# Rustic Character

If there's one constant to Michiana Shores' 75-year history, it's the trees.

Ask any resident — from a newcomer to the town council president who's been part of Michiana Shores for 60 years — and they point to the towering trees that form a verdant summertime canopy over the community of log cabins, cottages and contemporary homes.

It's the mix of oak, maple, pine and other species that draws residents and visitors to the rolling, wooded dunescape on the southern edge of Lake Michigan. Trees are hardly unique to the lakeside communities stretching from the Indiana Dunes northeast to Michigan's Warren Dunes. But trees are the hallmark of Michiana Shores' unique ge-

ography and rustic character where 70 percent of the land is wooded, according to the town's 2016 comprehensive plan.

"All the greenery is wonderful," says Daina Dumbrys, presiof Michiana dent Shores' five-member town council. "You feel like you're really in nature, and that's the thing that people who choose to live here truly appreciate. You are in nature, but you're not so deep in the woods that you can't access conveniences like shopping and transportation."

Dumbrys, a retired high school math and science teacher for Chicago Public Schools, says her parents bought a cottage in 1961 on Brookside Drive when she was in grade school. Her family spent the entire summer there before returning to their home on Chicago's Southwest Side.

"As kids, we could hop on our bikes and ramble through the hills and trees with no fear of going anywhere," she says. "There was the beach, the beach grasses and all the wildlife. You could hear the birds."

A far cry from the urban landscape of her Chicago neighborhood.

She and her husband, Ray, bought a cottage in Michiana Shores in the early 2000s and have lived there full time since 2011.

One of the newest residents, Michael Martinez never takes it for granted that he can look out his windows and see nothing but forest. It's a vastly different view than the one he had in the bustling, congested Chicago neighborhood of Wrigleyville.

The backyard of the newly built home he shares with his wife, Holly Applegate-Martinez, abuts the wooded acreage of Dunes Summer Theatre. From their backyard patio, he's heard the mating call of a fox and has gazed awestruck as an eagle soared gracefully above the trees.

"We love Michiana Shores. It's everything we expected it to be," says Martinez, an entrepreneur who co-owns three area Biggby Coffee franchises and is preparing to open a fourth.

"I love the solitude. I don't hear trains and trucks, and I can see the stars at night and sunsets from the beach in the evening," he says.

Raised in Chesterton, Martinez jumped feet first into his new community. He's vice president of the town council and a member of advisory plan commission.

"Town council meets once a month. What we do is very impactful because what we decide will affect everyone in the community," he says.

Holly was raised in Long Beach, but says she feels a world away in their new Michiana Shores home.

"I grew up on the 13th hole of the Long Beach Country Club Golf Course and didn't get to live in the woods," she says with a laugh. The Knapp Elementary School principal then adds, "This is very different from Long Beach."

Practically neighbors in Wrigleyville, they didn't meet until they connected on Match.com. They mar-

ried in 2016 and moved to Michiana Shores two years later.

"We love walking to the beach, which is less than a mile away," she says. "This such a comfortable, quiet community."

Isaac Zeckel is another of Michiana Shores' newest residents. Zeckel, a dentist, and his wife, Katie, a clinical psychologist, bought a home there in late 2019. They lived in Long Beach the previous five years.

"We're only a mile and a half from our old home, but I'm struck by how close it is, yet how different it is at the same time," says Zeckel, who grew up in suburban Indianapolis. Katie was raised in Michigan City.

"Long Beach is more established, whereas in Michiana Shores you have many more opportunities to help the community," he says.

"I've only been here a couple of years, and I was asked to be a member of the advisory plan commission and to serve as a firefighter for the Michiana Shores Volunteer Fire Department. We're both very interested in improving the communities in which we live."

Zeckel accepted a position on the plan advisory commission, where he's vice president. But he won't be racing to any house fires as a volunteer firefighter, figuring he's reached the limits of his commitments to his new community.

The Zeckels are busy these days. They moved to a larger home that requires some work to accommodate their growing family. Daughter Riva is 2 and son Paul is 3 months.

