zation, it began in 2008, with founder Julie Kasniunas returning from a plein air workshop sponsored by Indiana Plein Air Painters Association in downstate Indiana. Her resulting enthusiasm and excitement led to the formation of a core group, including painters Pat Herman and Julia Holmaas.

"I'm sure Julie and Julia would agree that when we began, there was no plan to 'grow a group,' just a desire to paint regularly together outside — in the beginning just two or three at a venue," Herman said. "Now, (there are) regularly 14-16 or more and many drop-ins from our email list. People just keep finding us. It's been amazing to watch it Continued on Page 2

En Plein Air, a French expression meaning "in the open air," refers to the art of painting outdoors in all kinds of weather and at various times of the day. It was often used to describe the Impressionist painters of France, especially Claude Monet.

The term now describes anyone who paints outside. In our area, Duneland Plein Air Painters explores the region by producing sparkling, sun-filled moments, in the process capturing the immediacy of our vicinity as it exists today.

DPAP is "Celebrating 10 Years of Making Art" with an exhibit featuring 21 members through July 1 at Southern Shore Art Association Gallery, 724 Franklin St. As an organi-

grow. No rules, no dues, no officers – just *plein air* painters who've become friends."

All three artists were committed to exploring outdoor/on-site painting locations within the Michiana region. From there, the group began expanding through word mouth, becoming known formally as Duneland Plein Air Painters and developing a reputation for its welcoming and non-judgmental approach to all who wished to join their artistic forays regardless of skill level.

DPAP meets weekly April through October at pre-selected locations throughout northern Indiana and southern Michigan, primarily LaPorte, Lake and Porter counties in Indiana and Berrien County in Southwest Michigan. These sites are selected based on member response and sugges-

tions. The majority of meet times takes place early morning until noon, followed by a group critique and often lunch. Other times, they gather in the afternoon to begin painting, or even in the early evening when there is a full moon for special night scenes.

Plein Air is for anyone who loves being outdoors in nature, has an appreciation for art, loves painting or learning how to paint and is willing to go beyond their comfort zone to stretch their imagination. It's all about leaving the convenience of your home or studio with indoor controls to experience the air, scents and challenges of the outdoors. DPAP is made up of artists of varying levels of experience, so the comradery, non-competitive nature, the come-and-learn-and-grow attitude provides a way to paint safely in numbers and at your own pace.

Happily, there will be two plein air exhibit sites in Michigan City this month. In addition to the SSAA Gallery, The Rising Phoenix Gallery offers "En Plein Air Exhibit" through June and featuring the works of David Baker and DPAP painters Herman and Betty Thomas. David is a retired art educator from Southwestern Michigan College in Dowagiac now serving as art professor emeritus. He also teaches at Ox-Bow School of Art in Saugatuck and serves on the faculty of Krasl Art Center in St. Joseph, Mich.

#### **Upcoming Event**

"First Brush of Fall," a paintout event and competition, is Sept. 21-23 in the Michigan City area, thanks to the strong organizational efforts of Jeffrey Baumgartner.

For anyone interested in fine art, en plein air painting or in the continuing growth of the visual arts in our region, the event signals a new and exciting challenge, a perfect fit for "create, play, repeat" branding.

Baumgartner is the artistic director at Dunes Summer Theatre. Dunes Art Foundation, which oversees the theater group, is sponsoring the event in partnership with Indiana Plein Air Painters Association and Converse, IN Paint Out.

In addition to being a professional actor/performer, Baumgartner is a highly skilled plein air painter. He developed his interest in painting

after playing "Vincent" for 12 years on stage, stating that at one point, he felt, "I finally have gotten the guy. He was incredibly focused about learning how to paint."

That prompted him to open a studio and take classes at The Art Institute of Chicago. In 2010, he was introduced to *plein air* through an IPAPA work-

shop. In 2012, he took an eight-week paint/drive across country to Carmel, Calif., and spent another six weeks painting his way back, winding up in Carmel, Ind.

More trips followed throughout the U.S. to various paint-outs/competitions, meeting and developing friendships with other painters and prominent *plein air* artists. After attending Converse's first Brush of Fall paint out near Kokomo, Ind., he persuaded leaders there to trade off making this event a biennial one with Michigan City.

