Moments of Grace

Everyday moments of grace are too many to count at Sharing Meadows – a residential community of adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities in Rolling Prairie.

Here's just one of those moments: David Feikes, a professor of mathematical education at Purdue University Northwest, who volunteers by teaching classes at Sharing Meadows every other Wednesday. He patiently, gently and with great cheer guides a class of 15 residents through a math exercise.

A small team of his volunteer assistants circu-

lates the makeshift classroom on Sharing Meadows' 200-acre campus, assisting residents struggling to come up with the right answer.

Feikes is road-testing a new math game he calls "The Squeeze" that he's devised especially for the residents. One resident shares a number between 1 and 100 with Feikes while the other residents – or villagers as they're known – must squeeze the range of possibilities until one of them arrives at the correct number.

A villager ventures a guess, which Feikes dismisses as too high and records it on a whiteboard. He paces the floor like a bubbly game-show host rather than an authoritarian professor planted behind a lectern. Another villager weighs in with a number that's close, but it's too low, Feikes says as he scratches the latest number on the whiteboard.

After several more increasingly calculated guesses, a resident nailed the number and is warmly congratulated by fellow villagers and Feikes, who has always been struck by the kindness and support they show for each other.

A LaPorte native-resident and PNW math-education professor for 31 years, Feikes has established a sweet rapport with the villagers since becoming a volunteer instructor at Sharing Meadows nearly two years ago.

"I tease them occasionally," Feikes says playfully. "Hey Colin. Do I cheat at math?"

"Yes, professor, you do sometimes," the villager replied without a moment's hesitation.

Feikes says building a bond of trust with students is the secret sauce to teaching.

"Regardless if it's elementary, middle school or high school students, it's about building relationships," he said. "They have to know you care about them. And once they know you care, they will do anything."

When faced with a math exercise they find overly challenging, the villagers will often push back, he says. "I can't do it. I can't do it.' But they will eventually try," he says, "because they trust me."

Feikes is one of about 300 people who volunteer at Sharing Meadows. Bill Harmon, executive director of the residential community, says each volunteer contributes moments of grace in countless different ways that are as meaningful to them as they are to the villagers.

Some volunteers teach, some as-

sist the teachers, some help with the summer and weekend camps and some help raise money for the nonprofit organization. Still others cut the grass and trim the trees on the sprawling campus, or help repair mechanical equipment when it breaks.

Many, many volunteers help staff the annual Leprechaun Hunt: the family fun day of food, games and Irish music every August. And some volunteers simply spend time with a villager.

The volunteers hail primarily from Northwest Indiana, while others come from Southwest Michigan, even the Chicago area.

Passionate about Sharing Meadows' mission, the 30-year-old Harmon has led the organization and its staff of 28 employees since 2018. Raised in Bristol, Ind., he planned to become a Catholic priest and enrolled in Pontifical College Josephinum, a Roman Catholic seminary in Columbus, Ohio. Established in 1888, the seminary later was declared a pontifical college by Pope Leo XIII, making it North America's only seminary to hold that distinction.

Harmon earned a degree in philosophy from the seminary, but decided the priesthood would not be for him. He wasn't sure what he wanted to do. That

was until he saw an ad in 2016 for a camp coordinator at Sharing Meadows.

Working for an organization that cared for people with disabilities was especially appealing to Harmon.

"I told myself, that is something I can do because I have been working with people as a volunteer with intellectual disabilities since I was about 4," he said.

When he was a young child, his father, a successful businessman, lost his eyesight. His father was able to continue to do work from home, but was no longer able to drive a car. However, he wanted his children to help those less fortunate in their community.

"My dad called the local therapeutic horse ranch for children with disabilities and asked if people from the ranch could come and pick us up so we could volunteer there," Harmon says. "So from a very young age, I discovered that our friends with intellectual disabilities are just that – friends."

As he did when he found a community of friends at the therapeutic horse ranch as a child, he felt he discovered a home at Sharing Meadows.

