Guardian of the Great Lakes

heir motto is *Semper Paratus*. Translated as "Always Ready," it is an appropriate description for the men and women of the Coast Guard Auxiliary who assist the U.S. Coast Guard in protecting our country's navigable waterways.

Auxiliary members volunteer their time and talents at the USCG facility on the east side of Michigan City's harbor. They assist in patrolling more than 600 square miles of Lake Michigan. The coverage area is 18 miles east of the station to Cherry Beach in St. Joseph, Mich., and 15 miles west of the station to Gary's West Beach. Northern coverage depends on the size of their boat and the height of the waves.

Prior to World War II, Congress initially estab-

lished the Coast Guard Reserve, which allowed volunteer citizens who owned motorboats or yachts to help promote safety on the nation's navigable waters. Congress amended the act in 1941, making the reserve a military branch of the active service and renaming the civilian section Coast Guard Auxiliary. During World War II, 50,000 auxiliary members were part of the war effort by helping secure harbors along the coasts.

By 1996, the Coast Guard Authorization Act was signed into law. It was the first major legislation affecting the auxiliary since its establishment. According to its website, the amendments expanded the purpose and made the following major changes: "The purpose of the Auxiliary is to assist the Coast Guard as authorized by the Commandant in per-

forming any Coast Guard function, power, duty, role, mission or operation authorized by law. In addition, the legislation expanded the Commandant's authority to use the Auxiliary to assist other Federal agencies, State authorities, and local governments in areas in addition to recreational boating safety."

Today, there are more than 30,000 auxiliary members. Volunteers live across the U.S., in Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, American Samoa and Guam.

The Coast Guard Auxiliary, according to its website, is under direct authority of the U.S. Department of Homeland Security via the commandant of the U.S. Coast Guard. Its internal operating levels are broken down into four organizational levels: National, District, Division and Flotilla.

The national staff are responsible for the administration and policy making. The district provides administrative and supervisory support to divisions, along with promoting policies of the district commander and national committee.

Flotillas in the same general geographic area are grouped into divisions that provide administrative, training and supervisory support to flotillas and promote district and national policy. The flotilla is the auxiliary's basic organizational unit. Quali-

fied members carry out the day-to-day missions of "Team Coast Guard."

Michigan City's Coast Guard Auxiliary is part of 9WR (West Region) Division 33. There are nine divisions throughout portions of Wisconsin, Illinois, Indiana and Michigan. The division office for this region is based in St. Joseph, Mich. Flotilla 33-2, Michigan City, is the largest of the five flotillas in this division, which include St. Joseph, South Haven, Kalamazoo and Michiana.

The Michigan City flotilla has approximately 20 members who assist the Coast Guard in areas such as safety and security patrols, vessel safety examinations, sisting the USCG with current qualification training, search and rescue. recreational and boating safety.

The auxiliary is a unique organization where volunteering also

nization where volunteering also check at the Michigan City sis a commitment to serve our country. Auxiliarists — men and women — come from all walks of life. Some have served in other branches of the armed services, but this is not a requirement. The number of hours an auxiliary member commits is up to his/

"There is a wide gamut of programs that you wouldn't believe," Matthew Baker, flotilla staff officer in charge of public education and public affairs, said. "When I first started I was surprised at the amount of things you can do...in the Coast Guard Auxiliary, you may find something that you never thought of doing."

Individuals who become members are looking for a unique way to give back. During last year's hurricane season, numerous auxiliarists were activated and sent to Texas and Florida.

They also donate their time in a variety of roles, including administrative work, standing watch, being a culinary specialist, assisting in training the new active duties, doing private owner vessel examinations, teaching educational boating and equipment safety classes.

Safety, indeed, is a top priority for the auxiliary. One of the most disconcerting things Dan Hershman, auxiliary member and vice division command-

er of Michigan City Flotilla 33-2, notices when he is on the lake patrolling is lack of boating knowledge.

"You wouldn't believe the number of people that have no idea about the rules of the road on the water," Hershman said. "We offer boating safety classes, which gives them basics of some of the rules. There are programs out there to assist people to understand safe boating rules."