September marks the first of what will become an established biennial plein air competition for our area. It will include a special Sunday morning "Fast Paint" where participating artists have limited time to produce a singular work, which is

then showcased for monetary awards. Sunday afternoon, all paintings will be turned in by 1 p.m. to the theater, juried for major awards totaling about \$10,000, followed by a public viewing from 2 to 4:30 p.m. Registrations have begun, and this paint out event promises to be one of the more exciting venues the area has to offer in 2018.

#### The Cast is the Whole Show in "Ocean's 8"

Here's the thing: You could say "Ocean's 8" is a continuation of Steven Soderbergh's popular trilogy that featured the likes of George Clooney, Brad Pitt, Matt Damon and Julia Roberts. Even amid a low point (2004's tedious "Ocean's Twelve"), there was fun to be had watching movie stars goof off, play-

ing the equivalent of the naughty kids at school, too smooth to get caught by the principal.

Clooney's exceedingly slick thief Danny Ocean may or may not be dead as "Ocean's 8" begins, the family's criminal reins handed over to his sister, Debbie (Sandra Bullock), who is being released from prison after a five-year stint. We see Debbie before the parole board, Bullock delivering Debbie's plea for leniency with the sweet-as-apple-pie sincerity one might expect from America's Sweetheart.

Seconds later, Debbie is free — decked out in a dress that is anything but sincere — and itching for the latest score, Bull-

ock clearly relishing the character's gleefully defiant side.

From there, the film, itself, co-written and directed with high polish by Gary Ross ("The Hunger Games," "Seabiscuit," "Pleasantville") settles into the exact same format as the other "Oceans" pictures. In an era where old ideas are repackaged and resold as nostalgia, the over familiarity of "Ocean's 8," the routineness of it all, strips the picture of any freshness or excitement.

Having said that, "Ocean's 8" remains solid comfort food. You'd be hard-pressed to find a cast more game than this, especially Bullock and fellow Oscar winners Cate Blanchett and Anne Hathaway, who blaze through scenes as if they've been craving material this juicy.

The high-concept twist this time around, obviously, is the all-female cast, and it is what gives the story its kick. Debbie has spent the past five years formulating and reformulating plans for her next elaborate heist, one that tosses into the mix an act of revenge involving an old flame (Richard Armitage) responsible for getting her tossed into the clink. Her target is a Cartier necklace valued

at \$150 million. How to sneak it past its protectors? Persuade spoiled, self-absorbed actress Daphne Kluger (Hathaway) to wear it at the high-profile Met Gala, switch it with a fake and waltz off with the genuine article.

Debbie enlists the aid of old pal Lou (Blanchett)

to round up a team crafty enough to pull off the heist. With this film and last year's "Thor: Ragnarok," it's good to see the ferociously intense Blanchett ease up a bit, have fun, go with the flow.

Rounding out Debbie's team are Mindy Kaling as jewelry maker Amita, Awkwafina as street hustler Constance, Rihanna as hacker Leslie, Helena Bonham Carter as fashion designer Rose Weil and Sarah Paulson as Tammy, a profi-

these actress, but here's where "Ocean's 8" falls short. Any heist picture is divided into thirds: the first, which revels in the details, the planning; the second, the heist itself; and the third, the epilogue. In the first "Ocean's Eleven," the early scenes had a lot of funny dialogue and lively exchanges. Not so here. Ross' script, which he cowrote with Olivia Milch, lacks the same wit. We are left waiting, as they say, for the "good stuff."

Thankfully, it arrives when the heist commences, which is crammed with a smorgasbord of cameos and twists. Ross choreographs the actresses with lickety-split precision as they maneuver through a sea of familiar faces and one close call after another. The film's second act is everything you'd want from an "Oceans" movie. And it is here that Hathaway walks off with the picture, proving Daphne has a few tricks up her sleeve as well.


By that point, "Ocean's 8" is precisely what it set out to be: fun. Is it especially memorable? Eh... but that's OK. A pleasant diversion is good enough these days.

Bubbles Ice Cream Parlor has a way of endearing itself to customers far beyond its hand-dipped delights.