"You are likely to find us at the beach, the White Ditch Greenway Trail, the woods, the park or the (Red Arrow) stables to watch the horses," he says. "It's like living in the woods where you can walk around, feel safe and let our daughter Riva go a bit. And there's the deer and the wild turkeys."

Lynette Emmons and her wife, Laura Forecki, bought what she described as a "tiny shack" in Michiana Shores in 2000. Over the years, the Chicago couple converted their ramshackle 800-square-foot property into a 2,800-square-foot haven in the woods replete with an art studio. They did much of the work themselves, installing cabinetry, laying floors and roughing out the electric.

"We started out as weekenders. But the two-day weekends turned into three-day weekends that turned into four-day weekends," Emmons, a retired college professor, says. The couple now divides their time between homes in Michiana Shores and Long Boat Key, Fla.

An avid runner, Emmons treasures the majestic trees that cast a cooling shade along her routes in Michiana Shores.

"It's wonderful to run where there is shade everywhere," she says. "I run on the White Ditch Greenway and through the shady hills. I love the natural aspect."

The nearly mile-long walking and running path

traces the gently flowing White Ditch that roughly bisects Michiana Shores from west to east, and has become one of the community's top natural amenities.

And, of course, there's the beach, which is actually on the Michigan side of the state line at Stop 37. But an order by the Berrien County (Mich.) Circuit Court about the time of the town's incorporation in 1947 granted joint beach rights at that stop to Michiana Shores residents. It may be the only town in America with its only municipal beach in another state. It's just another unique element to the community.

"Other areas pretty much look the same," Emmons says. "Michiana Shores is different because of its natural setting — the log cabins, the woods and the beach. As soon as you're on El Portal Drive (the town's gateway avenue), you can feel the change in atmosphere."

In recent years, Emmons has noticed an influx of younger residents, a refreshing trend that injects fresh blood into the community. She's also noticed some of the once-vacant wooded lots sprouting new homes, which concerns her.

It's also a concern of Daina Dumbrys and the town council. To help maintain the community's pastoral nature, the council requires that new homes be built on land with a minimum of 10,000-square feet. For new homes in the White Ditch Greenway floodplain, the required minimum is 15,000-square-feet.

"If people own land, we can't stop them from building if they have the adequate amount of land and meet all the other requirements," Dumbrys explains. "And we do have an ordinance that says you may not cut down any trees on an undeveloped lot," she added. "You can cut down trees on the lot of your home or any lots you own adjacent to your home. But we do encourage people not to cut trees."

Dumbrys believes some residents' concerns that the community is at risk of suburbanization is overstated. A handful of new homes have been built on wooded lots in recent years.

"We really have not had a lot of new construction in our town, certainly not when you compare it to some of our neighboring communities," Dumbrys says.

The South Shore Line's Double Track project, designed to reduce the rail trip time to a little over an hour between Michigan City and Chicago by 2024, has prompted some to fear an influx of new construction.

"I think the plan is wonderful because we take the train to Chicago all the time," Dumbrys says. "But some people are worried that Michiana Shores will become the playground of the super-rich and that people won't be able to afford a home here."

Dumbrys is confident Michiana Shores will find the right path ahead for its next 75 years.

"If we conserve what we have, we keep our trees and keep the traffic down and maintain the ordinances that prevent over-development, then the Michiana Shores of today can last for a long time," she says.

"We are trying to find the right balance that will be good for everybody while maintaining the character of this 75-year-old community with beautiful green space to walk or ride a bike."

### **A Brief History**

Before there was Michiana Shores, there was Corymbo.

And like the current residents of Michiana Shores, the people of Corymbo were attracted by

the trees. Except they were loggers who toppled the trees for lumber.

According to a Michiana Shores history that Clerk-Treasurer Joan Lewis shared with *The Beacher*, the area on which the current towns stands was

a dense forest in the early 19th century.

When the Michigan Central Railroad was laid in the 1850s, a small logging town called Corymbo arose not far from the tracks. Today, Amtrak runs trains on the tracks.

Corymbo, whose population was a mix of railroad workers and loggers, even had its own post office by 1861. It also boasted 12 log cabins, a sawmill and a train depot. But when the trees were all harvested, the hamlet began to disappear. The post office shut down in 1874, and the sawmill sliced its last log in 1876.