Auxiliarists like Hershman, who are private boat owners, must first pass a Vessel Safety Check and display a current VSC decal. They are assigned a USCG radio call sign. In addition, a Coast Guard Auxiliary patrol ensign (flag) is flown and pennants

signifying USCG Auxiliary Patrol are placed on the bow of the boat. When private vessels are assigned to duty, they basically become a USCG Auxiliary facility, which in turn makes them a government vessel. Even though they receive assistance with gas and some maintenance items, many of the expenses are borne by the private owner.

Although the Coast Guard Aux-

iliary is based on a military structure, it is not as strict. Because of its volunteer nature, everyone within the organization has equal say.

"In a nutshell, we are the volunteer uniformed component of the Coast Guard," Baker said. "We are part of Team Coast Guard. We are responsible for every mission besides direct law enforcement and direct military intervention. We do essentially every job the Coast Guard does, and we are held to the same standard of training as the active and reserve Coast Guardsmen."

When volunteering, auxiliarists do wear a military uniform consisting of a pair of boots, trousers, Coast Guard blue T-shirt, blouse (button-up jacket) and hat. They also are issued a dress uniform.

The auxiliarists are most often visible in the summer, assisting the USCG with many of the larger events, such as the Grand Prix superboat races and firework displays locally and in New Buffalo.

Also commanding their attention are the multitude of individuals arriving at Lake Michigan, especially when the waves are coming in from the north. People love going into the lake. Unfortunately, most do not understand the dangers lurking when Lake Michigan begins to churn. If you have ever been on the shores of Lake Michigan when northerly winds hit, you understand the enticement, but also how rescue missions can increase.

Hershman naturally offered this tidbit of wisdom.

"When you're at the beach and you're walking out into the lake," he said, "you got a natural sand bar that occurs along the entire length of the south end of the beach here.

"When the winds are out of the north, pushing that water south over the top of that sandbar, that water builds up behind the sandbar, and eventually it's going to find a spot in that sand bar where it's weak and it's going to blow out, because it has to get back out into the deeper water. What happens then, you create a rip current. If a person is caught in a rip current, they have no chance."

To survive, first, don't panic, and never try to swim against a rip current, as you will only wear yourself out, making it impossible to survive.

"If you stay with the rip current and relax, just let it take you out," Hershman said. "What happens as it gets out into the deeper water, it forms eddies which will bring you back towards the beach... or swim parallel to the shoreline and you'll be all right."

Rescue events are not all drownings. Sometimes, there are other issues that require boaters to be rescued.

"The Coast Guard has a policy now, unless there's a critical situation, life-threatening issue on board a boat, the people are asked if they will accept commercial towing," Hershman said. "The Coast Guard years ago was sued by commercial towing companies...the policy is the only way that we will launch and go out and bring somebody in.

"It has to meet a certain criteria, which could be a medical emergency, or small children involved without proper hydration. In that case, if commercial towing

can't get to them after a certain amount of time, the Coast Guard will go out and assist. Or, if we come

upon somebody that's broken down on the lake and hasn't made contact with commercial towing or Coast Guard, as auxiliarist we can pick them up, tow them in to safe harbor and get them the help they need."

Two men. Hershman, with a military background and 25 years in the auxiliary, and Baker, with no military training and almost two years as a member. Each expresses their enthusiasm about being an auxiliarist, and giving freely of their time. Both have a love of the water. wanting help to those in distress and giving back.

Hershman's involvement began in

the mid-1990s when his son was participating in a sea cadet event.

"I was approached by a Coast Guard Auxiliary member," Hershman said. "Next thing I know, I was in the Coast Guard Auxiliary. I was in the Navy back in the '60s. I love being out on the water, always have. It was a way for me to help out to assist. I always liked the military lifestyle, the structured lifestyle. It gave me a chance to become involved again. I enjoy it very much."

Baker was looking at ways to donate his time to a special cause. A program on The History Channel about the Coast Guard Auxiliary piqued his curiosity. Through research, he saw Michigan City had a flotilla. His love of the lake, and wanting to make sure it is treated properly by those who enjoy it, drew him to becoming a member.



"Our sector...we are the Guardian of the Great Lakes," Baker said. "I want people to realize we have this fantastic national resource, and we are protecting it. We're helping the people enjoy it and helping the people enjoy it safely. We want them to enjoy it and take care of that resource."

