When *The New York Times* wrote its obituary on the Top 40 disc jockey considered by some the greatest of all time, it turned to Pamela Enzweiler-Pulice to offer a few final words.


"Nobody came close to his personality," the former LaPorte resident was quoted in the July 20 article on Dick Biondi. "He was wild, outrageous, goofy and uplifting. He was like a big kid — he was one of us. He spoke our language."

It's hardly surprising that Enzweiler-Pulice factored so prominently into the story on Biondi, who in 1961 was named the nation's best top-40 DJ while serving up hits for Chicago's WLS radio. He's also credited with introduc-

ing The Beatles to American radio audiences in February 1963 when he spun "Please Please Me."

Enzweiler-Pulice is the director of the forthcoming documentary, "The Voice That Rocked America: The Dick Biondi Story." She hosted a well-attended sneak preview last month at The Acorn in Three Oaks, Mich. Planned well in advance, the screening was held only days after Biondi's death in Chicago at age 90. It was an emotional day for Enzweiler-Pulice, who first met the wildly popular member of the Radio Hall of Fame 62 years earlier. His death was tantamount to the loss of a beloved family member, says Enzweiler-Pulice, who lived on Pine Lake from 2009-2017.

In 1961, at age 13, she met Biondi when he arrived by helicopter for an appearance at a shopping

mall near her home in west suburban Chicago.

"I was listening to WLS one Saturday afternoon and heard that he was going to appear at the Hillside Shopping Center," Enzweiler-Pulice said in a phone interview from a coffee shop near her home in Villa Park, a Chicago suburb.

"I told my dad, 'We gotta' go! We gotta' go!" Her father gave in to the urgent request and ferried her, her sister and a friend to the mall.

"I was so excited. I thought I was going to jump out of my skin," she says. "Dick was so kind. He took time to talk to us and look us in the eye. He really listened and asked questions about us and made us feel really special."

A rock star in his own right, Biondi even had a Continued on Page 2

hit in 1961: a novelty song titled "On Top of a Pizza," a parody of the folk favorite "On Top of Old Smoky."

After meeting the radio dynamo, Enzweiler-Pulice launched a Dick Biondi fan club.

"It was just a little grassroots fan club in the western suburbs," she said. "I created membership cards for the kids in

school, and then I started writing a newsletter." As editor of the newsletter, she was invited to vis-

it Biondi at the WLS studios in downtown Chicago. "I tried to get to as many of his sock hops as I

could, and he would sometimes bring me backstage to meet the bands," the onetime fangirl says.

Enzweiler-Pulice stayed in touch with Biondi over the course of his storied career, which wasn't easy because he worked in so many radio markets. He left WLS in 1963 after getting fired for complaining on the air that the sales department was cluttering his show with too many commercials.

It was just one of what he said was more than 20 firings from radio stations - usually for doing something outrageous. He landed in Los Angeles in 1963 where he spun records for KRLA. Next, he hosted a nationally syndicated program on the Mutual Radio Network.

He returned to Chicago in 1967 to host a Top-40 show on WLS archrival WCFL. The two AM stations staged a battle royale for teen and young-adult audiences in the heart of the Midwest and beyond. WLS could be heard in 38 states and Canada.

Biondi left Chicago again in 1972 for radio gigs in Cincinnati, Boston and Myrtle Beach, S.C., before returning to Chicago radio for good in 1983. He hosted an oldies show on WJMK-FM for 21 years. He took the mic at WLS-FM from 2006 until he left

the air in 2018 at age 85.

In 2014, Enzweiler-Pulice, who had retired from running her own video-production company, worked up the nerve to call her old friend at WLS-FM and pitch the idea of doing a documentary about his colorful, controversial career.

Enzweiler-Pulice wasn't the first to suggest Biondi's life and career be the focus of some literary or cinematic treatment. Popular Chicago radio personalities John Records Landecker and Bob Sirott formerly of WLS, now both with WGN - planted the notion with Biondi, according to Enzweiler-Pulice.

"They had been encouraging Dick for years to tell his story - a book, a movie, whatever," she said. "But Dick would only tell them, 'Nobody wants to hear about me and Elvis."

(Actually, everyone *would* want to hear about the time he was backstage with Elvis. The King signed Biondi's shirt, which women at the show that night tore off Biondi's back when he waded into the audience.)

