# Incredible Milestone

emorial Day is a most special and sacred of holidays. In Michigan City each year, it is celebrated, in part, by a quiet, respectful service in Greenwood Cemetery where so many of our community's citizens are buried.

As has been tradition for so many years, this year's ceremony included the Michigan City Municipal Band, directed by Jeffery Doebler.

Veterans groups, Scouts and Michigan City High School's JROTC marched solemnly through the winding paths of the old ceremony, bearing their flags and standards on high through a freshening wind. They walked to the Civil War memorial as the band played "God Bless America," "This is My Country" and "America the Beautiful," music that touched the souls of those gathered that morning.

The music of a nation, played by the Michigan City Municipal Band, set the tone for the ceremony and the day itself. The band is 150 years old this year: an incredible milestone of community service. If you consider Greenwood Cemetery opened in 1864, shortly before the band debuted, it is not inconceivable to imagine that many who are buried there must have, themselves, heard the strains of patriotic music offered by the group.

There was a time when almost every town, city or small berg had its own band, and the music of American patriotism filled the air and stirred the hearts of all who heard it. One source estimates that in 1890, there were 10,000 community bands marching in patriotic parades and playing band concerts across the land.

The same source estimates that today, only about 100 of these municipal bands remain active. La-Porte County can boast of having two: one in Michigan City and the other in LaPorte.

It seems the tradition of community music in America began in the worship services of its early communities, especially among those founded by

the Moravians in colonial America. The Moravians were a Protestant group founded in Europe around 1457, later migrating to our shores seeking religious freedom. The Moravians were some of the first settlers in America, founding cities and towns in Georgia, then Pennsylvania and finally across the eastern seaboard.

The Moravians, who had a love of brass bands, felt music should be an important part of each church service. For them, music was a necessity of life, not a luxury. It was a means to express their faith and enjoy each other's company. Their leaders were prolific composers of brass band music and

hymns. Of course, this love of music spilled over into secular and finally civic life as the communities grew and the love of brass band music emerged as an American tradition. Truly, there is no sound quite like that produced by a well-tuned, well-practiced brass band.

During the Civil War, perhaps much inspired by immigrant populations such as the Moravians, marshal music led armies on their way into battle, and the sound of trumpets directed the troops through the din of gunfire. When the war ended, soldiers returned home with the music of the battlefield in their memories and in their hearts. All of those many thousand army musicians formed bands in their hometowns, using the tunes they learned to celebrate their country and remember those whose lives perished in battle.

It was only natural that in Michigan City, a band consisting in part of veterans should be formed. In 1869, director Fred Kimball took to the podium and with a stroke of his baton, the first clear notes of

> a golden trumpet were sounded and a tradition of band music in Michigan City was born.

This first brass band in Michigan City was called "The Silver Corand sometimes nets" "The simply Brass Band." Either way, band the members were dedicated to serving their "home sweet home" by inspiring friends and neighbors with the music of their history.

Over the years, the band went through many changes, including the venue, which began between Michigan and Fourth streets, then moved in 1911 to the new bandstand in Washington Park and finally to its current home.

The band also changed names, depending on its benefactor. What began in 1869 as The Silver Cornets split into the Union and Independent bands. These two later joined and became the Ames Union Band, named after George Ames, a prominent businessman and supporter.

In 1914, the name changed once again to the Haskell and Barker Band in honor of John Barker, who created an endowment to support it. In 1925, Michigan City assumed full financial support, and the group officially became known as the Michigan City Municipal Band.

In 1969, on the occasion of the municipal band's 100th anniversary, the late Bill Harris, husband of local historian Pat Harris, penned a history of the band to that point, which can be found in the Old Lighthouse Museum's archives.

A curious fact of history, as mentioned in Harris' book, illustrates the important role music plays in the patriotic life of a nation. Toward the end of the Spanish-American War (April 21, 1898-Aug. 13, 1898), the Michigan City band was inducted into the Second Infantry Indiana Organized Militia. At this point, it became the Ames Second Regimental

Band.

