oming from a talented family, it was no surprise Andrew Flasch felt called to music.

It started as a child with guitar. By sixth grade, the piano won his heart. He prac-

ticed hours upon hours, and here's the irony. Formal study was not his thing. For this Valparaiso native, it was more learning by ear. Creating and experimenting. It helped, too, that he had perfect pitch. Eventually, he not only could read music, but also sight-read without prior practice.

Such talent does not go unnoticed. Flasch performed at school and in church. Community theater came calling, from Valparaiso's Chicago Street Theatre and Memorial Opera House to Crown Point Community Theatre.

In 2019, at only 22 years of age, Flasch made his debut with Dunes Summer Theatre, serving as music director for "Working," which is inspired by the 1974 Studs Terkel book Working: People Talk About What They Do All Day and How They Feel About What They Do. During the show's dress rehearsal, the cast arrived on stage to belt out the opening number, "All the Livelong Day"...and you could feel a distinct shift in the audience. People sitting a bit straighter in their seats. Those vocal harmonies. Those incredible harmonies. And the pit, with Flasch at the piano? It was the start of a beautiful friendship between Flasch and the Michiana Shores theater.

Now 26 and a veteran of several Dunes productions, Flasch is the music director of the Jonathan Larson ("Rent") musical "tick, tick...BOOM!," which

runs June 29-July 16. What he savors about the Dunes is the creative freedom.

"They trust me to see my artistic vision through from the beginning to the end," he said. "Whether it's from the first vocal rehearsal to the show itself, I have a certain skill set. The director will bring his or her skill set, and the beauty is, we have our strengths, and we come together to create a beautiful show."

Looking back on his youth, Flasch credits his family as his greatest influence. His mother, Dawn, was a music teacher. Her three children sang and played musical instruments. Andrew sang in the church choir, directed by his mother, with both siblings.

"Both my parents were 100 percent supportive in my music career and have never missed a show," he said.

His older sister played piano, which piqued his interest. There were other reasons as well.

"I am drawn to harmony first," Flasch says. "Harmony was always paramount for me. Add piano, you have all the harmony you can want at your disposal. Guitar, you are very limited to how the frame and strings are set up, so some sounds were inaccessible to me."

As any pianist will tell you, once people realize you can play, they draft you into a multitude of performance possibilities.

"Piano became such a ubiquitous force for me as a musician," he said. "In high school, I could accompany choir practice when we went to sectionals, or at church, or I could play solo, or I could write for the keyboard, or I could play musicals in the pit."

During his sophomore year at Valparaiso High School, a girl he was dating encouraged him to audition for a production of "The Sound of Music" at Chicago Street Theatre. He scored the part of Rolfe Gruber, the telegram delivery boy.

It was his first *and* last time on stage as a performer.

"I would never act again," he says, laughing. "Memorizing lines and being in front of people was petrifying. I was always afraid to go on stage."

The production, however, did plant the early seeds in terms of music direction. The show's rehearsal accompanist was absent a few nights, and Flasch felt comfortable to step in as a substitute.

"So then I thought, now this was fun," he adds.

From then on, Community Street Theatre knew it had a valuable resource. While still in high school, it commissioned him to write music that could underscore scenes in three ensuing productions: "Rabbit Hole," "Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde" and "Romeo and Juliet."

Memorial Opera House then came calling. He served as the rehearsal accompanist for a production of "Annie" in 2014. Realizing how talented he was at the piano, the theater group enlisted him to play in the pit for another production a year later.

"Les Miserables."

Talk about baptism by fire.

Flasch laughs when hearing that description, but he says it was the best experience.

"I really fell in love with it from then on out," he says.

After graduating from Valparaiso High School in 2015, he attended the Indiana University Jacobs School of Music, the world-reknown music conser-

vatory established in 1921. He studied composition, with a piano emphasis...for one semester.

"I realized that going down that route was not for me," he says.