By the 1920s, a new generation of trees sprung from the sandy soil. Real estate developers eyed the area for its potential to become a woodsy summer resort.

Michiana Shores in the 1930s became part of a 600-acre development on both sides of the Indiana-Michigan state line. Cabins, many occupied by Chicago school teachers on summer break, began to reappear.

The village of Michiana, Mich., was incorporated in 1946. The town of Michiana Shores, Ind., was incorporated the following year. The two communities are separated by a road appropriately called Michiana Drive that serves as the state line.

The sawmill, post office, train depot and 12 original cabins and wood frame homes are - like Corymbo — lost to the mists of time.

### If You Go

Michiana Shores is throwing a birthday party, and everyone's invited.

To celebrate the community's 75th anniversary, Michiana Shores will host a dinner dance from 5-10 p.m. CDT Saturday, Aug. 27, at the firehouse, 601 El Portal Drive. Dinner will be catered by Scartozi's Trattoria, with gluten-free and vegetarian options. Members of the Michiana Shores Volunteer Fire Department will serve wine, beer and soft drinks.

Jeanne Paxton of the 75th Anniversary Steering Committee says live music will be provided by the Chicago classic rock band St. Jams featuring Michiana Shores resident Mario Jobbe. Other highlights include a birthday cake-baking contest judged by current and former town council members. Once judged, all entries will be served as dessert.

A Michiana Shores pop-up museum will highlight historic photos, artifacts and posters loaned by residents for the anniversary bash. Attendees will depart with a special Michiana Shores memory book commemorating the diamond anniversary.

Through September, The Legacy Center Art Wall at Queen of All Saints Catholic Church is featuring work provided the League.



- 1. Don't prune ANY oaks from April 15th to September 30th. Oak wilt spreads readily during this time. Oak wilt will immediately kill any infected trees and will spread to your trees via root grafts if your neighbor prunes their oaks and they get infected. There is no treatment or cure for infected trees. Prevention is your Only choice.
- 2. Don't "spike" your trees. Spiking causes wounds that lead to infection and tree decline. Anyone who spikes trees is causing long-term damage to the trees.
- 3. Avoid damage to the roots. Large trucks cause soil compaction and digging up roots cause frayed wounds that can't heal and create access points for pathogens (fungi) that start root rot and weaken the trees structural stability. Lawn mowers can also cause damage to the root flares.
- 4. Keep a good amount of natural leaf litter and organic matter covering the roots under the canopy. Blowing leaves away from your trees can kill the fibrous roots by drying the exposed soil.
- 5. Consult an ISA Certified Arborist before doing anything to your tree.

### "Thirteen Lives" Reveals Ron Howard Back in Top Form

I thought "The Rescue," last year's exhaustive documentary about the 2018 Tham Luang cave rescue, was a remarkable achievement. True, Netflix beat it to the punch, securing the rights to the soccer team's stories so no one else could, but the way the film recounted the united front to save these kids and their coach paid off. We understood every minute detail so when the miracle of the rescue operation arrived — all 12 children and their coach relatively unscathed — you wept.

Imagine my surprise that I liked "Thirteen Lives" better.

When it was announced Ron Howard intended to direct a film adaptation, I winced. Once Hollywood's golden boy ("Cocoon," "Parenthood," "The Paper"), with an Oscar win for "A Beautiful Mind" (2001), he slipped into a creative rut. With the Thailand cave rescue, a story from our recent past where we all know the outcome, my fear was that Howard would wring every drop of schmaltz out of the material.

Turns out, this is Howard's best film in two decades. It doesn't feel like a Hollywood production. "Thirteen Lives" is respectful of the rescue and the people who pulled it off, without trying to juice it up. A story this extraordinary doesn't need cheap theatrics.