For some, it is the youthful staff who view what they do not as a job, but as family, aging before our eyes over time into earnest young adults.

For others, it is memories forged and preserved.

Take, for instance, the first time my son, Will, sampled his first intimidating scoops of Blue Moon ice cream cratered within a

hefty waffle cone. Outside the parlor. Not quite 2, not quite mastering the art of consuming ice cream, thick blue streaks across his face like war paint. Moments later, standing amid the stream of bubbles projected from a tiny machine, the bubbles dancing around him as if designed to lift his tiny frame into the heavens. My wife and I, kicking ourselves on the car ride home for not capturing the moment with pictures. A few weeks or so later, returning to Bubbles to discover pictures of Will from that day, included within a collage of photos displayed across the wall.

Someone from Bubbles snapped those photos as we remained blissfully unaware of their presence. We, like all those who entered their doors, were more than just dollar signs to them.

The family behind Bubbles has been creating memories like that for 15 years at Coolspring Avenue and Wabash Street. Now, owners Kim and Tim Martin are shaping new memories with doughnuts

that defy customer expectations for such pastries.

Doughnuts with names like Maple Bacon. Fat Elvis. Cookie Monster. Fruity Pebbles.

The Martins, whose son, Zach, is an integral part of the enterprise, are not the type of owners who distance themselves from customers. On any day, they can be seen relaxing in one of the booths, chatting with staff, shooting the breeze with customers.

The story of how Bubbles came to be is one the Martins share with a laugh. After all, it began with a dare. Simple, yet straightforward.

Sixteen years ago, the couple was lounging about with friends, gathered around the pool at their home. They were commiserating their lot in life. Some were involved in strikes at their places of employment. Some had lost their jobs. Others were headed off to college. Someone lamented the lack of old-fashioned, hand-dipped ice cream in town.

Tim piped in, saying, "I know a great place for an ice cream shop."

Kim, in response, issued a challenge.

"I said, 'Go buy it," Kim recalled, laughing at the memory. "I dared him to buy the property...and he did."

The couple formulated a business plan, engaged in the appropriate research and within time, Bubbles Ice Cream Parlor was born. The formula for success was simple. The Martins concentrated on serving the best ice cream possible in its delectably retro, 1950s mom-and-pop setting.

It was while vacationing in Florida, Tim says, that the couple frequented a bakery that produced doughnuts with eclectic tastes. Back home, Bubbles had the counter space and, more importantly, the time to consider such an option for customers. From 10 each night to noon each ensuing day, the parlor sat empty. So, the Martins decided this year to test drive their new doughnut concepts, from 7 a.m. to noon Saturday and Sunday only. Many ideas for doughnuts came from Pinterest, Tim says, others from the staff, many "out of the blue."

Watching customer reactions, especially among children, is what the Martins savor.

"Kids this age," Tim says, "have never experienced anything fresh like this, so when their eyes light up, it's an entirely new experience for them."

Then again, Bubbles, from the start, has been about people. The customers. The staff.

Especially the staff.

"This year, we have five graduating from high school," Kim said. "We've seen them all the way through high school. We watch them grow and learn.

"They're growing up into adults."





#### **Becoming One with Benedictines and Baseball in Bridgeport**

My dear wife Natalie always has my best interests at heart. One day a few years back, she went online and found me, as she said, "a monastery a lot closer to home."

Allow me to explain.

We live in the southwest corner of Michigan's lower peninsula — right across Lake Michigan from Chicago — and I was, at the time, fulfilling my duties of a Benedictine oblate, or lay member, of St. Meinrad Archabbey, which is more than six hours away in the southernmost part of Indiana. I had been going to St. Meinrad on an annual retreat every December with a great group of Catholic men from South Bend, but the last time, our bus nearly ran off the highway during a blizzard. Natalie was not too nuts about a repeat performance, observing that I was spending a lot of windshield time once a month when I drove over to the Kalamazoo area for oblate meetings.

"How often does a monk from St. Meinrad come to your meetings?" she asked.

"Not often," I said.
"We pray in the office together, and then we usually watch a video of a conference from St. Meinrad."

"All right," Natalie said, "so let me get this straight: you're driving an hour on I-94 to go to an oblate meeting to get the wisdom of the monks from St.