"I explained to Dick that I wanted to do a documentary about him from the fans' perspective," she said.

To her surprise and delight, Biondi, with his trademark exuberance, exclaimed, "Yeah, let's do it!"

She understands why he agreed to the documentary.

"Dick would do anything for a fan," she said. "Then, I was thrilled and scared and asked myself, 'Could I do him justice?"

A week later, on March 14, 2014, she conducted her first interview with Biondi at a sock hop at a Knights of Columbus hall in Whiting, Ind.

Ever since, she and her small production team have been developing the independent documentary.

"I have been working on this for nine years, and I finally have a movie that I am proud of. I feel that it represents Dick in the way he should be represented," she says. "Dick was a pioneer. He was doing 'race music' in the Jim Crow South right out of high school in Endicott, N.Y. He did things that were fresh and new, and he was unlike any other DJ you have ever heard. Dick Biondi's voice was so unique."

The documentary includes interviews with members of chart-topping Chicago garage bands of the late 1960s, including The Buckinghams, The Cryan' Shames, The New Colony Six and the band Chicago.

"They are all in my movie," she said, "and they all

talk about how Dick Biondi influenced their careers."

Others interviewed whose careers Biondi advanced include Frankie Valli, former frontman for the Four Seasons and popular solo artist, and two of the original Beach Boys — Al Jardine and music legend Brian Wilson.

Jardine now plays with Wilson's band, which rocked a sell-out show on Nov. 13, 2015, in the Silver Creek Event Center at Four Winds Casino New Buffalo. Enzweiler-Pulice

made arrangements with Jardine for a backstage interview to talk about Biondi's influence on the Beach Boys in the 1960s.

Wilson, notoriously aloof with the media, did not respond to a separate interview request.

"In 1963, Dick Biondi was at KRLA in Los Angeles when the Beach Boys recorded their first ballad, 'Surfer Girl," Enzweiler-Pulice says. "Band member Mike Love said, 'Why don't we bring it over to Dick Biondi to see if he'll play it?' So they did. Dick played the record, and people started calling the station saying, 'We love that record!"

While interviewing Jardine about how Biondi provided the flight fuel for the spectacular launch of "Surfer Girl," Jardine said Brian Wilson knew much more about it because Jardine briefly left the band at that point.

He told Enzweiler-Pulice, "I wasn't there that night, but Brian was, and he is in the next room. I'll go ask him."

"When Al left the room, my associate (and documentary film director) Pat Wisniewski and I looked at each other thinking, 'Will he actually talk to us?'

"A moment later, in walks Brian Wilson, who sits in the chair," Enzweiler-Pulice recalls. "I put a lapel mic on him, and he proceeds to tell the story of how Dick Biondi broke 'Surfer Girl'. Then off he went. What a thrill it was to interview him."

Other celebrities who provide cameo interviews include comedian Tom Dreesen, former Los Angeles DJ and TV game show host Bob Eubanks, band leader Paul Shaffer and singer Tony Orlando. Veteran Chicago radio personalities Landecker and

Sirott also appear.

Enzweiler-Pulice admits to a sense of imposter's syndrome from having interview access to so many bold-faced names.

"I didn't even feel like I belonged in the same documentary with all these famous people," she says. "I had to grow into the role as I was telling the story and writing the script."

She regrets her inability to include some recognition by The Beatles of Biondi's important contributions to their careers. She's tried unsuccessfully for years to contact the Beatles' organization, Apple Core Ltd., as well as the band's two surviving members, Paul McCartney and Ringo Starr.

Enzweiler-Pulice says she'll attempt to reach a representative of Starr's when Ringo Starr and His All-Starr Band performs at Four Winds on Oct. 6.

"If only Ringo could just mention the documentary," she says with an air of hope.

Although she had been producing videos for 10 years, the Dick Biondi story is her first documentary.

"I knew how to edit. I knew how to operate a camera, but video and documentary are not the same animals," she says. "The big difference is all the legalities you have to go through to have something made on a broadcast level."


Another big difference is the size of a documentary's budget. Enzweiler-Pulice figured she needed about \$200,000 to produce and license it.

"It was a struggle," she said. "The biggest challenge was trying to raise money, especially through COVID."