Bill Harris, who played French horn the band for more than 50 years, passed away in 2015, but his wife lovingly recalls how much the group meant to her husband.

Pat's recollections offer an insight into the heart of the group's success, and speaks to the esteem with which members hold the band, its directors and the music played.



"His love of music

began in the fourth grade playing cornet, but band director Fred Weber switched him to the French horn in fifth grade," Pat says of Bill.

He played the French horn through high school in band and orchestra, always using a rented school instrument. After high school, Bill spent time in the Army during the Korean War.

"The State of Indiana Korean Veterans Bonus allowed him to purchase his first French horn," Pat said. This allowed him to continue with his love of music, as he played in LaPorte County Symphony Orchestra for more than 30 years, as well as in the municipal bands of Michigan City and LaPorte for more than 50 years.

"Vacations were planned around the MCMB schedule," Pat says.

She remembers Bill saying, "It was relaxing to play his horn after a hard day at work." Bill's spirit is still with the band each time it performs. His beloved French horn is now played by longtime friend and fellow French horn player Kathleen Lang.

The tradition continues.

As Bill noted in his 100-year history that in 1969, many band members had been active with the group for more than 50 years, and that tradition rings

true today. Harris quotes Jim Garwood as saying, "You become addicted to music, you don't feel right unless you are playing."

Many members in 2018 have been a part of music making in Michigan City for many, many years. Often, husbands, wives and children play and enjoy music together. Of the 48 members today, 18 have been with the group for at least 20 years, and five have been playing for more than 50 years. Mary Riley has logged 56 years, Steve Hornyak 55 and Steve Watson 50.

Roger Smith has been playing his horn with the band for 63 years, and his wife, Sue, on her oboe for 51. They took the time to share with *The Beacher* favorite memories of their experiences. Both remember the late Guy Foreman, the band's beloved director for 60 years, started both of them on instruments in grade school.

During the years of raising a family, they

took the children with them to practices where they sat and colored quietly, all while listening to the music. Roger and Sue remark that a special joy is that four of their seven children also played in the band. In one notable concert, five family members played together.

Roger and Sue have played together, so far, in 750 concerts, none of which are more memorable than the July 4th one when, as they played the "1812 Overture," the bushes surrounding the bandstand caught on fire from the accompanying fireworks display.

tence, and to the fine performance venue they enjoy at Washington Park's Guy Foreman Bicentennial Amphitheatre.

Many of the band's current members, in fact, learned their skills and love of music from Foreman. He graduated from Elston High School in 1938 and took over leadership of the Municipal Band in 1940. He passed away March 20, 2017.

After Foreman's retirement in 2000, Rick D'Arcangelis became the director until 2013, when the baton was passed to Doebler. He has served as director of music education and bands at Valparaiso University since 1992, following 10 years of teaching in public schools.

"The community band is one of our great American traditions," Doebler says. "It is wonderful that Michigan City values the band so much. Community bands in America have always brought citizens together to share new music and old music and to celebrate our country."

Celebration is what the band is all about. Back in 1911, when the new bandstand was dedicated in Washington Park, a crowd of 10,000 people gathered on a summer night to hear the band play a march,

"Greater Michigan City," composed by H.M. Hamm especially for the occasion. The new bandstand was declared acoustically "as nearly perfect as possible" by enthusiastic listeners.

In that grand tradition, a new composition has been commissioned to celebrate the band's 150th anniversary. "Beyond the Lighted Tower" by Roger Cichy, a prolific composer whose works are said to paint experiences and emotions on a canvas of sound, was written specifically for the anniversary. Cichy says he chose the title because of "Michigan City's iconic lighthouse, which has been an important landmark for years." The real emphasis of the

piece, he suggests, is "what lays beyond the lighted tower, that being a vibrant community rich in history, culture and even a municipal band."

("Beyond the Lighted Tower" will be featured at several of this summer's concerts.)