Meinrad, and there usually isn't a monk there?" "Yeah, but —"

"What if I told you that you could drive an hour the other way, or take the train, which you love, and get the wisdom of real, live monks at every oblate meeting?"


"I'd say, sign me up."


And so, Natalie assigned me to check out the website of Monastery of the Holy Cross at 3111 S. Aberdeen St. in Chicago's historic Bridgeport neighborhood.

Like, wow!

I was blown away.

Literally, because, after all, I grew up on Chicago's South Side as a die-hard White Sox fan, and it was not lost on me that this here Monastery of the Holy Cross was literally within easy walking distance to the White Sox's Guaranteed Rate Field at 35th and Shields.

"You could go to Mass with the monks, attend your oblate meeting with the monks and then walk to a White Sox game," Natalie said. "What do you think?"

I looked at the website and liked what I saw, which was this:

Monastery of the Holy Cross is a Roman Catholic Benedictine Monastery of the Subiaco Cassinese Congregation. Continuing a centuries-old tradition, we live according to the Rule of St. Benedict, seeking God through a life of prayer, silence, work and hospitality. We do this in a distinctive way by offering the Church the service of contemplative life in the city. The monastery was established in the Chicago Archdiocese at the invitation of Cardinal Bernadine in 1991. In 2011, it was elevated to the status of independent priory by Abbot President Bruno Marin, OSB.

What's not to like, I thought, and so, on a gray, Benedictine day in December 2014, I took a deep breath, called the monastery and asked the guest master, one Dom Ezekiel Brennan, OSB, if I could arrange an exploratory visit.

Brother Ezekiel said: "Sure. And why don't you stay for lunch?"

And so, I set out from Southwest Michigan by car, South Shore commuter train, CTA Orange Line train and foot to visit what could become my new monastery.

Brother Ezekiel greeted me in the warm Benedictine manner, settled me in at the nearby guesthouse and bid me join the monks for the midday office, followed by a lunch cooked and served by the monks in the refectory. And amid it all, silent prayers that I was making the right decision.

When I joined the small, but spiritually mighty band of some dozen or so monks, I knew Natalie had once again steered me in the right direction.

The monks opened their table to me that day and bid me break bread and a delicious vegetable casserole with them while the reader of the week declaimed from a book about how Europe stumbled into a great war in August 1914.

And then, when we had had our repast, Prior Peter Funk, OSB, suggested I talk oblate business with Father Edward Glanzmann, OSB.

I told Father Edward my story and why I came to the monastery, and he suggested I write to the oblate director at St. Meinrad Archabbey, Father Meinrad Brune, OSB, and request permission for a transfer to Monastery of the Holy Cross.

I did as instructed, and Father Meinrad wrote back by return mail and gave me his blessings to depart Saint Meinrad and join Monastery of the Holy Cross as an oblate.

I forwarded Father Meinrad's letter to Prior Peter, and in no time flat, I was attending monthly Mass and oblate meetings at 31st and Aberdeen in Chicago. I was fitting in so well with the monks and other oblates that by December 2015, I did not hesitate to accept Prior Peter's invitation to transfer my oblation to Monastery of the Holy Cross at Mass. I also confessed at the oblate meeting that followed that I was a die-hard White Sox fan in search of fellow fans to attend a game or two during the 2016 season.

Well, it had not been much of a season for my White

Sox — what else is new? — but, wonder of wonders, one Sunday that summer, I persuaded one of the monks to join me for a game. When he appeared out of habit in jeans, casual shirt and comfortable shoes, I was a bit surprised, but I was soon delighted by his company as we walked on over to the ballpark, not more than a mile really, and enjoyed his astute observations as we watched the White Sox once again snatch defeat out of the jaws of victory.

I told the good monk I was taking him to the game that summer day in 2016 in gratitude for the gracious hospitality he showed me that bleak winter's day in 2014 when I was seeking a spiritual home closer to my home in Michigan.

The good Benedictine smiled and said, "That's what we do."

I continued mixing baseball and Benedictines through the 2017 season, even though some of my prayers were being answered by September as the Sox began showing promise for 2018.