"One of the greatest things about working here," he said, "is that I have been able to find my sense of belonging at Sharing Meadows, where truly everyone belongs."

Two years after he was hired to lead Sharing Meadows' summer camps, he was named executive director at age 24. His staff, the board of directors and the army of volunteers carry on the work of Father Dennis Blaney, a former parish priest in Michigan City who founded Sharing Meadows.

Land was acquired in Rolling Prairie, and the 185acre site debuted in 1994 under the umbrella of the SHARE Foundation for the Handicapped. Fifteen more acres were added in 2023.

Although founded in 1982 by a Catholic priest, Sharing Meadows is a non-denominational Christian nonprofit.

"Father Blaney made it very clear that he wants to accept people of all different faiths and backgrounds," Harmon says. "You don't even need to be Christian. But we do live by Christian principles."

Sharing Meadows, which receives no government funding, relies on private donations and fundraising events like the Leprechaun Hunt that annually draws thousands to its picturesque campus of winding roads, lakes and wooded trails. It has five villages, each consisting of three homes occupied by two adults and one full-time steward.

The waiting list for placement at Sharing Meadows, unfortunately, is long. But plans for more villages to better accommodate some of the community's graying population are in the offing, according to Harmon

Now 91, Father Blaney lived in a home on the campus. Requiring more care, he now resides in a senior living center. Harmon's office is in the basement of

the priest's former home.

Not long after Harmon was named executive director, Sharing Meadows began an education program for villagers. A particular concern was the high percentage of villagers diagnosed with Down syndrome.

"We know that with Down syndrome, almost 99% of them will develop dementia by about age 50," he says. "If we continue their education by getting back to the basics with reading, writing and mathematics, that will help delay a diagnosis of dementia for those with Down syndrome."

Villagers range in age from 30 to 69.

Harmon says other organizations with similar missions to Sharing Meadows focus on job skills when their residents become adults.

"We do that kind of job training here, too, but we want to take it to the next level with our education program that invests in the villagers' right to an education," he said.

Sharing Meadows put the word out about plans for its education program in its monthly newsletter, *Good News*. One volunteer read the article and alerted Feikes, her colleague at PNW, that the organization could use a volunteer with his type of talents.

"Dave called me, and we met for coffee to discuss the education program," Harmon says. "And he has been hooked ever since. He has come out every other week for close to two years. And thanks to his classes, there is growth among the villagers. It's exactly what we were hoping to see."

Feikes also joined the SHARE Foundation's 21-member board of directors, reinforcing the organization's commitment to the villagers' education.

The organization also hired Nichole Blake, a licensed teacher, to oversee the development of its educational initiatives in addition to coordinating fundraising events. She noted that in addition to math and literacy classes, Sharing Meadows enriches the villagers' lives with a science club, drama club, cooking classes and participation in Special Olympics.

As Feikes walked the villagers through another lively and engaging math activity, Kevin Noland, a retired attorney from Louisville, Ky., and longtime volunteer, leaned in to help villagers plot points on a graph.

Noland, who lives nearby, regularly assists with the math class. He was first introduced to Sharing Meadows 11 years ago when he volunteered to help villagers tend their outdoor garden. He's also accompanied residents to concerts by LaPorte County Symphony Orchestra.

"I love each of the villagers," Noland says. "They each have their own special abilities."

The benefit of time spent with villagers at Sharing Meadows is quite tangible for Noland.

"If I can make a villager's day better and put a smile on their face," he said, "I feel very rewarded by that."




Students also will accept donations of devices, which they will refurbish and provide to local families in need through a partnership with The Salvation Army of Michigan City.

Linney, Parker Make Hospice Dramedy "Suncoast" Quietly Affecting

"Suncoast" debuted not even a month ago at Sundance Film Festival, and in some respects, it's the generic template for indies that thrive there. It clicks all the essential ingredients:

- Feature-film directorial debut? Check.
- Semi-autobiographical? Check.
- Coming-of-age dramedy? Check.