Hershman does not have one specific rewarding experience of being with the Coast Guard Auxiliary.

"I enjoy it," Hershman said. "That's my reward right there: being out, helping out and assisting people that really need help."


Plus, he enjoys being with the actives.

"To me, it's fun to be out on the water with, I call them kids with guns," Hershman said. "Because they're all young. They're between 18-38."

Baker and Hershman both suggest to

anyone interested in learning more about the auxiliary that they attend one of their meetings.

"It's just a great organization to be involved with," Hershman said. "You meet some really great people that are interesting to meet and talk to. They're from a wide range of occupations. We've had people from truck drivers to lawyers to doctors. You get to meet them. It's really amazing, the varied interests that people have, but again it all revolves around back to the water."



The Coast Guard Auxiliary Flotilla meetings are at 9 a.m. the third Saturday of each month at the Michigan City Coast Guard station.

"Fallen Kingdom" is the Best of the "Jurassic" Sequels

Steven Spielberg's "Jurassic Park" remains a marvelous tipping point in cinematic wizardry. If James Cameron hinted at the nifty potential of computerized imagery with "The Abyss" (1989) and "Terminator 2: Judgment Day" (1991), then Spielberg's 1993 adaptation of Michael Crichton's dinosaurs-run-amok tale kicked it up a notch with lifelike prehistoric beasts that awed, thrilled and scared the crap out of us.

These days, there is not much that astonishes. We've seen it all, and "Jurassic World: Fallen Kingdom" is no exception. However, out of all this franchise's regurgitative sequels, "Fallen Kingdom" is the best. Nothing can beat the playfully dangerous way Spielberg choreographed his dinosaur entrances and exits, but J.A. Bayona — the visionary talent behind "A Monster Calls" (2016) and the underrated tsunami tale "The Impossible" (2012) — is the first director to ratchet up the thrills and emotions. You actually care about what happens this time.

"Fallen Kingdom" actually is two films: the first half a cataclysmic disaster tale, the second a monster-in-the-house "boo" movie. A "boo" movie, if you will, is the equivalent of a haunted house ride, where scary things jump out at characters as they make their ways through cramped corridors. Bayona, however, working from a script by "Jurassic World" veterans Colin Trevorrow and Derek Connolly, carefully, and effectively, transitions from one setting to the next.

"Fallen Kingdom" unfolds three years after the collapse of Jurassic World. Claire Dearing (Bryce Dallas Howard), the park's operations manager, rounds up her dinosaur trainer, Owen Grady (Chris Pratt), to head back to Isla Nublar to rescue the surviving beasts. Turns out, the island's long-dormant volcano has become active and is about to blow.

When will the characters in these movies realize any trip to Isla Nublar is asking for trouble? *No* trip to Isla Nublar goes off without its share of fatal hitches, but in this case, the trip is funded by wealthy individuals claiming they intend to move the animals to a new island sanctuary.

The moment the volcano erupts is one of the most exhilarating and terrifying action sequences of the entire franchise, climaxed by the most heartbreaking sight: a lone dinosaur, stranded on the beach, wailing for rescue as it is consumed by the volcano's devastating impact. No other visual comes to mind in this series that better reiterates the foolish consequence of tampering with Mother Nature than this one. That image lingers long after the screen fades to black at the end.

How Owen, Claire and the captured dinosaurs end up from there in a northern California estate is one spoiler you won't find here. Suffice to say, the last act is a rousing mix of childhood nightmares and run-like-hell chases.

Again, we've seen all this before, particularly in this franchise, but not as effectively. "Jurassic World" coasted on the fumes of audience nostalgia for Spielberg's original. "Fallen Kingdom" is the real deal: a roller-coaster ride worth the wait.

"Warhol: Icon & Influence" Comes to Michigan City

A tremendous opportunity to view a world-class artist is here, ready to be enjoyed, perhaps even debated.

Lubeznik Center for the Arts, 101 W. Second St., presents original works by Andy Warhol through Oct. 13, on loan from the collections of Drew and Wendy Levenfeld and Valparaiso University's Brauer Museum of Art. Special events marking this extraordinary show include the opening reception from 5 to 8 p.m. Friday, July 6, as well as a curatorled gallery tour from 10:30 to 11:30 a.m. Saturday, July 14. Additionally, an invited group of artists guided by his legacy will showcase their original works: Chris Cosnowski, Robyn Day, C.J. Hungerman, Yvette Mayorga and Dominic Sansone.

