Unleashing the Human Spirit

Ann Galinowski arrives at The Beacher with her father, Steve, by her side. Excited by the prospects of discussing her involvement with Special Olympics, she introduces herself with a hearty "hello." Steve carries a tangled web of medals that sways back and forth like a pendulum.

How many medals are there? Ann and Steve aren't sure. Her many accomplishments stretch back to when she became involved in Special Olympics back in elementary school. This month, she turns 38. Between the medals and ribbons back home, the tally of Special Olympics honors hovers at around 100. Asked which events they represent, Ann pauses for a moment, collecting her thoughts. A smile curls across her face. She has competed in everything from 50

meter and softball throw to bowling and track and field. Last year, she adds, she was first in the state for bowling. On one occasion, she and Carol Schultz, the Special Olympics Indiana LaPorte County coordinator, marched in opening ceremonies of the state games, much like the Olympic procession during winter-summer games.

"People were high-fiving, shaking our hands,"

Ann recalls, her eyes ablaze with the joy of that memory. "It was cool."

Ann, it also must be noted, is the only Special Olympian from LaPorte County to hold a position through the organization's Athlete Leadership Programs. Through ALPs, she is like LaPorte County's spokeswoman for the athletes here.



"The happiness and joy on their faces, even just to compete," Steve says of what he savors most. "Winning is secondary."

his year is a banner one as Special Olympics celebrates its 50th anniversary. For lo- cal Special Olympians, Chicago is the place to be when festivities commence July 17-21. Heralding "the next 50 years of the Inclusion Revolution," the events boast a high-level sports competition at the Unified Cup, the Torch Run and Global Day of Inclusion festival and a concert at Huntington Bank Pavilion at Northerly Island. ing an estimated 1,000 athletes from the U.S. and Canada. The event was a joint venture between the Chicago Park District and Kennedy Foundation.

Today, Special Olympics is the largest sports organization for children and adults with intellectual disabilities across the globe. Estimates place the number of athletes who participate in year-round training and competitions at 5 million. To compete, individuals must be at least 8, with an agency or professional identifying them as having an intellectual disability or closely related developmental disability. A Young Athletes Program exists for competitors younger than 8.

Special Olympics debuted in Indiana one year after the inaugural event in Chicago. In those early days, a chapter could spring up wherever someone chose to do so. But about 16 years ago, the orga-

nizational structure changed where volunteer coordinators were established per county in Indiana to oversee operations.

Carol Schultz has been with Special Olympics upwards of 35-36 years, and she has been La-Porte County's coordinator from the position's inception. You could not ask for a more qualified person — both in background and, more importantly, in spirit. A retired educator with La-Porte Community School Corp., she was the special education teacher for many years at La-

Porte High School. She received a Bachelor of Arts in physical education and later a Master's Degree in special education, along with additional credits in physical education and learning disabilities, all so she could better serve students with learning disabilities.

But the heart of her "education," if you will, began during childhood, when she was blessed with parents who taught her to look beyond first impressions, to consider the whole person.

"My mom had a friend over, and her son had Down syndrome, and we played together and there wasn't any problem," Carol said. "I had a classmate in elementary school who was 'mentally challenged,' as they called it. But I wondered in middle school, where did she go?"

Truth was, Schultz said, in those days, many students with what was classified as intellectual disabilities never progressed beyond middle school, if that.

"There wasn't anything beyond that for them to

do," she recalled, her voice tinged with sadness. Worse, she continued, when she began her career as a teacher, many parents kept their children at home, hiding them, fearful of the stigma attached to intellectual and developmental disabilities.

Thankfully, today, that is not the case. Special education, especially in La-Porte County, Schul-

tz said, "has come a long way. We have wonderful special-ed programs in the schools."

And, Schultz adds, the stigma affixed to Special Olympians has eroded over the years.

"The real stigma is that our athletes can't do anything," she said. "They can't learn how to do that, and that is definitely not true.

"I have a bowler who started when he was 8, and he's about 25 now. He's autistic. Every year, he progresses. Now, he throws the ball right down the middle. He could probably throw a strike every time."

As coordinator for Special Olympics LaPorte County, Schultz is in charge of the entire program here, with the athletes training anywhere from six to eight weeks before an event. Events are held throughout the year. The number of athletes these days, Schultz says, ranges from 115 to 125. Some live in group homes, others have devoted parents who ensure their children make it to meetings, practices and competitions.

Volunteers, Schultz said, number at about 75.

Spring sports involves swimming and track and field. Summer sports include softball and bowling, the latter continuing into fall. Winter sports emphasize basketball. All sports are divisioned by age and gender so a level playing field exists.

Funds to support the LaPorte County chapter are generated through fundraisers, from Port-a-Pit sales to a golf outing. To limit costs, Schultz considers free sites as locations for practices. Michigan City's Gardena Park, for example, is one such place.