And while the film, which just debuted on Hulu, does not transcend its familiar premise, it has two things going for it: Laura Linney and Nico Parker. These actresses achieve something special.

The movie hails from writer-director Laura Chinn, a veteran TV writer, and when you read up on her, you can see how "Suncoast" is personal for her. So much of her own life is incorporated here.

Parker (the daughter of "Westworld" actress Thandiwe Newton), who made a brief, if memorable impression in HBO's "The Last of Us," stars as 17-year-old Doris, and if the name feels too old for a teen, it is fitting. She's an old soul forced to grow up fast because of her family. Living in Clearwater, Fla., her brother is in the last days of brain cancer. Uncommunicative, immobile. She's been his primary caretaker because their mother, Kristine (Laura Linney), slaves away at odd jobs.

Linney has made a career out of playing emotional steamrollers, ("Primal Fear," "You Can Count On Me," "The Savages," "The Nanny Diaries"), and Hollywood often takes her for granted. That it's expected she will do strong work. But here, she infuses

Kristine with enough empathy so we get her. She's focused so much of her energy on her dying son, she forgot how to be a mother to Doris. She has a scene where she pleads with security at her son's hospice facility to allow her inside, and the maternal desperation is so powerful, in a perfect world, the performance would kickstart next year's Oscar race.

Why, by the way, does a hospice facility require security? Turns out, this is the mid-2000s, and the facility's famous resident is none other than Terri Schiavo. Remember her? The Florida woman in an irreversible vegetative state at the center of a right-to-die controversy. The swarm of news media and protesters from both sides of the equation mirrors the chaos within Doris' family. Where, in some ways, death to Doris is a distraction from living.

As a teen, Doris is desperate for normalcy. So, she latches on to a group of vapid teen girls solely for companionship. The girls take advantage of her, using her vacant home for parties since Kristine is camped out at hospice. And it is in these scenes that Parker shows tremendous range. Her posture in the presence of these teen harpies ranges from stiff and brittle, fearing rejection, then confidently doling out

advice that proves why she's better than these other girls. The yearning for acceptance, the anger and resentment toward her mother — every emotion from Parker — is real and honest.

There is a third party here. Woody Harrelson's Paul, an aging activist seen among the throngs of protestors. Harrelson can enliven *anything*, especially in "Three Billboards Outside Ebbing Missouri' and "The Edge of Seventeen." His presence here is designed as the one stable adult in Doris' life. But the role is underwritten. Not as sharp as Harrelson, as a scene-stealer, can be. You expect more, and you don't quite get it.

I am a sucker, though, for character studies where everything isn't hunky-dory by the end...but it *will* be. The seeds of renewal are planted. That is what we get here. Mother and daughter, arriving at an understanding, with Linney and Parker achieving a quiet grace. Even Keyla Monterroso Mejia (Nurse Mia), who with lively turns in "Abbott Elementary"

and "Curb Your Enthusiasm" has become one of my favorite comic actresses, dials it down to achieve one of the movie's most affecting exchanges.

Linney and Parker sold the movie for me. Didn't matter that their journey contains few surprises. They made me care. I was moved.






JROTC Makes Presentations to Middle Schools

Michigan City High School's Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps held presentations for eighthgraders at Barker and Krueger middle schools on Feb. 7 to boost enrollment for the next school year.

Since the COVID-19 pandemic, JROTC is struggling nationwide to maintain the minimum enrollment requirements of 100 students.

The senior Marine instructor, Maj. Tom McGrath, made the introduction. Cadets then demonstrated military regulation and exhibition drill before transitioning to different physical-fitness events. The two highest ranking cadets, Capt. Marcus Mantel and 2nd Lt. Alexandra Reed, reflected on being in the program for three years. Students could ask questions and speak to cadets.