Working from the precise script by William Nicholson ("Shadowlands," "Gladiator," the underrated "Everest"), this Amazon Prime release has the same dilemma as "The Rescue" in that it cannot tell the

story from the team's perspective (dagnabbit, Netf-lix). However, it presents a general framework for their plight. I recall, at the time of the rescue, fringe groups online posting of how the rescue operation was a waste of time, money and resources, that the soccer team got what they deserved for heading into a cave during monsoon season. Howard's film, however, opens depicting the team concluding practice as if it's any other day, opting to squeeze in a trip to the cave before a team member's evening birthday party. As the rain arrives and the cave floods, the team is trapped deep inside.

Viggo Mortensen, Colin Farrell and Joel Edgerton are the only recognizable faces here, playing divers Richard Stanton, John Volanthen and Richard Harris, respectively. By keeping the star power to a minimum, Howard steers clear of constant reminders that we're watching a Hollywood recreation. All three actors, Mortensen in particular, don't play these guys as saints, simply as divers who realize their services can be of help. Mortensen (the "Lord of the Rings" trilogy), in fact, plays Stanton with a British sense of detachment: always the pessimist.

The film's \$55 million budget puts every penny to good use, from recreating the cave and its precarious passages, to the sea of tents with rescue workers and volunteers outside. And especially the underwater scenes, where Howard, like he did with "Apollo 13," maintains an air of tension, even though we know the outcome.

Howard's camera often functions like the silent observer. I worried that, when the scene arrived with Stanton and Volanthe finally reaching the soccer team, Howard would milk it for cheap emotion. Linger on the faces. Amp up Benjamin

Wallfisch's score. Nope. The scene is presented so matter of factly, it is like we are there with these people.

Howard and Nicholson also find quietly affecting ways to move us. The soccer coach, fearing inevitable blame by the parents, astounded by letters of support from the parents, brought to them by divers. The parents, erupting into cheers after the team is discovered alive. Those same parents, after every child is rescued, hugging the divers. Diver Chris Jewell (Tom Bateman), consumed with emotion once everything is said and done.

Whatever setbacks have plagued Howard's career over the past 20 years, they are noticeably absent here. The intelligence, the detail, the scope of

"Thirteen Lives" reveals him working at the top of his game. His film is quite the achievement.

Amber Midthunder redefines the action-movie hero in "Prey," a prequel to the 1987 hit "Predator."

The "Predator" franchise has spent decades trying to capture lightning in a bottle, and it's failed... until now.

The 1987 original, if you recall, did not exactly reinvent the wheel; more, it cobbled together other hits — the studio even touted it as "Rambo" meets "Aliens" — to achieve B-movie cheese on an A-list budget, with Arnold Schwarzenegger doing what he does best: kick as much ass as is humanly possible against an inhuman enemy.

If you want to get technical, "Prey" is "Predator 5," even though it's set long before the events of the first picture. It follows three fingers-crossed-we-get-it-right sequels, plus two lame crossover entries with the "Alien" franchise. The 2018 reboot, which brought back "Predator" costar-turned-director Shane Black ("Iron Man 3") to write and direct, was so useless, the only thing I can recall is that Sterling K. Brown appeared in it.

The good news is, "Prey," streaming on Hulu, reboots the franchise in all the right ways. Everything about it is on point, both as a series tribute and, more importantly, as a logical look back. Strikingly told, with thrilling action, dynamite characters and an emotional weight lacking in other entries, "Prey" may be the best in the series.

The director, and the one who helped conceive the



story, is Dan Trachtenberg, whose "10 Cloverfield Lane" (2016) is, hands down, the most satisfying of the "Cloverfield" monster movies because the characters make the most sense.


And that is what he brings to "Prey."

In the first film, there was brief dialogue suggesting this was not the first time the chameleon-like alien had arrived on Earth, that these things had been around for centuries.

That's the starting point for Trachtenberg and writer Patrick Aison, who set their tale in 1719 Comanche territory. A landscape not yet tainted by European "progress." Where "the hunt," primarily for food, is so intrinsically woven into the fabric of life, introducing a new shadowy hunter is a brilliant move. And in so doing, the film introduces its most prized creation: magnificent young actress Amber Midthunder as Comanche healer Naru, who yearns to be a fighter, a hunter, like her brother, Taabe (Dakota Beavers). Midthunder has done a fair share of television, shows like "Legion" and "Longmire," but

here, it's like watching a star being born. Extremely likable. Smart. Determined, the character a warrior in progress. You root for Midthunder from her first scene, all the way to the climactic finish.