Planning for the exhibit began with the Levenfelds' generous offer to loan six Warhol works from which to build a show around. The next step was to source additional works by the artist. Lending a hand was Gregg Hertzlieb, Brauer Museum of Art director. The Brauer was gifted numerous Warhol screen prints, photographs and Polaroid pictures, now part of its permanent collection. Warhol is considered one of the 20th century's most influential artists. The works in this exhibit are in pristine condition and, once it ends, will return to private hands, unavailable for viewing.

He was born Andrew Warhola on Aug. 6, 1928, in Pittsburgh to immigrant parents. As a child, he was often bedridden and while confined enjoyed collecting pictures of movie stars, which influenced his journey into celebrity culture.

Later, he studied commercial art and became adept at advertising art and graphic design, including shoe designs and illustrations for album covers. He was the first fine artist to create screen prints for mass production. His celebrity subjects included Elvis Presley, Marlon Brando, Marilyn Monroe and Jackie Kennedy. He is perhaps best known, however, for his use of iconic American items such as Campbell soup cans, Coke bottles and dollar bills, all part of 1960s pop culture. The originals in this show span the time period in his career from the late '60s to the late '80s.

The Lubeznik exhibit includes 13 vibrant screen prints. For example, in addition to the famous Campbell soup can, there are four screen prints from the 1986 "Cowboys & Indians Suite": "Plains Indiana Buffalo Shield," "Sitting Bull," "Indian Head Nickel" and "Annie Oakley."

Andy also was ahead of his time in focusing on the cult of celebrity and current pop culture, incorporating the idea of snapping pictures of anything and everything to explore the possibilities of earning commissions and exploiting the everyday/banal. (We now use Instagram, Facebook, etc.) His 25 Polaroid and 14 black-and-white photos on view are representative of this attitude.

A few thoughts from Warhol on the nature of his subjects:

- "My idea of a good picture is one that's in focus of a famous person."
- "Isn't life a series of images that change as they repeat themselves?"

In addition to printmaking and photography, Warhol also worked as a director and producer of films, continuing his exploration of the relationship between the culture of celebrity and the mundane.

In late 1969, along with John Wilcock, he founded the magazine *Interview*.

"My fascination with letting images repeat and repeat – or in film's case 'run on' – manifests my belief that we spend much of our lives seeing without observing."

After barely surviving an attempted murder in 1968, he died on Feb. 22, 1987, at 58 in his sleep after gallbladder surgery.

The opportunity to learn more about this influential artist is readily available for all visitors. Numerous wall quotes highlight the artworks, shedding additional light on the man and his art. Warhol was an artist who loved pop culture, a celebrity in his own right riding outside societal norms, a worshiper of fantasy, movie stars, the boring and repetitive.

No need to travel to New York, Chicago or Los Angeles to see his work. It will be right here, in our own backyard. Take advantage of that fact and go because once it is over, these works will no longer be available for public viewing.

Cast Pulls Off Impeccable Timing in "Noises Off"

"There is nothing like a good old-fashioned plate of sardines."

"Noises Off," written by English playwright Michael Frayn, is a 1982 play-within-a play. A comical, fast-paced farce requiring impeccable timing, and Dunes Summer Theatre's cast does not disappoint.

Here, you have solid actors, playing actors, who are playing actors in the sexually charged farce "Nothing On." Told in three acts, "Noises Off" thrives off door-slamming slapstick and, of course, those darn sardines. Directed by Jeffrey Baumgartner,

the production delivers a total immersion into comical shenanigans.

Donald Beck appears as Lloyd, the director of "Nothing On" and a frustrated, temperamental lothario involved with Poppy and Brooke.

Holly Schroeder plays actress Dotty, who in turn is playing Mrs. Clackett, the somewhat slow-witted housekeeper and producer of those plates of sardines. Andy Ricci as Garry, the leading man who is dating Dotty and, prone to jealousy, appears as Roger, a real-estate agent hoping to rent.

Kalika Rose plays Brooke, who in turn plays Vicki, who Roger

is attempting to seduce. She frequently loses her contact lens and when upset, no matter what else is needed, in the middle of it all, drops cross-legged to meditate.