Lang, it should be noted, is the head of the sesquicentennial organizing committee. All performances are free and at 12:15 p.m. Wednesdays.




Kent Jager and the Queen of Angels Choristers.

### **Getting Mother to Russia**

Travel is never easy, right?

I speak from experience, and the travel misadventure I write of is the trip my late mother, Hannah McKelvy, and I took to

nah McKelvy, and I took to Russia in October 2007. You read about it in these pages back then, but you did not know the challenges we faced in getting my then-86-year-old mother

But first, let me say we went to Russia not because we are of Russian descent, but because my mother and her ad hoc travel club decided the one place they had not visited was Russia.

to Russia from Chicago.

So, Russia it would be, and they booked a trip with Viking River Cruises called "Waterways of the Czars," by ship from Moscow to St. Petersburg.

All well and good, but the challenge was to get my physically challenged mother from


Chicago to the ship in Moscow that was not really designed so she could move freely from cabin to dining room. That, of course, is where I came in, and that is precisely why I was appointed by the family to accompany my mother to Russia in the first place. Either one of her children accompany her, or she was not going to Russia.

Period.

End of story.

But the story was just beginning Oct. 9, 2007, when we reported to the international terminal at O'Hare International Airport to board a non-stop Lufthansa flight to Frankfurt, Germany, where we would connect with a non-stop Lufthansa flight to Moscow.

Pretty simple, right?



Not really, because, you see, my mother always insisted on traveling first class, so she booked herself a first-class ticket on those flights and put me somewhere down below in

steerage, where I had to help hand out pillows and keep the restrooms tidy.

Welcome to my world.

Anyway, Mom and I were checked in and ready when Lufthansa welcomed first-class passengers aboard. I rolled Mom up to the jetway in her wheelchair, and Lufthansa took her from there, with the assurance all I had to do when we arrived in Frankfurt was make my way to the connecting flight to Moscow. They told me in no uncertain terms my mother was a first-class passenger and, of course, Lufthansa would easily and efficiently transport her to their Moscow flight which, after all, wasn't due to depart for more than an hour after our scheduled arrival in their hub airport of Frankfurt.

Got all that?

I thought I did, and so, when we arrived in Frankfurt, right on time I might add, I immediately saw the first-class passengers were long gone because they, of course, had been first off the plane.

The Frankfurt airport was torn up at the time due to some serious remodeling, so I had to pick my way carefully to the gate from whence our flight to Moscow would depart, but I made it there smartly,

and with ample time to spare.

But, wonder of wonders, my mother, the first-class passenger, was nowhere to be seen.

Where had Lufthansa taken her?

How could she not be there?

As I was soon to say in Russian, "Ya nez nigho," or "I don't know."

All I knew was, Lufthansa screwed up big time, and as the seconds and minutes ticked away, they seemed to have no clue as to my mother's whereabouts. They had misplaced a first-class passenger. Now, they were boarding first-class passengers for their flight to Moscow and the rest of the lot. Time was running out, so I drew on my best high-school German and told the uniformed attendant behind the counter: "Meine Mutter wird verloren!" You don't need a translation to know I said "my mother is lost!"

When I resorted to their *Mutter Sprache*, or mother tongue, they got on the blower and, as they were detaching the jetway from their aircraft, a yellow transport cart appeared on the fly with my distraught mother on the back, wondering what was what.

Yes, she thought I was to blame, but all I could do was sigh mightily and politely, but firmly, ask my new friends at Lufthansa to kindly reattach the jetway and to please, *please* be sure my mother's wheelchair accompany us on the flight.

No worries, or so they said, because, of course, when we arrived in Moscow, with Mother Russia sitting up there in first class and

me back again in steerage, there was no sign of Mom's wheelchair. It, too, had become verloren.

Wheelchairs were not thick on the ground in Moscow, so I told the Lufthansa people we absolute-

ly had to have Mom's wheelchair before our ship, the Viking Pakhomov, set sail for St. Petersburg in three-days time.