(Documentaries go through the licensing process to avoid infringing on copyrighted material, such as photographs, recordings or TV clips.)

Thanks to donations, crowdfunding and sponsorships, the documentary's fundraising goal is more than three-quarters met. She hopes to hit the \$200,000 mark by Sept. 13, which would have been Biondi's 91st birthday.



The Public Broadcasting System is considering airing the documentary, according to Enzweiler-Pulice.

"All I know is that PBS wants it," she said, "and I am ready to give it to them."

The documentary also is expected to air on streaming platforms and screen

at film festivals.

At the documentary's sneak preview at The Acorn, WGN Radio's John Records Landecker, a Michigan City resident and longtime friend and colleague of Biondi, spoke to Enzweiler-Pulice afterward.

She says he applauded the documentary before asking, "How did you get Dick to agree to the documentary?"

As she's told others, "He would do anything for a fan."



Lilly Scholarship Application


The Lilly Endowment Community Scholarship application is available on the Unity Foundation website through Sept. 8.

The program, administered by Independent Colleges of Indiana and locally by Unity Foundation of LaPorte County, will provide two area students with four-year, full-tuition scholarships to an accredited Indiana college or university of their choice, and an annual stipend for required books and equipment.

Applicants must: be a LaPorte County resident; graduate by June 30, 2024, from an accredited high school that serves LaPorte County; intend to pursue a full-time baccalaureate course of study at an eligible college or university in Indiana; have a grade-point average (unweighted) of at least 3.75 as of the beginning of senior year; and submit a complete application at www.uflc.net/scholarships/lilly by the deadline.

Applications are evaluated based on academic achievement, demonstrated service to others, leadership ability, commitment and motivation to succeed, and, to a lesser extent, financial need. A committee will interview finalists before recommending two students to the Independent Colleges of Indiana, which makes the final selection.

Over the past 25 years, 72 LaPorte County students and their families have benefitted from the program, totaling more than \$4.8 million.



Friday is Groundbreaking for \$3.1M Long Beach Public Safety Building

Long Beach breaks ground at 10 a.m. Friday, Aug. 25, for its \$3.1 million Public Safety Building that will house the fire department and provide space for police department vehicles and equipment.

The community is invited to the event at Long Beach Town Hall, 2400 Oriole Trail. Parking will be available at the nearby tennis courts and Long Beach Community Center. Al's Supermarket on Karwick Road is donating refreshments.

The 10,000-square-foot multiuse structure will replace the outdated fire station and adjacent police garage, both built in the early 1970s. The buildings will be demolished to provide parking for the new building, which will be built on the old parking lot behind the town hall and fire station.

Projected completion date is Dec. 31, according to Council Member John Wall, who also is one of the community's 27 volunteer firefighters. He joined the department in 1979. The completion date sounds ambitious, but the contractor, Holladay Construction Group, is a design-build firm that designs and constructs the structure, which will expedite the project, Wall says.

In fact, ground already has been broken. Holladay Construction has excavated the old parking lot and laid concrete footings for the new building. Stacks of steel beams that will serve as the building's skeleton are at the ready on the site.

"Ten to 15 years ago, we realized we needed to upgrade facilities," Wall explains. "About a year and a half ago, we got authorization from the town council to begin the process of a design/build concept, which the state of the Indiana allows."

The nature of firefighting has changed dramatically in the half century since Long Beach built the current fire station, says Wall, a construction executive who previously served as fire chief.

"Some of the change is because of the increased complexity of the gear, as well as the technology improvements," he says. Fire science has learned much more about the cancer-causing elements firefighters encounter in a burning structure, he notes.

"We used to keep our gear in our cars or houses," he says. "But the gear is stored at the station now.

As a consequence, we need more storage for the personal protection gear. And the technology on the trucks is dramatically increased, so we're hauling a lot more gear than we ever have before."

The new single-story building with a mezzanine will feature four bays: three for the two fire trucks and the rescue vehicle. The fourth bay will belong to the police department for its squad cars, ATVs and boat, according to Mark Swistek, chief marshal and town administrator.

"Inside, there will be a small fitness room for both police and fire, office space for the fire administration and a large training/meeting room with audio-visual equipment," Swistek says.