It is Naru's persistent desire to join her brother and his friends that discover thev something unseen is slaughtering wildlife. They can hear it, in the peripheries, but cannot locate it. Here, Trachtenberg honors franchise trademarks: the alien's heat-seeking vision, that raspy death rattle when close, the trian-



Trachtenberg's camera moves through the action, zeroes in on characters, with boldness. And Jeff Cutter's brooding cinematography paints a world that is beautiful, ominous and desolate, sometimes all at once.

When members of Naru's tribe fall victim to the predator's violence, the impact is felt among the mothers back at camp. And Naru's final scene, set amid her own people, is powerful, not just because

of what preceded it, but because we know what is to come, not by any alien threat, but by the encroachment of foreign settlers.

Two versions of the film are available on Hulu: one with subtitles, the other where Trachtenberg filmed the cast speaking in English to make the story more accessible. I wish I'd known that beforehand, watching the subtitled version instead. The movie does such an expert job honoring Comanche tradition, telling their story through subtitles allows the beauty of the language to earn its rightful place on screen.

Other than that, "Prey" is a triumph for the franchise. I intend on seeing it again.



### Slasher Elements Detract from Otherwise Gutsy "They/Them"

"I keep expecting Jason Voorhees to come out of these woods."

So says a reluctant camper in a scene from "They/Them," the gutsiest movie yet from Blumhouse ("Get Out," "BlackKklansman"). It's "Boy Erased" meets "Friday the 13th." A slasher movie where LGBTQ+teens at a conversion camp discover a masked killer is dispatching the staff one by bloody one.

A bold concept that marks the directorial debut of John Logan, the Oscar-nominated screenwriter behind "Gladiator," "The Aviator," "Hugo" and the best Daniel Craig-James Bond film, "Skyfall." As an LGBTQ+ movie, it puts the earnest, yet earnest failure of "Boy Erased" to shame. Logan's story has more to say about alienation within the LGBTQ+ community than any other film.

Problem is, the movie, streaming on Peacock, stalls every time it dips into "Friday the 13th" mode, resulting in a clumsy hybrid.

The setting is rustic Camp Whistler, which is designed to strip teens of their LGBTQ+ identities, making them "straight." Abus with newbies pulls up to find the staff patiently waiting. Directly addressing them is the camp owner, Owen (Kevin Bacon who, if you recall, appeared in the original "Friday the 13th"), who disarms them with no religious talk nor condemnation. In fact, he seems pretty recep-

tive, asking only that everyone respect each other.

If 2018's "Boy Erased" treated its conversioncamp teens as empty husks, Logan's screenplay is the bold opposite. It's unusually sensitive, affording its characters distinct voices. The young actors, who have an unstudied quality, feel real. Free to voice their insecurities, fears, their longing for acceptance.

And as the campers realize their hosts employ unorthodox techniques to "cure" them, "They/Them" appears headed in the same direction as Jordan Peele's Oscar-winning "Get Out" (2017), which had more to say about race relations than any pious Oscar bait. Is "They/Them" using horror as a metaphor to convey what mainstream America thinks about the LGBTQ+ community?

It is...but the slasher elements dilute the potency of the message. Rather than have the campers square off against the hosts, Logan infuses shock value for shock value's sake. Graphic sex and a gory body count. Worse, as a slasher movie, "They/Them"

isn't scary. You don't have to be Sherlock Holmes to guess the killer's identity. It's obvious from the start. For a movie that has worked this hard to be unpredictable, it descends into the same predictable trap as most slasher flicks.

What saves it, once we know the killer, is one teen's reaction. Ultimately, "They/Them" is a cry against violence, that it only begets more violence. Only through peace and understanding, the movie says, can we become a better, more tolerant society.

I suspect Blumhouse embraced "They/Them" not just because of the controversial subject matter, but because the horror elements are part of the studio's DNA. Someone, however, should have tipped off Logan that one more rewrite would do his story good. Take a cue from "Get Out." Stick to the horror within the setting.