McGrath emphasized that JROTC is a leadership program, not a preparation for the military. It will help a student who decides to enter the military, but it is not designed as a recruiting tool. Many cadets, he continued, fill leadership roles in other school extracurriculars, such as athletics, band and technology clubs. The JROTC has many extracurricular teams, including Military Drill, Raider, CyberPa-

"They were really into what our cadets were doing," he said in a press release. "We just hope that it translates into an increase in our enrollment."

Two Oscar-Nominated Shorts Definitely Worth Your Time

"The After" opens with a shocking act of violence, the sole survivor paralyzed with grief in the weeks and months after.

A feature-length film would ground itself here, in unthinkable anguish. But within an intensely focused 18 minutes, director and co-writer Misan Harriman has plenty to say, saying it with unflinching directness. The effect is an 18-minute sucker punch to the gut.

Harris' short film is a leading Oscar contender for Best Short Film (Live Action). Used to be, this category, and Best Documentary Short (the other movie featured here), were cinematic black holes no one could locate, but thanks to streaming, the inaccessible is more accessible than ever.

"The After" is lean, efficient storytelling whose greater meaning hails from its star, David Oyelowo. What a year this guy had! In addition to this 2023 short film, he scored a well-deserved Golden Globe nod for the revisionist western "Lawman: Bass Reeves" on Paramount+.

In "The After," he plays Dayo, a loving father and husband out for an afternoon in the city with his daughter before her dance recital. His wife meets up with them, thrilled he can attend the program.

Then, tragedy.

A lone assailant arrives out of nowhere, targeting everyone in his path. Dayo's daughter is one of the casualties, his wife shocked into committing suicide.

How do you pick up the pieces from there? Life from there, in "the after," it's unthinkable. And we find ourselves with Dayo some time after the tragedy. He's now a rideshare driver, his grief like a jacket worn without fail.

Harriman, who wrote the script with John Julius Schwabach, does something interesting. Through rapidly edited vignettes, we meet the many passengers in Dayo's vehicle. They all represent society's preoccupation with the trivial. Their worries, their fixations, means nothing compared to the empty void Dayo faces daily.

Then, a bickering couple and their daughter cram into Dayo's vehicle. The husband and wife pick at every scab imaginable. Their daughter is an eerie doppelgänger for Dayo's deceased daughter.

That experience leads to a gesture from the girl that is a cry for help *and* an act of solidarity between weary souls. What follows is the greatest piece of acting Oyelowo has achieved. A complete, utter collapse. A soul ravaged by grief.

This might sound too painful, but the beauty of "The After" is what happens next. The message of the film isn't that life is cruel, but that amid pain, having the courage to pull it together and keep going is a triumphant act of resilience.

Yi Yan Fuei and Zhang Li Hua likely have enough stories within them to fuel 10 movies, but in the 17-minute "Nai Nai & Wài Pó," they offer plenty of joy and heartache.

The film, an Oscar nominee for Best Documentary Short Film, is a love letter to these women by their grandson, Sean Wang. It just debuted on Disney+ and Hulu, and Wang couldn't have picked two more fascinating people as his subjects. They are his maternal and paternal grandmothers. Obviously not related by blood, but they became instant friends and maintained the friendship over the years. When their husbands died, they moved in together and now exist almost like sisters.

Wang follows their daily routines, and we get two women who live life to the fullest. Staying active is essential, too, including moments where they dance together.

Even in 17 minutes, "Nai Nai & Wài Pó" feels like it has no pull. Then, these two women open up about being in the last chapter of their lives. Their

insights into life, into acknowledging the beauty and sadness of death, is profoundly moving.

Thing is, Wang doesn't to treat his grandmothers as geriatric martyrs. As his visit with them comes to a close, a lump firmly lodged in your throat, one of the grandmothers tosses off a quip about her grandson that makes you laugh so loudly, it's obvious, these women have no plans of giving up on life.

"Nai Nai & Wài Pó" would seem like an Oscar shoe-in...but it's up against "The Last Repair Shop," one of the truly great films of last year. "Nai Nai & Wài Pó," by comparison, feels a tad slight, while "The Last Repair Shop" has more meat on its bones.