Derek Demkowicz as Freddy playing Philip, husband to Flavia, owner of the home, has a massive fear of any hint of violence, resulting in nosebleeds and the sometimes dropping of his trousers. Hannah Williams appears as Belinda playing Flavia, wife to Philip, dependable, reliable and the company peacemaker trying to keep it all together.

John Hutchinson plays Selsdon, the older thespian with a drinking problem, who in turn appears as the burglar breaking into Philip and Flavia's house.

Miggie Snyder is Poppy, the assistant stage manager, a bit oversensitive, and by Act Two, pregnant with Lloyd's child.

Mac Westcott as Tim, the seemingly overworked stage manager who apparently understudies as well, has to fix the set and run errands for a demanding Lloyd.

In Act I, the actors are in their final rehearsal before the next day's premiere, completely unready with missed entrances and exits, missed cues, missed lines and those plates of sardines. They are driving Lloyd to utter frustration.

At the end of Act 1, something completely startling happens. The entire set is rotated front to back, exposing the back portion. Watching the actors join together to move the behemoth is jaw dropping. Kudos to the crew and scenic designers.

Act II opens, and we are now sometime later, on the road and the play is now viewed from the back. The emphasis is on how relationships between the cast have deteriorated to where you wonder how they can keep it together. Lots of hijinks ensue as the slapstick accelerates and tensions build.

Act II ends and, again, the entire set is rotated back to its original position in Act I.

In Act III, the cast is approaching the end of its run, and things are definitely not sparkling between them. The props (even those slippery sardines) are all over the place, resulting in missed cues and the actors having to push through no matter what, determined to keep going. However, the plot is so unsavable, they must give it up and eventually ad lib.

This Dunes production is a comical relief. An escapist treat. Abandon logic and allow yourself to laugh, relax and be fully entertained.

The Full Philadelphia

"You really should come and see us in Philadelphia."

That was my cousin, Anne Anderson, after my mother's committal service in Pittsburgh in September 2014.

"You're right," I said. "How about next year?"

And next year it was, beginning with a stop in Pittsburgh, then on to Paoli, Pa., on Amtrak's Pennsylvanian. Anne was there to meet me in full Revolutionary War garb, and she promised a full schedule, beginning with a tour of Valley Forge.




The Washington window at Washington Memorial Chapel at Valley Forge. Open daily, the chapel receives no financial support from the park.

As in, she said, "right now. In fact, I have to step on it because we're meeting a tour group there in half an hour."

By "we," she meant I was going to serve in an unofficial capacity as she guided a busload of friendly folks from a western state through the Valley Forge National Historic Park (phone: 610-783-1000) with charm and wit.

I was so proud of Anne, whom I have known most of my life, as she personalized the hardships born by the embattled Continental Army. They weathered the bitter winter of 1777-1778 in threadbare uniforms and makeshift cabins as their leader, George



Washington, begged the Continental Congress and local farmers to provide for his men while the British wintered in cozy comfort in Philadelphia.

Having just read a novel by Newt Gingrich based on that long winter in Valley Forge, I knew I was at the heart of America's struggle for independence, and there was no finer guide than my cousin.

Anne made it clear Gen. Washington and his officers did not have it much better than their men. But she also noted that under Washington's leadership, the Continental Army forged itself into a formidable presence that gave the British what-for in the spring of 1778.

The next day, Anne invited me along as she shepherded the same group on a tour of the historic sites

of Philadelphia, focusing, of course, on Independence Hall where the Declaration of Independence was signed, sealed and delivered to the American people in July 1776.

"Can you imagine what it was like for them?" Anne asked. "Philadelphia summers are brutally hot and humid, and that summer was no exception. But they stayed the course and drafted a clarion call for independence."

Of course, when they later convened to draft a constitution for the new nation, they failed to emancipate the slaves and give women the vote. That would come much later, but taking the tour with Anne made me proud to be an American. We are far from perfect, I thought, but then looking around and seeing so many other tour groups from Asian and European countries, we must be doing something right to have attracted so many visitors from abroad.

Yes, it rained buckets that early October day in 2015, as we followed the footsteps of the inventive philosopher, Benjamin Franklin, along the glistening sidewalks of old Philadelphia.