He returned to Valparaiso, attended Valparaiso University, eventually earning a degree in actuarial science. And it was during his college years that more musical-directing options surfaced. One of his earliest involvements was with Marquette Catholic High School's production of "Godspell." Later, he was the music and vocal director for a production of "Little Shop of Horrors" at Crown Point Community Theater, his work earning an award for vocal direction from the Northwest Indiana Excellence in Theatre Foundation.

Guiding the pit and vocals became his preference. "One of the reasons I love theater is the storytelling aspect and how music can elevate that," he says. "I was always interested in composing. I thought it was storytelling through music, so when it came time for theater, the very explicit storytelling in theatrical productions and music can elevate that. It felt like a natural progression for me. It all came together."

Other musicals on his resume include "Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat," "The Producers," "Meet Me in St. Louis," "Pippin," "The 25th Annual Putnam County Spelling Bee" and "Sweeney Todd."

"Working," the 2019 production that brought him to Dunes Summer Theatre, was his first experience with a professional cast composed entirely of adults. He got the gig only a few days before rehearsals began. Apparently, the musical director dropped out at the last minute.

"They called me and said, 'Can you vocal and music direct? And, rehearsals start the day after tomorrow'," Flasch recalls, laughing. "I didn't know the show, but I said, 'Yeah, I'll do it'."

To say it was a hectic experience is putting it mildly. He was living in Valparaiso, studying for an

actuarial exam and taking the South Shore Line to Chicago, where he worked as an actuarial analyst — his first day job out of college. However, when heading back to Indiana, instead of getting off the train in Chesterton and driving home, he'd keep going to Michigan City, where he'd work with the Dunes cast during rehearsals, *then* head home for the night.

"I was not sleeping a lot in those days," he says with a laugh. "It was crazy, but so much fun. It was working with people who did this professionally and working with Steve (Scott), who has decades of professional, high-quality productions in Chicago. I wanted to continue doing productions with these kinds of people. They've called me back for everything ever since."

Scott, now in his second season as Dunes artistic director, describes Flasch as "unflappable." Someone he's rarely seen, if ever, lose his cool during rehearsals. He also calls him one of the best music directors he's worked with: high praise from someone like Scott who has Goodman Theatre credits attached to his resume.

"He understands how actors work, how they have to learn things, which is very important for a music director," Scott said of Flasch. "He's also very precise and very specific about his work. He comes in so thoroughly prepared in understanding the score and how it works within the play."

After "Working," Flasch was tapped in 2020 to serve as music director for the 2008 rock musical "Next to Normal," but the arrival of COVID-19 put the regular season on hold. Since 2021, however, he's resumed his duties in productions such as "Forever Plaid," "A Grand Night for Singing," "Next to Normal," cabarets and now "tick, tick...BOOM!"

The most challenging thus far?

"Next to Normal," he says without hesitation. "There's so much emotional depth to it, and (for me) making sure the music can inform the emotional

journey for everyone. It has to be so refined to carry that weight. It's all sung through, hardly any spoken dialogue, so you never have a break."

Dunes actor Max DeTogne was among the cast members of "Next to Normal." He'd worked with Flasch before, the first time on 2019's "Working," and he appears in "tick, tick...BOOM!"

"He is brilliant," DeTogne said of Flasch. "He is able to communicate with people on all levels, and make even the most complicated of musical lines make sense. He's patient. You couldn't want anything more from a music director."

For Flasch, somehow, amid his community theater work, he finds time to give music lessons. His wife, Alyssa, who works in marketing and arts administration, also is an actress. In March, she appeared as Annabel in the Memorial Opera House production of "Lucky Stiff." She just appeared in "Rent" at Chicago Street Theatre.

His dream is to become a musical theater composer, but right now, he likes where he's at in life.

"I have a balance," he says. "I get to stretch my analytic brain at work and my artistic brain on stage. The long-term goal is to be a composer in musical theater. It's not in the cards at the moment, but that's the goal. I have lots of ideas. My problem is, it's so many things, it's hard to focus on one. I haven't finished a full musical, but I'm working on several songs at one time. That will be forthcoming when it is forthcoming."