In addition, there will be John Wall, also a volunteer firefighter, looks forward to moving into more modern quarters at the end of the ADA-accessible restrooms for public-safety officers and the

community. The meeting room will be available for use by community groups when it's not being used for fire department training or meetings.

Swistek's office will remain in town hall. His force consists of five full-time officers, eight part-time officers and five reserve/volunteer officers. While he was Michigan City police chief from 2010-2019, he helped oversee development of the city's new stateof-the-art, 42,000 square-foot police station at 1201 E. Michigan Blvd. that opened Aug. 1, 2016.

He's had a hand in the design of Long Beach's new facility, which enjoyed strong support from the town council.

"On Dec. 27, 2022, the council unanimously voted in favor of moving the project forward," Swistek says. "In July, the council approved the contract at \$3.1 million, with all five members voting in favor."

The fire department volunteers, as well as the police volunteers and salaried officers, are excited about the new building.

"The town of Long Beach is very blessed to have the volunteers in the fire department," Swistek says. "The enthusiasm of the volunteers and their response times they provide the residents is incredible."




Michigan City Public Library







Gadot Makes the Derivative "Heart of Stone" Watchable

Gal Gadot stars as a shadow agency spy trying to stop bad AI (artificial intelligence) in "Heart of Stone."

"Heart of Stone" wastes no time poaching James Bond. In the 20-minute prologue, we get the Italian Alps, undercover agents and a logic-be-damned chase involving parachutes, snowmobiles and a fist fight in a ski-lift tram.

All the 007 essentials...with one difference.

The individual creating headaches for the bad guys is Wonder Woman herself, Gal Gadot. Now, I must confess to having a bit of a crush on her. She is a movie star in every sense of the term. Striking in looks, charismatic in persona. Even in the silly "Fast and Furious" movies, you get the feeling even she knows the movies are dumb, that she's just tagging along for the ride.

With "Heart of Stone," she proves yet again she is an action star, which is why I'm willing to cut her derivative new Netflix movie some slack.

Talk about bad timing, though. The movie, directed by Tom Harper (the supremely underrated "The Aeronauts" from 2019), has the misfortune of charting a power grab for dangerous AI (artificial intelligence) right after "Mission: Impossible Dead Reckoning Part One" used the exact same plot. The AI, referred to as "Heart," can control everything, everywhere, all at once, to crib from last year's Oscar winner.

Gadot's Rachel, who works for a shadow agency

called Charter, has infiltrated MI6 to help it unravel the AI mystery. The crew she joins is the movie's niftiest invention. Yes, it includes "Fifty Shades of Grey" stud Jamie Dornan as Parker, but also two scruffy types: first Bailey (Paul Ready) behind the wheel, then Yang (Jing Lusi), an action dynamo who's like the second coming of Michelle Yeoh. These four, Gadot's Rachel included, approach their work seriously, but off-duty with a welcome sense of humor. And the bonus touch: eccentric "Army of the Dead"/"Army of Thieves" star Matthias Schweighöfer as the guiding Charter voice in Rachel's earpiece.

When Rachel, shedding her naive newcomer image, springs into action during a spectacular car chase, the group's stunned reaction is a perfect bit of comedy. Then, the script by Greg Rucka (2020's "The Old Guard") and "Hidden Figures" Oscar-nominee Allison Schroeder introduces one whopper of a twist, one that completely shifts the course of the film. Right when things are heating up, though, the buoyancy of "Heart of Stone" takes a hit. We have one doozy of an action set piece that fuses elements of Disney's "The Rocketeer" with the climax of Marvel's "Black Widow." But for the most part, the middle act ebbs and flows. This is where an editor might have helped, specifically to tighten up Rachel's interaction with the villain's accomplice (Alia Bhatt), and all the mechanics of the script that lead to the foregone conclusion. There's also a surprise cameo by an eight-time Oscar nominee with the worst haircut in history.

Again, though, action saves the day, with Harper staging the best building explosion I've seen in years. And through it all, Gadot, never backing down from a fight, her character nearly exhausting all of her nine lives, what with the blows to the face, falls from high windows and parachute drops into barren deserts.

Gadot is fun, especially in the final shot. Will I remember "Heart of Stone" a month or two down the road? Probably not. But while the wheels are turning, I was entertained. And for the time being, that was enough.