Anne assigned me to be the rear guard, and I fulfilled my duty by guiding some stragglers across the busy streets of the City of Brotherly Love. Well, not all Philadelphia drivers were necessarily feeling the love that rainy day, but I was captain of the safety patrol back in 1964 at Barnard Elementary School

in Chicago, so I was up for the task.

Anne saw to it that I was rewarded for my efforts by taking me to an all-you-can eat Asian buffet near Independence Hall.

Then, when I thought Anne couldn't top Valley Forge and old Philadelphia, she treated me to the 75th Annual Chester County House Tour on Saturday, Oct. 3, 2015. We were joined by her brother (and my cousin), John, and Anne's friend, Kaye, and we had a blast touring the old homes and barns of Chester County, Pa.

And there in the heart of Chester itself, a proud owner of a beautifully restored home from yesteryear espied my jacket promoting a certain baseball team and said: "A Sox fan, huh?"

And by Sox, he didn't mean Red. No, he hailed from Chicago's South Side and had not shed his loyalty to the White Sox despite his move to Pennsylvania.

Who knew?

All I knew is that the rains stopped midday, and we four toured so many homes, libraries, barns and buildings that our tootsies were too tender for more at day's end.





New Buffalo, in partnership with the New Buffalo Downtown Development Authority, is in the final phase of making improvements to the community's downtown area.

This series is published to answer questions about the project.

Question: How many parking spots are located in the Central Business District compared to before the streetscape improvements?



Answer: After the completion of construction, the city has a net gain of 40 parking spots.

Q: Will public restrooms be available, and where will they be located?

A: On behalf of the city, Abonmarche will apply for grant funding to build public restrooms adjacent to the transient marina. The final grant decision will be made at the end of 2018, with a proposed award date in spring 2019.







Ladislav Hanka Exhibit Continues

The Midwest Museum of American Art will continue "The Birds & The Bees: The Artwork of Ladislav Hanka" through Sunday, July 15.

Hanka lives in Kalamazoo, Mich., with his wife, sculptor Jana Hanka, their passion being apiculture, or bee keeping. Ladislav Hanka collaborates with active hives as the bees create beeswax or honeycomb formations over the top of his hand-drawn etchings of birds — he is a trained ornithologist — trees, fish and other insects.

As a scientist, Hanka was involved in the field study of nature, but after obtaining a Master of Fine Arts from Western Michigan University, he decided on being an artist as his main career. His artwork examines themes of life, death and transfiguration. Over the years, that has meant visiting old trees and drawing them from life, artist residencies, circumnavigat-



United Effort Targets Cat Overpopulation Issue

Northwest Indiana might well be on its way to solving an overpopulation problem.

Trap Neuter & Return and Westville's Independent Cat Society teamed up to coordinate volunteers to capture abandoned and stray feral cats, then bring them to veterinarians. Females are spayed and males neutered. All receive rabies shots.

"Amazing as it sounds, a pair of cats and their offspring can have 420,000 kittens within seven years," TNR project leader Jodi Dusek said in a press release. "Even a 4- or 5-monthold kitten can get pregnant. Females might have as many as three litters a year, each ranging from three to seven kittens."

Initially in 2012, Dusek reached out to organizations, clinics, veterinarians, shel-

ters and volunteers for help, but no one responded. So, she and her husband, Bernie Howard, began to handle the situation on their own.

"I learned everything I needed to know on the Internet," said Dusek, who now instructs others how to gently trap roaming feral felines and bring them to a vet to be sterilized, then released where they were found.

The ICS/TNR PROJECT Facebook page educates



people on what to do and how to do it, while creating a forum for followers. Ways to help include donating supplies, including canned or dry foods, disposable spoons, garbage bags, paper plates, tarps, laundry detergent to wash blankets and towels, and bleach to sterilize humane traps between each use.

The project united with the cat shelter in January, then officially began trapping March 1. So far, 109 cats have been treated.

First, each live trap is baited with food and covered with a blanket or sheet to keep the cat calm. A pee-pad and towel in each cage help make the animal comfortable until a volunteer picks up him/her for the trip to a carefully chosen veterinarian.