Retired Clerk-Treasurer Named Long Beach July 4th Parade Marshal

Bill DeFuniak is being pressed back into public service.

There's no heavy lifting, though, with this assignment. The recently retired Long Beach clerk-treasurer has been named marshal of the annual July 4th parade.

"Parade Chairman Norm Bruemmer tells me I'm riding in an aged convertible," DeFuniak says. "And

I'm told I need to say a few words at the end of the parade."

Affable and wry-witted, DeFuniak assures he's up to the task. With a laugh, the 86-year-old says although he'll be the parade marshal, he won't be wearing a badge like some Wild West sheriff. But like a frontier lawman tasked with keeping the peace, DeFuniak faced some tough assignments in his 10 years and two months as de facto mayor of Long Beach.

"Bill served as Long Beach town clerk for over 10 years and calmly guided us through some turbulent times within the community, from COVID to beach erosion. We feel he is much deserving of this recognition," says Bruemmer of the Long Beach Civic Association, which sponsors the parade and selects its marshal.

DeFuniak was retired in Long Beach from his career as a partner in an executive recruiting firm. His wife, Barbara, however, noticed he was becoming a little restless, encouraging him to put his management skills back into play by running for clerk-treasurer. He won the 2011 election to a four-year term and two more after that.

Sadly, Barbara died of complications from surgery early in his first term. And in 2014, while still in his first term, his daughter, Katherine, the mother of three, died of cancer.

In an interview last year with *The Beacher*, De-Funiak explained the demands of the 40-hour-a-week job, and the camaraderie of the town hall staff, were a welcome balm for his grief. In addition to managing controversies that arise in any public-service role, DeFuniak busied himself with the con-

version of the monthly, quarterly and annual state and federal reporting requirements from paper to digital files.

"We started the process in my first year, and every successive year we added a little bit more computerization to the reporting," he said. He considers the conversion one of his and his staff's proudest achievements during his tenure.



After graduating with a math degree from the University of San Francisco, the native Californian sold computers IBM before switching to the programming side in the early days of the software industry. He says his computer background was of limited value when he led Long Beach's conversion from paper to digits because the technology by then was so radically different. But learning and re-learning computer skills as a senior kept him sharp and engaged.

In Long Beach, the six-member town council is the true decision-maker, DeFuniak notes. Nevertheless, some in the lakefront community were convinced he had "mys-

tical powers." He lightheartedly recounts how a resident complained that every time she drove past town hall, her cell phone fritzed out. She wanted him to do something about it. He couldn't.

He was better at getting cracked garbage cans replaced or having a crew smooth over a pothole. DeFuniak says he misses his days at the town hall famed architect John Lloyd Wright designed in the distinctive International Style in 1931.

DeFuniak stepped away from his post in early 2022. Long Beach resident Tim Perry is completing DeFuniak's third term.

"There were a lot of tough issues cropping up, and that's why I thought it was time to move on and have somebody else take over," DeFuniak explains.

He's enjoying his second retirement.

"I've been tidying up my house that seems to have

Injuries he suffered on the gridiron long ago as a high school and college football lineman have caught up with him, he says. When he leaves his home these days, he uses a walker.

DeFuniak occasionally drops by town hall to visit with his cherished former colleagues, like Deanna Carlson, his deputy clerk-treasurer, Mark Swistek, chief marshal of the police department, and Bob Sulkowski, the retired chief marshal who continues in a part-time role.

Chicago, NASCAR Officials Preparing City for First Street Race

(Editor's note — The following information is courtesy of NASCAR and the City of Chicago.)

Chicago's lakefront is not the first place that comes to mind for a NASCAR street race.

But in these final days leading up to July 1-2, Chicago and NASCAR officials are deep into preparations for the first cup series street race in NAS-CAR's 75-year history.

The first event, the 55-lap NASCAR Xfinity Series (The Loop 121), is at 4 p.m. Saturday, July 1. The 100-lap NASCAR Cup Series (Grant Park 220) is at 4:30 p.m. Sunday, July 2. Visit https://tinyurl.com/yc2bywy2 for tickets.