"Hat keine angst," they said.

But I did have plenty of angst, or worry, because of what had happened in Frankfurt. When we boarded our ship, I asked the concierge to keep an eye out for Mom's wheelchair, and to see if she could find a replacement for us in Moscow. She was hopeful on the former front, but glum on the latter.

So we soldiered on without a wheelchair as we toured Moscow that day and, no, Mom did not ride the famous Moscow subway as she thought she would because, after all, it was part of the package.

There are words in Russian and German for what I said to her in response, but you don't want to read them here, because this is, after all, a family newspaper.

The next day, Lufthansa coughed up Mom's wheelchair and delivered it to the ship. Crisis averted, or, as they said at Lufthansa, "Hat keine angst."

I had had plenty of angst, but then that's the fun of family travel, and fun family travel is what this story is all about, so let me end it by saying if you plan some big, honking adventure halfway around the world with an aging loved one, expect the unexpected, because it will happen at every turn.

These stats come from the USACE. What interests me is that normal up and down for Lake Michigan is between 12 and 18 inches over the year. Before 2017, we were below the long-term average about a foot for at least 10 years. Now, we are above by about 1 foot.

So this latest rise in lake levels has only been about 2 feet. Does not seem like much, but it is.

Finally, even though the water is not going down, beaches in Michiana have started to accrete sand (more sand and a tiny bit wider beaches). Beaches are more about wind than water levels? Or more about water levels than winds? Or "both and or?"





- 2. The Lateral Jobe Test. In this test for the right shoulder, raise you right arm out to the side by lifting your right elbow to 90 degrees, with your hand hanging down, fingers pointed to the ground, your thumb pointing to your tummy. With your left hand, push down on the right arm just above the elbow. Test is positive if you experience pain or weakness.
- 3. The 3<sup>rd</sup> test is called Lift-Off Test. The hand of the affected arm is placed on the lower back. Now try lifting the hand off the back without straightening your elbow. Test is positive if you're unable to lift the hand off.

Now you may be asking...can a rotator cuff tear heal and pain subside without medications, injections, or surgery?

In most cases, yes...but it depends on but not limited to the following factors.

- What is the grade of the tear? There are 3 grades.
- Which of the 4 muscles of the rotator cuff is torn.
- How old is the tear.

#### Mapping the Michigan Leg of the Marquette Greenway

Editor's note — The following column was submitted by Ed Lawler of Michiana, Mich.

No longer will bicyclists from Michiana, Grand Beach and Forest Beach risk the white-knuckle ride along the narrow, debristrewn shoulder of U.S. 12 to pedal into a revitalized downtown New Buffalo.

That's if plans continue to take shape for the Michigan portion of the Marquette Greenway, the 58-mile non-motorized bicy-

cle and walking trail from Chicago's southeast side to New Buffalo.

Funds are being raised, government and private grants secured and easements negotiated as the route of the 3.8-mile leg of the trail from the Indiana state line to New Buffalo is being finalized.

Bicyclists, walkers and joggers could begin enjoying the trail by 2020 if progress remains apace, according to Caroline Ramsay, a member of a New Buffalo community support team for the trail.

"We're delighted with the progress, and we appreciate the groundswell of grassroots support for the final leg of the trail," Ramsay says. "People are beginning to realize what an asset the trail will be for our community."

Improved safety for bicyclists is just one of the benefits of a non-motorized bicycle and walking trail.

"National studies say that proximity to a bike trail can boost residential and commercial property values from 5 to 20 percent, and we trend the same way," says Julie Clark, Traverse Area Recreation and Transportation Trails executive director.

TART research found that visitors using its network of 100 miles of bicycle/ walking paths on

eight trails in the Traverse City region spend an average of \$22 per trip. Nearby restaurants, breweries, wineries and the local lodging industry see more traffic thanks to the trails.

"Most people attribute part of the Traverse region's success and vibrancy to the trails," Clark says.

The TART trails have prompted more outdoor exercise among area residents.