In other words, send Jason Voorhees packing.


And nothing wrong with writing a paragraph or two on the Remington, then keystroking it into the computer.

Our Irish landlady in Chicago complained bitterly when I began writing a novel, before work, on a manual typewriter. She had every reason to complain — no one wants to listen to typing in the wee hours.

So I followed Natalie's lead and learned to compose on a computer. Who knew I could be so teachable at an advanced age?

And now that my age is advancing into the heart of 70-something territory, I am enjoying the best of both worlds with my iMac desktop and Remington Quiet-Riter.


LaPorte County Public Library has updated its curbside pickup service using meeScan.







That, in itself, is interesting enough, but for the fiction part, McCulloch has added a murder mystery to the mix. Murder at



26,000+ feet? Gives new meaning to "cold-blooded murder"...

First, meet Cecily Wong, a British journalist with *Wild Outdoors* magazine. She receives the chance of a lifetime to make a name for herself in the world of outdoor adventure writing. Her soon-to-be-gone boyfriend, James, also is an outdoor adventure writer and can't believe she got the assignment instead of him. Oh, well...

Cecily's assignment is an interview with Charles McVeigh, the world's greatest mountain climber. His current mission is to climb the 14 mountains higher than 8,000 meters, but without use of ropes and oxygen — and all within one year.

He agrees to the interview, but only if Cecily goes with him on his latest climb up Manaslu and actually reaches the summit with him. Good thing Cecily is in great physical shape and has climbed many mountains herself, although none as high as Manaslu. She considers the offer an exciting challenge to her own talents, as well as a big advancement to her writing career.

However, Cecily has another reason for wanting this opportunity. "...her deep and abiding sense of failure — that she'd failed to summit Kilimanjaro, failed to complete the three peaks Challenge, failed to save a woman's life."

The last failure was a terrible accident, but in her mind, she was at fault.

And who wouldn't want a chance to spend time

with mountain climbing's golden boy? He's tall, blond, handsome, muscular, a great speaker and also known for a daring rescue during one of his 14 summits. Two Italian brothers were stranded, and Charles fought dropping temperatures and thin air to bring them down to the next camp to be airlifted out. Even though one of them died, Charles was hailed as a hero for his superhuman effort. And that was only the beginning of other rescues that cemented him as a media darling.

Cecily eagerly makes a list, spends all her savings on the best alpine climbing equipment and leaves England, and James, behind to face the greatest adventure of her young life. From this point on, things happen that are out of her hands...

Cecily's adventure begins in Kathmandu, Nepal, where she meets up with her expedition buddies, led by Doug Manners and head guide Mingma Lakpa Sherpa. Doug also is a media legend: five Everest climbs, plus numerous others on mountains around the world. Zak is CEO of TalkForward, financing the trip for Charles and wanting to try out new mountaineering equipment his company is producing. Then, there is Elise Gauthier, a French-Canadian "influencer and mountaineer" popular on social media. Alain is climbing to honor his friend, Pierre, who died on the mountain recently, while Grant, another Brit, is there to film and photograph every step along the way.

Time is spent acclimatizing at a low camp before attempting to reach the top of Manaslu. If you're interested in mountaineering, there's a lot of information about getting ready for the assent. Things start to happen almost immediately, as Alain is found dead in a nearby lake. It's ruled an accident, and the climb progresses. There will be more "accidents" — two to be exact...or is it three? Is this climb cursed? Cecily is sure someone is stalking her, but everyone thinks she is suffering from the thin air. Suspense mounts as the temperature plummets and the question now becomes a matter of survival — from both man and mountain.

McCulloch actually started her mountain climbing in 2018 on Mount Toubkal in Morocco, and subsequent climbs gave her the impetus to climb Manaslu, giving her the unique perspective of experiencing the uneven terrain, the crevasses, extreme cold and lack of oxygen at those high altitudes. The unforgiving mountain gave her a perfect place for a murder mystery incorporating all she experienced.

The final word: adventure aplenty, obscenities not so much.