Safety measures and traffic impacts are top priority, the emphasis being parking restrictions, street closures and pedestrian routes through Grant Park. City officials indicate access to Buckingham Fountain, Butler Field and Lower Hutchinson Field should have minimal restrictions. Event organizers also have promised that people will have access to residences and businesses during race weekend.

Free event activities are planned on Butler Field. Preparations began June 2 with Columbus Drive parking restrictions between Jackson and Balbo drives. Then, Ida B. Wells Drive closed east of Michigan Avenue to erect main viewing areas. Track wall installations resulted in brief road closures.

June 25 kicked off the most significant closures, specifically Columbus Drive between Jackson Drive and Roosevelt Road. That was followed by south-bound DuSable Lake Shore Drive from Randolph Street to McFetridge Drive. Closures tapped for June 29 are Roosevelt Road east of Columbus Drive and northbound Michigan Avenue. June 30 will see southbound Michigan Avenue closed off between Balbo Drive and Jackson Drive.

On race weekend, northbound DuSable Lake Shore Drive will close at 4 a.m. Saturday, July 1, between McFetridge Drive and Randolph Street, the reason being additional safety precautions. Northbound DuSable Lake Shore Drive reopens Sunday, July 2.

Streets are projected to reopen beginning at 7 a.m. Monday, July 3. However, closures will remain as event workers take down the track wall, fences and other viewing structures. All traces of the event, officials say, should be gone by July 15.

Don't Think While Watching "Extraction 2" - Just Roll With It

The 21-minute single take of the prison escape in "Extraction 2" kicks off with a violent inmate riot.

"Extraction" (2020) was Chuck Norris pulp with a Marvel star, but it had two things going for it: a wild, 12-minute foot chase done in one take, and an explosive climax set on a bridge. By escapism standards amid a global pandemic, that was enough to catapult it into Netflix history as the streaming giant's most watched original movie.

A sequel was inevitable, even though it seemed Chris Hemsworth's mercenary had punched his last ticket. "Extraction 2" picks up where the last film left off, and it's just a dumb, glorified B movie. A bigger and better one, though, and for all the right reasons.

Returning director Sam Hargrave and writer Joe Russo amp up the stakes so the sense of adventure is grander, the action extravagantly staged. It's based on <u>Ciudad</u>, a graphic novel Russo cowrote with four others, including his brother, Anthony, the siblings known for big-budget Marvel pictures. They know how to create propulsive entertainment.

The sequel begins with Hemsworth's Tyler Rake rescued and recuperating from what looked like certain death. And like every B movie where the "retired" or "injured" hero is summoned for another mission, Tyler can't say no. His ex-wife's sister, and her kids, are now in a Georgian prison, forced

there by her drug lord husband so he can watch over them. Tyler may be worse for wear, but he gets the obligatory training montage where he whips himself into shape through exercise only an actor known for playing a Norse god could pull off.

But then, we get the good stuff. Hargrave stages the prison break of Ketevan (Tinatin Dalakishvili) and her two children in an insane 21-minute single take — no editing. Not just the physical exit from the prison, mind you, but the massive inmate riot within it. *Then* the ensuing car chase, with Rake and crew firing away at thugs. *Then* the spectacular train escape where Tyler is pursued by thugs in helicopters. All told from the perspective of one camera. Ridiculously silly, yes, but from a filmmaking standpoint, the most insanely entertaining chase you will likely see this summer. Hargrave keeps pushing the pursuit, elevating it to extremes while still trying to capture it all with zero editing.

(No doubt a little CGI trickery comes to his aid.)

There's another dvnamite moment when the bad guys come after Tyler and company while holed up in a skyscraper. Again, largescale action with goons firing from helicopters, followed by fistfights on glass ledges — everything but the last remaining kitchen sink on the planet tossed into the chaos.