"According to our survey, 90 percent of respondents say they are getting more exercise because of the trails," Clark says. "That translates to a healthier population."

The trail network has the additional benefit of drawing neighborhoods and communities closer together, Clark says.

The biggest proponents of the trails, according to TART research, are retirees and millennials.

"Both groups have a choice of where they choose to live," Clark says. "They can live anywhere, but if you don't offer quality-of-life amenities like outdoor trails, the retirees and the millennials will choose to live elsewhere."

In Fort Wayne, the city's trail network — the Rivergreenway — has become enormously popular and is a point of civic pride, says Don Stoneburner, a former Fort Wayne resident and avid bicyclist who now lives full time in New Buffalo. He's been encouraging Harbor Country leaders to take a similar route and get behind the Michigan portion of the Marquette Greenway.

In 2008, when Fort Wayne proposed building a portion of a new trail — now known as the Towpath — that skirted past Stoneburner's condominium complex, a majority of the 71 homeowners were opposed. Many cited security and privacy concerns, and others didn't like that the path would cross the complex's main entrance. Some were concerned the path would cut into the bank of a nearby private pond.

Stoneburner, president of his condo association at the time, thought his fellow residents were being shortsighted, overlooking a raft of economic, environmental and recreational benefits the path would create. He persuaded the association's board to grant an easement to the city to create that portion of the Towpath. It was completed in 2012.

"Many of those who opposed the path and their families are now regular users of the trail system," Stoneburner says. "The trail has given the residents walking and riding access to schools, parks and downtown, not to mention access to many other activities and locations in Fort Wayne."

There have been no incidents of vandalism nor other crimes along the path adjacent to the condos, Stoneburner says. Nor have there been any accidents along the path where it intersects with the condo association entrance. The association's proximity to the trail has helped increase buyer demand for the units, he adds.

Heather Gradowski, a Realtor and member of the New Buffalo support team for the Marquette Greenway, is certain homes and businesses with proximity to the trail will see enhanced values. Gradowski noted, for example, that real estate ads in the South Haven area near the Kal-Haven Trail tout a property's proximity to the pathway.

A wealth of studies throughout the country indicates higher residential and commercial property values based on their proximity to a biking/hiking trail, Gradowski notes. A community's enhanced tax base can provide the funds to maintain the trails without a millage or bond issue.

Longer range, she notes a proposal to build a trail from Stevensville to St. Joseph and possibly extend it from there up to South Haven to connect with the Kal-Haven.

"Trails seem to be coming at us from either direction," she says with a laugh. "Now's our time to get onboard."

The community support team estimates the Michigan leg of the Marquette Greenway will cost \$3.6 million, with much of that amount in the form of federal and state grants. However, grassroots support is important, and the team is hoping the community and local grants will raise \$650,000 over the next couple of years, with \$120,000 in private donations needed by Oct. 1.

#### **New Buffalo Streetscape Project**

New Buffalo, in partnership with the New Buffalo Downtown Development Authority, is in the final phase of making improvements to the community's downtown area.

The work will replace water and sewer lines, and create a new streetscape.

With construction in the final weeks, most of the roadway within project limits will be closed to through traffic. Intermittent sidewalk closures will be necessary. Abonmarche will work with residents and businesses, to the extent feasible, to minimize disruptions.

# Question: Please describe the landscape improvements that are planned for the Downtown Streetscape Project.

**Answer:** The landscape improvements will be extensive, including shade and ornamental trees and a multitude of plants, grasses and shrubs. All shade and ornamental trees will be nursery grown and of specimen quality. Trees will be pruned to achieve street form no more than 5 to 6 feet.

Twenty four trees will be planted. More than 750 perennials, grasses and shrubs will be planted. The palette of plant materials were chosen to provide a range of color, texture and seasonal interest. Common names for the trees are: Redpointe Red Maple, Princeton Sentry Maidenhair, Armstrong Maple, Stredkeeper Honeylocust, Autumn Brilliance Amelanchier and Pyramidal European Hornbean.