Monthly meetings are held, with LaPorte County engaged in four to five of the sports recognized by the national organization. The issue is getting enough volunteers involved to serve as coaches. For a few years, bocce and golf were options, but again, that depends on having individuals available to supervise such sports.

Why become involved with Special Olympics, either as a coach or volunteer? Schultz does not hesitate with a reply.

> "Special Olympians feel so much better about themselves," she said. "They practice, and when it comes around to competitions, they're so proud afterward.

> "The athletes, they are great. They are wonderful. They are, like, my friends, and I know the coaches would say the same. Seeing them grow, get better, earn medals and

ribbons, that is just so satisfying."

"Lady With All the Answers" Next Up at Theatre at the Center

Janet Ulrich Brooks, making her Theatre at the Center debut, is cast as advice columnist Ann Landers in "The Lady With All the Answers."

Previews begin July 12, with opening night July 15 and performances continuing through Aug. 12 at the Munster theater.

Written by David Rambo, the play provides a behind-the-scenes look at the popular syndicated advice columnist, whose life seemed letter-perfect. With

more than 90 million readers daily, she had a quick wit that could be comical and creative, as well as sharp and shocking, all in the same sentence. The play unfolds in Landers' Lake Shore Drive apartment in Chicago in 1975, where she shares fascinating stories while preparing to write the most difficult column of her career.

Brooks received two Joseph Jefferson Equity Award nominations for Actress in a Principal Role in a Play as Sonia in "Vanya and Sonia and Masha and Spike" at the Goodman Theatre, and as Anya in "A Walk in the Woods" at TimeLine Theatre. Other credits include "33 Variations," "All My Sons," "When She Danced," "Not Enough Air" and "Weekend." Film credits include roles in "Divergent," "One Small Hitch" and "Conviction." TV credits include roles in "Chicago Med" and "Chicago Fire."

New Troy's first Allan Boyd Memorial Strawberry Social is from 2 to 4 p.m. EDT Sunday, July 8, in the community center's new gazebo.

The free event will feature strawberry treats and live music. Both the event and gazebo are being presented as a gift from the Boyd family to honor Allan Boyd (1925-2017), who grew up in New Troy and attended New Troy High School, which existed where New Troy Township Park is today. As a young man, Boyd owned a garage in the center of town. Later, he became township supervisor and remained a prominent figure in local politics for many years. His reminiscences of the town were featured in the movie, "New Troy: The Center of the World."

When considering ways to memorialize their father, Boyd's son and daughter, Brett and Jan, recalled his often-related memories of an annual strawberry social at the old Congregational Church, which stood on the site of the current parking lot for the community center and township park. He also spoke of his dream for a community gazebo in which to recreate those happy memories.

When Brett Boyd attended Friends of New Troy's May 9 meeting seeking approval for the donation, he was met with great enthusiasm. The gazebo was delivered just eight days later and placed in an area once overgrown with invasive vines, but now cleared and planted with grass (also courtesy of the Boyd family). Classic Catering, which is owned by Brett and his wife, Melissa, will prepare the food for the social and provide the staff to serve it. The family is hiring a live band to play old-time music.



"Trains" Trains Spotlight on Indiana Hot Spot

Trains, which bills itself as THE railroading magazine, trains its spotlight in this month's issue on the "Indiana hot spot" of Michigan City.

That's right.

The railroad industry's respected journal has tagged Michigan City as "Indiana's passenger-train paradise (that) provides all-day action."

You will find Brian Schmidt's report and photos on Page 64, and you will be happy to know that "in a state known for its many train-watching hot spots, Michigan City, Ind., stands apart from the rest."

Schmidt notes that Amtrak and the Northern Indiana Commuter Transportation District, which we know and love as the South Shore Line, offer regular passenger service on three routes through Michigan City.

I know because I have ridden on all three lines, and yes, as Schmidt suggests, I have done my share of "train watching by timetable," particularly at the South Shore's Carroll Avenue station which, of course, we know and love as Shops.

Indeed, as Schmidt notes, "South Shore Line commuter trains make up the bulk of Michigan City's rail traffic. Weekday trains are set up for a workday commute to Chicago with intermittent daytime service."

He also cites South Shore Freight, which ap-



pears between commuter trains, saving the best place to watch those orange locomotives haul freight through town \mathbf{is} along 11th Street. Not to brag or anything, but I can honestly claim to have seen 11th Street from the cab of a South Shore Freight locomotive. That was back in October 2007 when I wrote a ride-

along feature on the railroad for *The Beacher*. Tough work, but somebody had to do it, and I have to say, my day with those professional railroaders was as good as it gets for a lifelong railroad enthusiast. Or, if you will, train watcher, or train spotter.