Then, when a vet alters a feral cat, about onequarter inch of the left ear is removed. This identifies the cat as having been fixed. "We call it 'Snip 'Em and Tip 'Em'," Dusek said.


Donations pay for the surgeries and other care.

Dusek also administers the facebook support group, FERAL TAIL TALES, which has more than 6,500 members in rural areas from Indiana to Indonesia.



Off the Book Shelf

The Death of Mrs. Westaway by Ruth Ware (hardcover, \$26.99 retail in bookstores and online; also available as an eBook)

You're flat broke. The rent is due, and you owe a loan shark — the interest is six times the original loan. There's no one you can turn to. Then the letter arrives...

From the author of In a Dark, Dark Wood, The

Woman in Cabin 10 and The Lying Game comes another fantastic, psychological mystery you won't want to miss.

This week, we're transported to Brighton, England, where the ocean boardwalk is a popular place...three seasons out of the year. A few stray visitors venture there in winter, but it's slim pickings for anyone with a business. Like Hal (Harriett) Westaway, who took over her mom's tarot reading stall — Madame Margarida's — after she died. Hal was only 18, no other family — never knew her father — so she had no other choice. Now, three years later, business is scarce, the rent is due and the loan shark is getting threatening — pay up or else.

The the letter arrives. It looks like an invitation, but inside Hal is surprised to find a letter from a solicitor in Penzance. Now, she is even more scared. Is someone suing her? Is it a notice to quit the apartment? What is in the letter sucks the air out of the room...

Hal is named as a beneficiary in a will made out by her late grandmother, Mrs. Hester Westerway of Trepassen House, St. Piran. Wait. Who? This is a grandmother Hal neither met nor knew anything about.

Maybe a mistake has been made...maybe they got the wrong granddaughter...but, wait a minute...maybe there's something here. Maggie, Hal's mother, taught her more than just how to read tarot cards. She taught her about listening, waiting for clues — in other words, how to read people. And maybe the most important lesson of all — how to play a role. Be what the other person wants you to be. She could turn this whole situation into a way to get out of debt — she has certainly learned her lesson about loan sharks.

Maybe there's a few thousand pounds in the will for her. She could collect the money and head back to Brighton, never to see these people again.

But that's just wrong. Hal struggles with her conscience, but the thought of getting out of debt wins over, and off to St. Piran she goes.

The picture painted of Trepassen House by

Ware is spot on. I got the creeps, from entering the wrought-iron gate to the ivy creeping up the walls of the crumbling facade, the flaking paint and the general disrepair. The inside of the house has the air of someone who gave up on life.

As for the remainder of the Westaway family that Hal's mother was a cousin to, here's what Hal observes after everyone returned to Trepassen House

after the funeral: Harding, "a balding man in his fifties," is the oldest child. "He had the air of a man who had eaten a good meal, but would always want more..." He is the only one with a wife, Mitzi, and children, also at Trepassen House.

"A bearded man with dark blond hair fading to gray" is the second son, Ezra. The youngest son, "dark and deeply tanned," is Abel. His significant other, Edward, also is at the house. Maud, the only daughter, is Ezra's twin sister. Maud, the family mystery: what happened to her? No information is forthcoming on that front.

Saving the worst for last, there is Mrs. Warren, companion to the late Mrs. Westaway and housekeeper of Trepassen House. A nasty piece of

work who treats Hal with disdain and gives her the attic bedroom, a cold and clammy place...out of spite? But why? She couldn't know Hal, could she?


The reading of the will is a real barn burner! After some rather small disbursements, the house...well, the house and grounds are left to Hal — even in its present condition, worth several million pounds. Nothing to the three sons. The uproar in the solicitor's office is akin to an umpire's bad decision at home plate. Hal faints.

The story could end right there but there's so much more to discover. Someone is pulling nasty tricks on Hal, tricks that could kill. But who wants to harm her?

Character studies in abundance! I love it! Everyone with a story to tell and a secret to keep. The dark, dreary English winter provides the perfect backdrop for a family mystery that everyone would like to forget. Hal's appearance, however, makes that impossible, and must make at least one person terrified she will find out the truth.

This is one tricky mystery that you may think you have figured out halfway through, but I warn you — Ware has given us a secret that you won't see coming. Her best book so far — and that's saying a lot!