#### Off the Book Shelf

# <u>The Crooked Staircase</u> by Dean Koontz (hardcover, \$28 retail in bookstores and online; also

(hardcover, \$28 retail in bookstores and online; also available as an eBook)

How does he do it? Koontz has written another blockbuster that is equal to, maybe even better than, his last.

Two books ago, he introduced a new character to his wide-ranging ensemble: Jane Hawk, former FBI and now America's most wanted. First came <u>The Silent Corner</u>, then <u>The Whispering Room</u>. Reading the first two helps, but Koontz offers enough background to understand Jane's mission. Here's the lowdown on this latest thriller that will leave you gasping for more...

"The new world coming will be shaped by those who...are most equipped to identify and correct all the errors to which human beings are so prone."

That is the philosophy of the Arcadians, a small, but growing group that thinks, no, is convinced it is the

future leader of the world. Its members are working toward a new world order in which a few people believe they know best how the world should be run. This is no small-time rebellious group with a harebrained scheme. Oh no, they have the technology, the inroads to government and law enforcement, and one more thing...the most dangerous thing of all: Their scientists have developed a control mechanism, a weblike nano machine that is inserted via a shot in the neck and scrambles the brain to take away all those nasty thoughts like free will or morality. The worst part is that the subjects remember nothing and see themselves as before; they become minions through a certain phrase that triggers the mechanism in their brain.

Some will be programmed to commit suicide, others are made assassins. The rest are reprogrammed to do their master's bidding, enslaved and used as cheap labor, if you will, with no conscious thought.

The Arcadians have figured out that those who can influence others with wrong ideas (as determined by them, of course) should first be eliminated. These people are on the Hamlet List and will be made to commit suicide.

Enter Jane Hawk. Her husband, ex-Army, committed suicide last year. He left a cryptic note that made no sense. Jane knew her husband was not capable of suicide and started her research. Statistics revealed a significant rise in suicides throughout the country, and they were all people who had every

reason to live.

Having earlier discovered the existence of the Arcadians, she is now on the trail of one of their leaders. Having thought originally one man led the band, she has discovered that like the Hydra, this group has many heads.

Since the Arcadians have infiltrated all phases of government and law enforcement, Jane cannot take her knowledge to the police or FBI. Because they have threatened her child, she has had to hide him with friends. In <u>The Crooked Staircase</u>, it appears Jane may have underestimated her enemies...

It's a wild ride through California, Nevada and Utah as Jane is hot on the trail of Booth Hendrickson, another of the Hydra's heads. She starts with his half-brother, Simon Yegg. Fascinating, how Jane operates. No wonder she was one of the FBI's finest. It's important to remember that interrogation is her specialty.

"Persuading" Simon to help her, Jane races off to her next destination with


Simon in tow. He leads her to the crooked staircase: a place of darkness and sorrow. What's there is the stuff of nightmares. At the same time, Jane has no knowledge of what is happening at the home of Gavin and Jessica, where her son, little Travis, is being hidden. Gavin sights a drone circling in the distance...should he be afraid? Remember, Gavin, discretion is the better part of valor. Run!

The Arcadians are incensed Jane has made it as far as she has and are determined to kill her or make her last hours pure hell. But finding her is proving more difficult. The chase is on! But the question remains — is she the pursued or the pursuer?

The first two books showed a woman who has carefully planned each step of the way. In this book, we see a Jane who is a little more frazzled, and who makes a few missteps. Ah, but the way she recovers her strength and purpose is what makes this story exciting from beginning to end.

These three books have been among, if not *the* most exciting I have read. Maybe a little sci-fi, maybe not? All this social media, all this "transparency" makes all more vulnerable than ever. After all, don't bullies exert a kind of mind control over their victims? Making them feel alone, useless and often times leading them to suicide? OK, this story may be more sci-fi, but the analogy is there. See what you think. I give this book two enthusiastic thumbs up! Make that 10 toes, too.
