the agitated, lost soul she grew up with?

That's when the year abroad study program comes up and she wins the chance to go to Oxford. Maybe, now, she can finally put her mother's real story to rest.

Ivy covered ancient stone walls, beautiful manicured lawns and gardens surrounded by the im-



posing brick buildings of an austere, celebrated college known throughout the world. Doesn't that just beg for a dark mystery filled with old secrets and old secret passages? That's what Cassie finds as she explores Raleigh College and learns of the secret society known as the School of Night, supposedly started by Sir Walter Raleigh himself and a group of intellectuals some 400 years ago. Does the society still exist? Some say yes, in hushed tones. Others laugh and say "rubbish!"

Cassie's roommate, Evie, is an outgoing, party-loving graduate student. She introduces Cassie to her close friends,

cousins Olivia and Hugh Mandeville, who come from a rich family, indeed, with Hugh's father even running for prime minister. Then there's Paige, who is Lady Pembroke, and Sasha, whose family runs a large shipping company. Very impressive friends, indeed!

Cassie meets Elliott, a student working at one of the university libraries. With his help, she gets access to old books and papers that help uncover clues to her mother's time at Oxford. But as she digs deeper, Cassie is drawn into sinister and scary information. Enough information to get someone killed? She finds more than one mysterious death that is attributed to suicide. Cases that don't seem to have been investigated thoroughly.

Then, things started happening fast: Sebastian follows Cassie and...Evie went and...wouldn't you know Hugo...and then Charlie the jogger turned out to be...

"Evil was lurking at Raleigh, the kind she'd never allowed herself to believe in before now...This was unnatural. And if her theories were right, this had been happening for years."

What is it about Gothic novels that so draw us in? Is it the fear of the unknown? Or maybe the morbid curiosity of looking around the next corner, even though we know something unholy lurks there?

We love getting the pants scared off us! It's human nature. And this story is a great place to start.

The author's descriptions of the college grounds and the city of Oxford made me want to book the next flight to England! This is the whole package—just read it in the daytime...please.