Still, tough not to admire these women. They're something else.







The Little Liar by Mitch Albom (hardcover \$26.99 retail in bookstores and online; also available as an eBook and an audiobook. 328 pages.)

"...a lie told once is easy to expose, but a lie told a thousand times can look like the truth. And destroy the world."

You may be greatly surprised to learn the narrator of this story is the Angel of Truth. But, really, if you want to know if a story is the real deal, then you need truth explaining it all; after all, truth can't lie — but we humans do a lot of that. And why?

We say we will tell the truth, the sad truth, the undisputed truth, the truth of the matter, and always truthfully, of course. It's the human way of saying you can trust what I have said because nothing is stronger than the truth. Right? Except that we are not perfect, and we lie about the truth all the time. Therefore, in this story, we have Truth to believe all that is to follow.

Singer-songwriter Lucinda Williams said, "Everything's gonna change, everything but the truth." That's the crux of this story, in the form of a little boy who spreads a little lie someone persuaded him is the truth — a lie that changes the face of his world forever and haunts him the rest of his life.

His name is Nico Krispis, a Jewish boy who lives with his family in Salonika, Greece. He is beloved by his family for a number of reasons, but mainly because he always tells the truth...always. The boy is simply incapable of lying, and that makes him the pride of his family, but also the envy of his older brother.

Truth tells this story through the eyes of four people: Nico Krispis, his older brother, Sebastian, the Nazi Udo Graf and Fannie, a neighbor girl beloved both Nico and Sebastian. Their stories take them on separate journeys over many years from childhood to late middle age, from Greece to Europe, to America.

Nico doesn't look Jewish because of his wavy blond hair, lovely blue eyes and bright white teeth. And that's what will save him from being herded onto the trains headed for one of the death camps in Poland. Graf, the Nazi in charge of cleansing Salonika of the Jewish population, sees the boy for what he is — the perfect actor to make his job a whole lot easier. Nazis were very subtle. They knew that if someone the Jews trusted told them the trains would take them to new homes and new jobs in Poland, they would go along meekly, even happily.

Graf tells Nico he is telling him the truth about Poland, so the boy believes him. And it works. Nico

walks around the train station telling everyone the big lie...and they believe him because he is the boy who always tells the truth.

So begins the mass movement of all Jews from the Grecian city. **Fact**: Albom researches that "*Sa*-

lonika (also called Thessaloniki) had the highest percentage of Jewish population of all the cities that the Nazis invaded."

Graf also tells him he will not make his family move if they don't want to — as long as he does what Graf tells him to do. But when the last train to Poland is ready to leave, Nico sees his family being herded into one of the cattle cars, realizing that Graf lied. He is so broken by this final betrayal, and unable to face what he had done to the Salonika Jews, and worse, to his own family, his life becomes a world of lies.

Here's where the story breaks off into four different directions. Nico is forced to stay with Graf (until he escapes), his family is sent to Auschwitz and Fannie jumps off the train, running like the wind toward Hungary...

and the unknown.


As for Nico, he never tells the truth again. He simply can't. His life is broken, he retreats into a world of lies, unable to process how he can ever receive redemption for the horrors his lying has caused.

We see how the Nazis changed people, even ones who are good neighbors and friends. Like exposing your neighbor to the Nazis that they are hiding Jews might get you some reward. Nico turns out to be a resourceful teenager as he makes his way through Europe, always changing his persona to get further away from Greece. Always seeking a way to get to his family and somehow save them — a childish dream perhaps, but one he clings to always. But it's lies, not the truth, that sustain the four of them for decades, and, not surprisingly, give no satisfaction or lasting peace.

For many years Sebastian wants nothing more than to see his brother punished for his deeds in Salonika; Fannie doesn't know where she is going and Nico's family pays the price in Auschwitz. Will they all find each other one day? Will the passing years lead to redemption or destruction?

This is a story told only as Albom can, with humanity...and Truth.