But I digress, when I should be quoting Schmidt, who writes: "Amtrak operates 10 trains through town, the Blue Water and three Wolverine round trips on its own line (along Fourth Street in town) and the Pere Marquette on CSX, which crosses Franklin Street near the football stadium). An NS (Norfolk Southern) local runs east in the morning, often following the first Amtrak train, and returns west in the afternoon. An old concrete coaling tower, drawbridge and diamond crossing with the South Shore add interest to this line."

What Schmidt is saying is, Michigan City is THE place for some of the best train watching in the country.

But you already knew that because, if you're anything like me, you take the South Shore into Chicago for business and/ or pleasure, and because vou're forever seeing one Amtrak train or another whizz past as



train or another You'll find this former New York Central coaling whizz past as tower on the Amtrak line along U.S. 12. you're driving through town.

Actually, the Pere Marquette doesn't speed through Michigan City, and I say that from the experience of one who often takes that train from St. Joseph, Mich., to Chicago and back for day trips to the Windy City. You trot right along through Southwest Michigan and into Northwest Indiana, then the train slows to a sensible canter as it proceeds through town. Some passengers object, but I rather like that slower pace through Michigan City, because I can do some reverse train watching and see who's out and about that particular day.

So there you have it, rail fans, "Train watching by timetable" in an Indiana "passenger-train paradise" that "provides all-day action."

Be kind and courteous to any and all train watchers attracted to Michigan City by Schmidt's article, and politely suggest they stick around for a while after they've exhausted their big, honking cameras and dine and enjoy Michigan City's many other attractions.

Coast Guard Day @ Museum

Old Lighthouse Museum and Michigan City Historical Society will celebrate the grand opening of a new exhibit, "U.S. Coast Guard Station Michigan City," on Friday, July 6.

Museum hours will be extended, with doors open from 11 a.m. to 8 p.m. Admission and parking are free. A special guest that day is Mary Lou Guthridge, the first woman to serve at the Michigan City station, beginning her career here in 1979 and serving until 1987.

The exhibit is collaboration between museum staff and the U.S. Coast Guard Station, members of which will be present July 6 to answer questions about the service and explain its history. Michigan City's station began in 1837 as the U.S. Life Saving Service and officially became the U.S. Coast Guard in 1915, when the Life Saving Service merged with the Revenue Cutter Service established by Alexander Hamilton in 1790.

Tour the museum grounds and see a restored 1927 surf boat used by the Coast Guard until 1942. View artifacts from ships lost in storms, and learn the story of the Eastland disaster that took the lives of 844 people bound for Washington Park for a company picnic in 1915. Visitors also can tour the 1858 lighthouse and browse the collection of Michigan City Historical Society, which is celebrating its 45th year.

"Summer of Love" Fashion Show

LaPorte County Historical Society Museum, 2405 Indiana Ave., will host its third event of the "Summer of Love" season, a fashion show, at 1 p.m. Saturday, July 7.



South Shore Interpretative Program

The National Park Service and East Troy (Wis.) Railroad Museum will host a joint interpretative program featuring historic South Shore Railroad Car 33 on Saturday, July 7, during the museum's annual "Chicago Day" event.

Car 33 is one of 19 historic South Shore cars conveyed to the NPS in 1984 after the Chicago, South Shore & South Bend Railroad decommissioned them. Since 1984, the NPS has worked with numerous organizations to preserve the historic cars, and finally succeeded in securing their preservation in 2010 by transferring them to railroad museums.

East Troy Railroad Museum received eight of the 19 cars because it demonstrated the ability to preserve, maintain and operate them through a large contingent of volunteers.

Several of the restored historic South Shore cars will be in operation during "Chicago Day" on July 7, which also includes an evening dinner train (advanced reservations are required).

The South Shore cars will depart the museum hourly from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. CDT. NPS rangers will be at the museum, and volunteers will ride in each car to answer questions about the NPS, Indiana Dunes National Lakeshore and South Shore history.

East Troy Railroad operates on 7.5 miles of electric rail line that has been in continuous operation for more than 100 years. The museum has been in operation since 1972. It is the only one in the country that regularly operates historic South Shore cars on an electric interurban line. Its operating season extends April through October, with special holiday events in December. Visit easttroyrr.org/ for details.

New Beach Pathway

Work on a new path to the Portage Lakefront and Riverwalk beach is completed, replacing the one destroyed by early spring storms.

Those storms also caused a viewing platform to collapse. In addition to trail work, volunteers and staff from the City of Portage and National Park Service removed a large amount of storm debris from the beach.

While the beach is open, visitors will find a narrower sand beach due to the erosion, higher water levels in Lake Michigan and a nearby harbor structure that impedes sand flow. Exposed rocks to the east are dangerous and should be avoided. The beach has no lifeguards, so visitors must know when the lake is safe. Large waves are dangerous and can be accompanied by deadly rip currents.