A Much-Delayed Review of "Asteroid City"...and For Good Reason

In "Asteroid City," Wes Anderson frequently locks his cast in odd poses: one of his trademark visual styles.

There's a series on Apple TV+, now in its second season, called "The Afterparty." Ostensibly, it's a murder-mystery, but the thrust is satire. As each suspect tells his/her story, the flashbacks arrive as parodies of popular genres.

A few weeks back, the series attached its eccentric sister to a spoof of Wes Anderson. The camera panning left and right, characters locked in odd poses, smug voice-over narration. And in just 30 minutes, "The Afterparty" revealed what's gone wrong with this filmmaker.

He's become his own cliché.

When "Asteroid City," his latest, arrived in theaters June 16, I pledged to skip it. His last picture, "The French Dispatch" (2021), was so miserable, I swore off his movies.

Then, "Asteroid City" arrived, and something interesting happened. Over the course of a week, three people contacted me by email, asking if I'd seen it. They refused to say anything else.

The cryptic nature of the emails was akin to a fishing expedition, possibly seeking validation that, yes, it's OK to think a Wes Anderson movie stinks.

"Asteroid City" arrived Aug. 11 on Peacock, free to subscribers, and those three emails re-emerged from memory. Violating my Wes Anderson embargo, I watched it while my wife took an afternoon nap.

And?

All I can say is, congratulations, Wes Anderson.



You've officially made your worst movie.

Early in his career, with "Bottle Rocket," "Rushmore" and "The Royal Tenenbaums," Anderson was the fresh-faced voice of quirky. His films were odd, but oddly endearing. His characters were misfits who marched a step behind everyone else, yet longed for acceptance.

Save for inventive forays into stop-motion animation ("The Fantastic Mr. Fox," "Isle of Dogs"), and a charming movie here and there ("The Grand Budapest Hotel"), Anderson became his own worst enemy, his style boring, predictable and too out there. He no longer cares if *you* care about his characters. And still, he attracts A+ acting talent.

The point of "Asteroid City," which emerges in a scene that's like amateur hour student filmmaking, is that you don't need one. You can say or do whatever you like. His latest weaves together a play, the rehearsal of it and the realization of it as a soundstage movie basically shot in three colors: orange, yellow and blue, like a weathered 1950s postcard.

A bunch of Anderson weirdos gets sidelined in a

nondescript southwestern city where atom bomb testing and alien visits are common. The actors all speak in that clipped Anderson tone, as if heavily medicated, the conversations verbal diarrhea.

Many of Anderson's regulars are present, including Jason Schwartzman, Tilda Swinton, Adrien Brody, Edward Norton, Willem Dafoe, Jeffrey Wright. Sadly, he initiated more of Hollywood's best — Scarlett Johansson, Tom Hanks, Bryan Cranston, Liev Schreiber, Hope Davis, Rupert Friend, Maya Hawke, Steve Carell, Matt Dillon, Hong Chau and Margot Robbie — into his stylized nonsense.

Five times during this relatively brief film — 1 hour, 45 minutes — I hit pause to see how much time remained. The

movie stumbles and rambles. It's almost like Anderson shows contempt for his audience. Like he's punishing us for sitting through his movie.

When my wife awoke from her nap, she asked what I'd watched. My reply: "Wes Anderson's lat-

est." Her genius response: "Ugh. He hasn't made a good movie in years."

Enough said.

Franciscan Health Michigan City Partners with The Milk Bank

Franciscan Health Michigan City is collaborating with The Milk Bank to provide infants in need access to breast milk in and out of the hospital.

Patty DeStefano, Franciscan Health Michigan City Family Birth Center manager, said the hospital began the process with Indianapolis-based The Milk Bank last October. The program launched Aug. 1 at the beginning of World Breastfeeding Month.

Franciscan Health Michigan City now is one of two Milk Bank partnership sites in LaPorte County, said Sharmilee Thot, Franciscan Health Michigan City medical director and OB/GYN.

DeStefano said the hospital wants to increase exclusive breast-feeding rates in women who give birth at the Family Birth Center. It has been successful in meeting that goal, more than tripling rates in 2022. The Milk Bank partnership, she said, will enhance those efforts.