"Extraction 2" ultimately is more about the chase than plot. Character is irrelevant as well. For instance, we're just supposed to accept that Tyler is a badass because he's too busy fighting to notice his right arm is on fire. Or that Tyler's female partner, Nik (Golshifteh Farah-

ani), can kick ass with the best of them, yet still maintain a killer haircut. There's also one of Ketevan's grouchy kids, San-

dro (Andro Japaridze), who may be the most annoying character of any film because of how he frequently puts everyone in jeopardy.

I suppose you're just supposed to gloss over stuff

like that because the main thrust of the story is, a mother and her children require safe passage, away from people who want them dead.

All "Extraction 2" wants to be is a non-stop chase, and that's what it delivers. And then some.

"Polite Society" is a Blast From Start to Finish

"Polite Society" has a sneaky way of revealing its true intentions: attacking everything stuffy and predictable about British decorum.

On the surface, this comedy, now streaming on Peacock, is pure silliness about a sister trying to thwart her older sister's wedding, complete with "Matrix'-style martial arts and wacko conspiracy theories. But the movie, the irresistible feature-film debut of Nida Manzoor, is a blast because it consistently thumbs its nose at British Oscar bait where women define themselves by the men in their lives.

Indeed, the sisters in "Polite Society" have more on their minds. British-Pakistani teen Ria Khan (the whip smart Priya Kansara) is hellbent on becoming a Hollywood stuntwoman, her hero being Eunice Huthart, real-life stunt double for the likes of Angelina Jolie and Uma Thurman. The potential is there, but Ria is more the klutzy hopeful. Her older sister, Lena (Ritu Arya), lasted one semester in art school, then dropped out.

Most movies depict sisters as catty visions of sibling rivalry. Not here. In "Polite Society," Ria and Lena are each other's biggest fans. There for each other at every turn. That is, until Lena meets Salim (Akshay Khanna), a handsome, if geeky scien-

tist. His mother, Raheela (Nimra Bucha, the Disney+ series "Ms. Marvel"), queen bee of local social circles, fixed the two up. Salim and Lena not only click, but get engaged one month after meeting. Ria, convinced Raheela is up to no good, hatches a plot to stop the nuptials.

Everything appears locked in place for social-status satire. The surprise, though, is that the target is less British-Pakistani culture and more British expectations for women. Ria's all-girls prep school, for instance, appears a notch or two away from "The Handmaid's Tale," especially the repressive uniforms. Ria's best friends, Clara (Saraphina Beh) and Alba (Ella Cruccoleri), are fiercely devoted to her. These three, in fact, become their own "Mission: Impossible" crew, swiping Salim's laptop while he's at the local gym, hoping to find anything to discredit him.

However, it is Ria and her family that are the

movie's greatest creation. British tales centered around Pakistani families always feature rigid parents trapped in tradition. But Ria's mother, Fatima (Shobu Kapoor), and father, Rafe (Jeff Mirza), have a loose rhythm to them. More relaxed, affording a degree of give and take with their children. It's not that they want their daughters to marry. More, they want them to get their acts together.

By the big finish of "Polite Society," when the movie introduces a creepy conspiracy plot, Lena's lav-

ish Bollywood wedding and a surprise ally for Ria, a line of dialogue pops up that reveals the movie's feminist heart. That Lena took a stab at art school, that she now flounders as a full-time slacker, means she's flipping conventional norm the bird. And by doing so, Lena symbolizes hope that Ria can march to her own beat. Carve out her own future.

"Polite Society" sees these two sisters through to the end, where their happiness is not defined





by men. The movie leaves you with a silly grin on your face, but also incredible affection for Ria and Lena, and where their journey heads. We get the sense this isn't the end for these two, but the start of something greater.

I loved this movie.





The Legacy Center Gallery will host watercolorist Kristina Knowski as its next installation July 1-Sept. 30 at Queen of All Saints Catholic Church, 1719 E. Barker Ave.

an avid birder known for her portfolio of extinct bird species. She sketches and researches species in the field. In working with extinct species, she visits bird collections of the Field Museum and Peggy Notebaert Nature Museum to study from skins. She also uses observation, anatomical references and specimens to examine these species.