Michigan City High School's Marine Corps Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps attended the GenCyber Camp on June 18-22 at Purdue University Northwest in Hammond.

The camp emphasized skills needed for a career in cyber security, skills cadets use when competing in Cyber Patriot, the national cyber-security game where they act as security managers for an organization, defending and counterattacking against a cyber attack.

The camp did not cost the cadets nor MCHS, with funding by the National Security Agency and National Science Foundation.

The curriculum covered:

- Cyber security awareness training through educational games.
- Implementing a cyber-security awareness Virtual Reality game.
- Arduino-based robot game design and security design principles.
- Ethical hacking and digital forensics practice.
- Team competition to solve a simulated computer forensics case.

Camp attendees came from as far west as the Chicago metro area and as far east as Michigan City. MCHS had the most students from any one high school.

"Most of our extracurricular activities are physical in nature: drill team, rifle team, raider team, along with community service and participating in parades and ceremonies," Master Sgt. Jeff Benak said in a press release. "Cyber Patriot really tests our cadets' mental abilities."

The drill team will continue to practice throughout the summer in preparation for next year's season. Its goal is to qualify for and win the National MCJROTC meet in April 2019 in the Washington, D.C., area.

Cadets also participate in numerous parades and community service events. The largest is Michigan City Area Schools' Back-to-School Rally on Aug. 9, which provides free school supplies to thousands of students. Cadets help with preparation Aug. 7-8, then the event itself.



The President is Missing by James Patterson and Bill Clinton (hardcover, \$30 retail in bookstores and online; also available as an eBook)

How would World War III play out? Troops on the ground? Drone attacks coupled with ICBMs? Or maybe all-out nuclear war? How about something more insidious? A war that would not be seen, but felt — a war that would bring America to its collective knees.

Clinton and Patterson have written a novel that

is just as exciting as anything written by Vince Flynn, Mark Greaney or others of the political action/adventure genre. Patterson's signature short chapters with cliffhanger endings are here in abundance, and Clinton's knowledge of the presidency and maneuverings of life on "The Hill" combine to make one exciting read.

The story jumps right into the hectic day of President Duncan - told in his own voice - and the dizzying array of phone calls, staff meetings, paper reading and deciding how he will answer questions at the upcoming Senate probe. It is the beginning of what Speaker of the House Lester Rhodes hopes will lead to the president's impeachment.

Duncan is a recent widower. His beloved wife, Rachel, died of cancer. That left him and his college-

age daughter, Lilly. To top it off, Duncan suffered from a blood disorder, ITP (immune thrombocytopenia), a low platelet count, that keeps the blood from clotting as it should.

It's actually amazing he's still alive. He served in Operation Desert Storm as a corporal, then became famous as a POW who stood by his scruples and refused to go on camera for the Iraqis and blame the USA for the war, no matter how they tortured him.

And now, at the Senate hearing, he is asked to explain why, when the chance existed to take out the leader of a well-known terrorist group, Suliman Cindoruk, head of the Sons of Jihad, Duncan pulled troops back, allowing the man to go free. Then, there was the alleged phone call made to Cindoruk by Duncan soon after...what does it all mean, Mr. **President?**

Rhodes is positively salivating at the thought that Duncan cannot talk his way out of this one, marking the beginning of the end for him.

through his own voice: What the truth is behind his recent actions, and how he will handle Rhodes. Listening to his reasoning puts an interesting slant on what it must be to hold the most powerful job on earth. It's easy for the public to be an armchair quarterback when you haven't played the game.

Soon, the president gets word the Los Angeles factory of a government contractor making airplanes has blown up, taking with it the next door private health lab that is in partnership with the state and

CDC. Is this a warning shot of things to come? And who is behind it? The Russians? Chinese? How about North Korea? Wouldn't it be curious if the threat came from somewhere else entirely?!

When Duncan disappears from sight, only his chief of staff, Carolyn Brock, knows where he is — a secret location known to very few. Secret meetings are arranged, urgent calls to world leaders...I wish I could tell you more, but at this point, the action sweeps into high gear and I can't — make that won't - spoil the whole plot! A plot that is well-written, most frightening and somehow plausible.

As one character in the story says, "One of the great ironies of the modern age is that the advancements of mankind can make us more powerful and vet more vulnerable at the same time. The greater the power, the greater the

vulnerability." What do you think?

Only the skill of a renowned writer and seasoned politician can come up with a plot that will keep you on the edge of your seat, trying to outfox the authors in guessing the climax. And what a climax! You won't be disappointed. A well laid-out plot that sensitively sidesteps naming which party is in control and which is not.

Some readers might take this book as a political statement. I say, lighten up! Read it for what it is — a well-written, exciting novel I give two enthusiastic thumbs up!