Well, it's 2018, and the White Sox have loaded their roster with hot young players and, well, I've been to two games so far this season. Despite fervent prayers for their success at Monastery of the Holy Cross, I have yet to witness a White Sox win. But there is still a lot of baseball to be played this season, and many happy, baseball-loving monks to pray with, so stay tuned.

But just know that you read it here first: the Chicago White Sox will win the World Series in 2020... because they have 20-20 vision.

Two dune buggys will roll through Indiana Dunes National Lakeshore this summer, providing South Shore passengers and Dunewood campground visitors free shuttle service to the park's beaches.

For the east end shuttle, one dune buggy will pick up visitors at the Dunewood campground registration office and shuttle to the Kemil Beach parking. It also will make a stop at the U.S. Geological Survey parking lot to pick up overflow beach parking.

First Friday on June 1 unveiled the first tempting fiber art works of 2018.

SFC Gallery presents Suzy Vance, a fiber artist specializing in felted "paintings." Suzy began her journey into fiber when her mother taught her to knit at a young age. She even brought her knitting with her to college to stem off boredom in classes and lecture halls. Later, she bought a weaving loom and became an avid weaver, eventually learning how to spin yarns and felt with wool.

It is the expressive properties of dyed wools to create "painted fiber forms" that especially captured her attention. The process to create these beautiful works is fascinating as it allows for spontaneous responses on the part of the artist, resulting in a highly textural surface. It's tempting to want to touch.

Most of her completed works are mounted on deckled edged handmade paper and custom framed. She is a multitalented individual with published books of original art and poetry. In addition to felted art works, she also is the coordinator of "No Regrets Getaway," which plans special events, such as team-building retreats, immersion into nature or






#### The Race is On!



#### **Top 2 Most Common Causes of Heel and Foot Pain**

Dear NW Indiana Neighbor,

Summer is upon us.

What a great time to spend with family and friends...out in the park...on the beach...maybe hiking...or just leisure walking enjoying the beautiful outdoors.

But all these activities also mean being up on your feet a lot...

Unfortunately, heel and foot pain can derail your best laid summer plans.

Heel and foot pain is no joke...

- Pain the morning, when stepping out of bed and taking the first steps of the day
  - with prolonged standing
  - when standing up after sitting for awhile
  - when walking barefoot or in shoes with poor support

#### Cause #2: Achilles Tendonitis

Achilles Tendonitis is the second most common cause of heel and foot pain.

The pain can go up the back of the ankle when walking or running.

It is an irritation of the Achilles tendon (the largest and strongest tendon in our body), a thick band of tissue along the back of the lower leg that connects the calf muscles to the heel.

How do you know if you have Achilles tendonitis?

There will be:

- Tenderness in the heel or higher up in the Achilles tendon
- Tightness in the ankle
- Tightness in the calf
- Swelling in the back of the ankle
- Pain in the back of the heel when walking or running

#### **Going Green at Lunch**



Krueger Middle School recently implemented a compost and recycling program in the school cafeteria that is significantly reducing the amount of waste headed to landfills.

The program, spearheaded by environmental science teacher Daisy Lee, began April 30. It involves two stations manned by student volunteers who assist other students in disposing items on their trays in an eco-friendly manner at one of five stations: Share Table; Compost; Recycling; Garbage; and Trays.

Sodexo custodial staff assist with setup each day for the stations.

"Before this program, the kids were producing up to 12 bags of garbage in the cafeteria each day during lunch," Lee said. "Now, we're down to just two bags a day."

Food scraps are collected in small buckets, which are composted by seventh-graders in an area behind the school. Krueger, which is an environmental science-themed middle school, uses the compost as fertilizer and mulch for plantings on school property.


Michigan City Area Schools Food Service staff take food left on the "share" table to area homeless shelters.

"On a typical day, we may have 50 or 60 bags of sliced apples and 20 bananas, along with milk, string cheese and apple sauce to give to the shelter," Lee said. "All of this was being thrown in the garbage before."

Other immediate benefits the student volunteers cataloged:

- In the first two weeks alone, students saved 481 pounds of food from going into the landfill due to compost (not including the share table).
- In the first two weeks, students saved 180 pounds of recycling from
  - going into the landfill.