All works are watercolor on paper. A planned composition

is drawn first, followed carefully by several layers of transparent paint. The extant, or existing, bird paintings are usually more illustrational, creating an optimum version of the species similar to a field guide. These are made as a formal study of the bird, keeping the background minimal.

The extinct species, on the other hand, have a more uninhibited approach. Backgrounds are intentionally loose and ambiguous, contrasting representation with abstraction.

Since graduating valedictorian in 2012 from the American Academy of Art in Chicago, Knowski has participated in numerous shows in Chicago and surrounding states. Her most notable solo show was at the Peggy Notebaert Nature Museum in "Dreams of Martha" in conjunction with the 100th anniversary of the passenger pigeon's extinction.



Fiona Davis is one of the best historical-fiction writers. In her previous six books, she gives us the best of New York City in its famous buildings, tradi-

tions and celebrities, and the amazing stories that connect them.

Past novels took us to New York Public Library, Barbizon Hotel, Grand Central Station, Chelsea Hotel, the Gilded Age mansion of Henry Clay Frick and the Dakota — infamous former home of Beatle John Lennon.

This week, Davis takes us to Radio City Music Hall in 1956 and a whirlwind tour of what it takes to be a Rockette—told through the fictional story of Marion Brooks...

Marion lives in Bronxville with her father, Simon, an upper-level manager for the NYC gas and electric company, and her sister, Judy, his secretary.

Only Marion is like their late mother, reveling in the arts: her mother an actress, Marion a dancer. She's been working as a dance instructor until one day, an unfor-

tunate incident sends her packing with her ballet slippers and last check in hand.

She hears the Rockettes are holding auditions soon and decides this might be her big chance to fulfill her dream of dancing on stage. After all, she's just the right height and weight, exceptionally goodlooking and her *grand jetés* are to die for!

To her surprise, she's hired. Marion's not about to lose this once-in-a-lifetime opportunity, defying her father by becoming a Rockette. Their conversation does not go well and, yeah, Simon kicks his daughter out of the house.

Another Rockette, Bunny, takes her to The Rehearsal Club, a Manhattan all-girls boarding house, to become her roommate. It's a place where she gets to settle in and make friends with other dancers and singers...

"She'd landed in a warm sisterhood where her ambition and drive were celebrated, not questioned." Translated, she's happy — but a tad guilty about leaving her father and sister.

Next problem — Marion has been dating Nathaniel since high school. An understanding of sorts about marriage exists. Hey, it's the 1950s, and fathers only approve of three jobs for their daughters: teacher, wife/mother or nurse (not doctor). Marion falls into the routine of rehearsals and performances, keeping Nathaniel at bay, for now.

Marion holds fast to her dreams, and we enter

the real life of a Rockette — a lot of rehearsals and performances. The camaraderie that makes Marion feel she is part of a great big family helps to lessen the pain of her father's rejection.

Radio City Music Hall is the foundation for this intriguing story. Davis gives a bit of real NYC history with the addition of a madman who has set off bombs at famous buildings, including Radio City Music Hall, for the past 16 years. Who is this man? The answer will hit closer to home than Marion could imagine.


The juxtaposition of one young woman's dream with that of a madman provides the energy, horror and wonder of the story. You're there — walking on stage as the workmen set up scenery, the musicians are practicing. Everything must be perfect. The

dressing room is awash with nervous talk, final fixing of makeup and hair, the rustle of costumes being put on and the rush out the door to line up for their entrance. It's exciting, but there is always the undercurrent of when and where the bomber strikes next.

Through a double date with Bunny and her beau, Marion meets Peter Griggs, a psychiatrist at a local hospital for the insane. He's interested in the newly found science of criminal profiling. After the Christmas bombing, Marion and Peter are determined to find the bomber, even if the police are suspicious of this new science and won't listen to them. Nothing else has worked the past 16 years — what do the police have to lose? The stunning climax puts Marion in a desperate position to finally get at the truth.

The final word: This is a backstage life of the world-famous Rockettes, an inside look at an iconic New York building and a heck of a good mystery. What more can you ask for?!