The program provides human milk at the Family Birth Center to infants after birth and up to 40 ounces of milk after discharge. It is available for purchase without a prescription through the Milk Express at the Prenatal Assistance Program at the legacy campus, 301 Homer St.

Lactating mothers wishing to donate breast milk may do so at the Milk Depot at the WIC office next to the Prenatal Assistance Program office. DeSte-

fano said 8 percent of the donations that come into program are from mothers who have lost a baby.

"Many say it helps them through the grief process to know they are helping provide for other babies," DeStefano said in a press release.

Some parents using The Milk Bank programs are those who adopted infants. Others may have medical reasons for not being able to provide breast milk, or may need to be separated from their child, creating a gap in breast milk availability for the infant.

DeStefano said the milk goes through a pasteurization process and is screened for safety.



<u>An Evil Heart</u> by Linda Castillo (hardcover \$28 retail in bookstores and online; also available as an eBook and an audiobook; 306 pages.)

"I'm thinking about...the masks people wear, and how those masks contrast with the personas they present to the rest of the world."

The person speaking here is Kate Burkholder, chief of police in the small town of Painters Mill, Ohio. The town and surrounding farmland are populated by a large Amish community and everyone else they call English.

Kate was born Amish, but left when she turned

18 — and for a very good reason. She went to Columbus, Ohio, and got a job in law enforcement. Since she could speak the old Amish language, she was the perfect choice for police chief of Painters Mill when offered the job. Her parents now gone, her only family is a brother and sister who remained Amish, each with a family of their own. Through these relationships, we learn a lot about the Amish culture and its religion.

Kate runs the police station with a small staff of five deputies and three radio operators. This is a police procedural that is characterdriven, grabbing your attention from the first exciting chapter. This one starts with a murder...don't they all?

Aden Karn, a 21-year-old Amish man, is riding his bicycle one morning down a lonely back road on his

way to work. A short time later, a woman and her child find his lifeless body lying by the side of the road, his bicycle flung a short distance away.

Was this an accident of some kind? Like a hit and run? Or something more insidious?

Arriving at the scene before the coroner, Kate makes a quick examination of the body.

She notices a strange hole in the shirt fabric the coroner later identifies as made by a bolt from a crossbow. To make matters even more gruesome, it is obvious the murderer stood above the victim and shot another bolt straight into Karn's mouth. An obvious way to make sure the job is complete. What Kate sees is a murderer with a personal knowledge of the victim and an extreme hatred for him.

Kate's mantra is "someone always knows something." And so starts the long, arduous journey of questioning people, following leads, looking for clues at the scene of the murder...of course, there are none. The murderer left no clues behind.

Starting her investigation, Kate finds no one has anything bad to say about Aden. He was hard

working, kind, in love with Emily Graber, an Amish girl he was to marry...the list goes on. This guy is way too good to be true. So who knows the real Aden Karn? And, who would want to see him dead? Sounds like it's probably one and the same person.

Who indeed? He was on *rumspringa*, the time Amish youth come of age and have the opportunity to live the English lifestyle, making up their mind

> to either stay with the English or return to the Amish community and get baptized.

> Even the smartest of us can be deceived by someone with the innate skills to be other than they are. Even with Kate's ability to read people, it's just possible that this time, her feelings may be deceived...

> She's barely started her investigation when another body is found near Painters Mill, that of a young woman whom no one seems to know. She has obviously been murdered — head tied with plastic bag, body tossed in creek — and Kate can't help but think there's a connection between her and Aden Karn. Something is missing here: "The discovery of two bodies in such a short period of time in a town the size of Painters Mill is an anomaly. It simply doesn't happen.

I have no idea how this female was killed or who she is...Whatever the case, someone is probably missing her..."

Did I mention Kate is supposed to be planning her wedding? She is engaged to John Tomasetti, an agent with the Ohio Bureau of Criminal Investigation. At this point in the investigation, it's anyone's guess whether there will be a wedding — murder takes precedence over marriage.

This is a story of love and marriage, deceit and jealousy, lies and sex, that is sure to keep you guessing and reading until the explosive climax. It's a whirlwind of a tale!

The final word: If you are interested in the Amish way of life, there is no better author to turn to than Castillo. Her research into the culture and lifestyle is evident and will surely have you seeking out more of her books. And, no offensive language.