• The school will use 30-40 fewer plastic trash bags each week in the cafeteria thanks to the program.

Krueger also partners with Quality Beet, 717 Franklin St., which has been donating its food scraps to the school to compost for about a year.





At Portage Lakefront, Twisted Citrus will offer a varied menu in the Lakefront Pavilion from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Thursday through Sunday. Porter Beach will feature food and ice cream treats from the Hot Diggity Dawg cart Friday through Monday afternoons during the beach season.

The Northwest Indiana Symphony Orchestra returns to West Beach for a concert at 7:30 p.m. Friday, Aug. 3. Take chairs. Food trucks and park partner booths are planned.

**On June 20, 1793,** inventor Eli Whitney applied for a patent on his cotton gin.



#### Off the Book Shelf

The Outsider by Stephen King (hardcover, \$30 online and in bookstores; also available as an eBook)

"I was thinking about the universe. There really is no end to it, is there?

And no explaining it."

Stephen King likes you to consider possibilities; other reasons why something happens, or someone or something isn't what it appears to be.

Keep that in mind as I relate to you a tale of two cities in two states, and something that happens in each that is not only improbable, but impossible. Science is showing us every day that what was once called impossible is now a reality. Welcome now to the impossible kingdom of King...

Flint City, Okla., is your typical small town, mostly a safe place to raise a family. Safe, that is, until the body of 9-year-old Frankie Peterson is found in a city park. Finding the body is the elderly Mr. Jon Fritz, who can barely repeat what he saw.

The story actually starts out with police statements by Fritz and anyone who might have seen Frankie the day


he was so violently killed. It sets the tone of the horror and evil someone could do to a child. The various witnesses seem to lay no doubt as to who did the deed...Terry Maitland, the Little League coach, English teacher, husband and father of two girls. Wow. Maitland is the kind of guy who wouldn't litter. How could this little community think of him as a stone cold, sadistic killer?

Det. Ralph Anderson knows the Maitland family well. His son was in Little League. Imagine the feelings going through your mind if you have a son who was so close to a psychopathic killer...he could have been Terry's victim instead of the Peterson boy.

With that boiling in his mind, Anderson makes the rash decision to arrest Maitland during a Little League game in front of almost 1,500 fans who know and respect him. Two detectives, but not Anderson, march onto the playing field and put the cuffs on Terry to the horror of his wife and daughters. That decision will soon prove to be the worst of his career.

Marcy Maitland soon finds her friends deserting her one by one as community feelings rise to mass hysteria when evidence comes out in the newspaper.

Many witnesses come forward: Among them is Arlene Stanhope who saw Maitland at 3 p.m. talking to Frankie, whose bike had a broken chain. She said Terry put the bike in a white van and Frankie



You see, Maitland has an air-tight alibi: He and some other teachers went to Cap City

for an English teachers conference. Each teacher told the same story, and surveillance cameras bore out that Maitland was, indeed, attending a conference at the same time Frankie Peterson was being tortured and murdered. The two cities were far enough apart that Maitland could not have done the deed in Flint City and made it back to the conference that fast. What we have here is a basic law of physics — Maitland simply couldn't be in two places at the same time. Science is clear about that. But what is the answer? Jeannie Anderson, Ralph's wife, has an explanation: She thinks the only answer that makes sense is that Maitland must have had a double

work with him. But what if the real answer is completely out of the realm of sensibility?


Here is where King shines (no pun intended). He has the hairs on our arms standing up, and he revels in keeping the reader dazed and confused until the end. The only solid piece of evidence is that Frankie Peterson is dead. That cannot be disputed; however, trying to make sense of the rest is impossible. Jeannie sums it up: "The more you find, the wronger it gets."

Another expert is brought in to help. Her name is Holly Gibney (the beloved character from King's "Mr. Mercedes" trilogy). She tells them of another murder in Ohio that sounds eerily like the Peterson one. After hearing the Peterson story, she has another explanation: the murders were committed by an "outsider."

As Holly tells Anderson, "Most legends hold a grain of truth, but they're not the truth, if you see what I mean." And you will see in a wide-eyed climax that takes place in a cave in Texas and is pure Stephen King.
